Scottish Islands A-Z

The wildly beautiful coast of Scotland is scattered with hundreds of islands and islets shaped by the relentless pounding of the sea and the ever-changing weather. Sublimely secluded, all are unique, forming a world apart that is little-known and accessible to the very few - yours to explore from the comfort of our delightfully small ship, Hebridean Princess. Experience their magic and mystery; revel in their rich diversity from the Firth of Clyde to the Inner and Outer Hebrides, and over the Pentland Firth to the Northern Isles with their distinctive Nordic feel. Come and discover these precious island gems.

Arran Firth of Clyde Islands

Influenced by the mild North Atlantic Drift, Arran is a wildlife haven rising to high peaks, including four Corbetts. At the foot of the highest, Goatfell, nestles 16th century red-sandstone Brodick Castle, close to Brodick town. Fifteen miles (24 km) to the north, the 14th century ruined castle of Lochranza was once a royal hunting lodge.

Barra Outer Hebrides

Named after a 6th century saint and world-famous for its unique beach airport, Traigh Mòr, Barra is a beautiful, tranquil island with a fascinating history. Golden beaches backed by sandy, wild flowerdotted machair surround a more rugged interior. The main centre is the once prosperous herring port of Castlebay, where the Macneil's medieval fortress, Kisimul Castle, perches on a rocky outcrop offshore.

Bute Firth of Clyde Islands

Crossed by the Highland Boundary Fault, Bute is an isle of distinctly contrasting landscapes from the bare, rounded and craggy uplands of the north to the lower, undulating and fertile south. Golden beaches fringe the west coast, many with views over the Sound towards Arran. The Victorian resort of Rothesay is the only town



Joined to Sanday by a causeway, secluded Canna lies less than 5 miles (8 km) off Rum. Dubbed the 'Garden of the Hebrides', this elongated, green and grassy isle is capped by magnetic Compass Hill at 458 feet (140 m) in the north. Canna was one of the earliest Christian settlements, associated with St Columba, who was later adopted as its patron saint.

The rocky, wild and virtually treeless island of Coll was first settled in the Stone Age. Dotted with ruined cottages, this bird haven is picturesquely clad in flowerdotted machair, fringed by silver-white beaches, and offers refreshing bike rides and walks.

Colonsay Inner Hebrides

Another bird haven, home to some 200 bird species including the elusive corncrake, and 400 species of flora, Colonsay is a landscape of many contrasts from machair to woods, moors to green fields and rocky to sandy cliff-backed shores. Its finest beach is dramatic Kiloran Bay and inland lie the exotic woodland gardens of Colonsay House.

Cumbraes Firth of Clyde Islands

The contrasting Cumbraes afford fine views to the mainland, Arran and Bute. Green and undulating Great Cumbrae is home to the only town at Millport, elegantly lining Millport Bay. Here the tiny but beautiful Cathedral of the Isles, regarded as Britain's smallest cathedral, seats only 100 worshippers. Rough and rocky Little Cumbrae, held by the Hunters and later by the Montgomeries, was maintained as a royal hunting forest. Its surviving ruins include the castle demolished by Oliver Cromwell's army in 1650 and a small chapel dedicated to

St Beva

Eigg, Small Isles Inner Hebrides

Bought out by its islanders in 1997, Eigg has been settled since prehistoric times and was once the seat of the Lord of the Isles. Its rich past is marked by Iron Age forts, a 6th century church, Viking burial mounds and a graveyard that is a moving testament to the 395 MacDonalds massacred in a cave by the MacLeods in 1577. Rising sheer above the plateau of this western Europe. Puffin have returned, and wildlife reserve, columnar pitchstone An Sgurr adds magic and mystery. Eriska

Inner Hebrides

'Water-nymph Island' in Gaelic, Eriska is a flat tidal 300 acres (121 ha) island at the entrance to Loch Creran, linked by bridge to the mainland. Privately-owned, it is run as a luxury hotel, based at Scottish Baronial Eriska House, built in 1884 by the Stewarts of Appin, in wooded grounds. Please see pages 37 and 81.



Eriskay Outer Hebrides

The reputation of the tiny, hilly yet well-populated isle of Eriskay extends far beyond its shores. Home to a rare pony breed, once used in the mines, it was here that Bonnie Prince Charlie first stepped onto Scottish soil in 1745. Eriskay is also famed as the site of the sinking of the SS Politician offshore in 1941, which inspired Compton MacKenzie's novel and the 1949 film, 'Whisky Galore'. Fair Isle, Shetland Northern Isles

Fair Isle's landscape of high red-sandstone cliffs descends to a low coastline in the south. Archaeological sites bear witness to its occupation since the Bronze Age. An important watch-point for migrating birds, Fair Isle has been the site of a permanent observatory since 1948. The island is also synonymous with its unique geometric knitting, of possible Spanish or Scandinavian origin. Please see page 58.

Gigha Inner Hebrides

Three miles (4.8 km) west of Kintvre. green and fertile Gigha, 'God's' or 'Good Island', is now owned by its community. In addition to dairy farming, goats are reared to produce a distinctive, fruit-shaped cheese - one of the isle's main exports. Ardminish is the only village and site of Achamore House set in 50 acre (20 ha) gardens planted by Sir James Horlick. Please see pages 25, 29, 43, 49 and 87.

Handa Inner Hebrides

This small, rocky isle sits across the Sound of Handa from the wildly beautiful west coast of Sutherland. Magnificent, horizontally stratified rocks of Torridonian sandstone to the north-west, weathered through time into ledges, form a perfect habitat for nesting seabirds, making Handa one of the largest colonies in northother species include the red-throated and black-throated diver, eider and shell duck. The island was abandoned by its eight resident families in 1847.

Harris

Outer Hebrides

Historically and geographically apart from Lewis, Harris is a small region of many contrasts, offering wonderful walks and the beauty of Luskentyre beach on its sandy western shores. Rodel boasts the finest Pre-Reformation church in the Western Isles and the Harris tweeds produced here are world-famous. Although tenacious Gaelic strongholds today, Harris and neighbouring Lewis were the last of the Hebrides to adopt the language.

Holy Isle

Firth of Clyde Islands

Located across Lamlash Bay, Holy Isle has a long history as a sacred site; a spring or Holy Well held to have healing properties, the hermit cave of 6th century monk Saint Molaise and evidence of a 13th century monastery can be found here and there is evidence of some runic writing on the roof of the cave of Saint Molaise. Inner Hebrides

The exiled Irish prince and missionary St Columba reached Iona in 563 to found his community, landing at pebbled St Columba's Bay in the south, as the legend goes. Originally dating from the 12th century, the restored abbey remains a much-revered place of pilgrimage. An enjoyable walk across the windswept machair leads to the Bay at the Back of the Ocean, with its Spouting Cave, facing the open Atlantic and America. Islay Inner Hebrides

Erstwhile seat of the MacDonalds, Lords of the Isles, mild Islay is renowned for the peaty single malts of its eight operating distilleries. Islay abounds in birdlife at the RSPB Loch Gruinart Nature Reserve, hub of a barnacle geese colony and historic treasures from the 18th century round church at Bowmore to the late 9th century High Cross of Kildalton. Isle of Seil Inner Hebrides

Lying 12 miles south of Oban, Seil is separated from the mainland only by the thinnest of sea channels which is spanned by an 18th century humpback bridge, popularly known as the 'Bridge over the Atlantic'. The islands main attractions are the gardens of An Cala with its glorious azaleas and Japanese flowering cherries in early summer. Please see page 49.

Isle Martin, Summer Isles Highland Isles

Isle Martin is an uninhabited island in Loch Broom, on the west coast of Scotland. It is the closest of the Summer Isles to Ullapool and has been the site of a monastery, a herring curing station and a flour mill. Now recognised as a bird sanctuary, it is owned and managed by a community trust.

Jura

Inner Hebrides

Crowned by the landmark Paps, Jura is a place of wild beauty offering a haven to a wide range of wildlife, including some 6,500 red deer. Glaciated raised beaches are a marked feature of its western shores, with the treacherous Corryvreckan Whirlpool to the north. Jura has one tiny village of 200 residents, Craighouse, where the small Jura Distillery has produced a unique single malt since 1810. Please see pages 29, 43, 55, 57 and 69.

Kerrera Inner Hebrides

to Oban from its two sheltered harbours at Mainland is the third-largest of the Scottish Ardentrive Bay and Horse Shoe Bay. Historically a stepping-stone for cattle drovers between Mull and the mainland, this fertile and hilly isle is crowned by the Renaissance MacDougall stronghold of Gylen Castle.

Lewis

Outer Hebrides

Lewis is the largest and most northerly of the Hebrides, forming one island with Harris. Most of its wild landscape, rising to 1,800 feet (549 m) in the south, is cloaked in peat bog - hence its Gaelic name 'Leodhas', meaning 'marshy'. The Callanish Standing Stones and well-preserved Carloway Broch stand testament to its occupation since prehistoric times. The port of Stornoway is the only town. Lunga, Treshnish Isles Inner Hebrides

Designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest, Lunga is rich in plant life with many rare and endangered species native to the island. Described as a 'green jewel in a peacock sea' Lunga was inhabited until 1857 and the remains of the ruined village and its blackhouses can still be seen today. Please see page 40



Mainland, Orkney Northern Isles

Home to the burgh of Kirkwall, the Orcadian capital, and more recent Stromness, dating from the 16th century, Mainland is the most densley populated of the Orcadian isles. Its fertile soil attracted settlers from prehisoric times, as witnessed by the UNESCO World Heritage Neolithic Heart of Orkney, and later Pictish remains. As with the whole of the archipelago, the influence of the Norsemen was strong. Please see pages 58.

Mainland, Shetland Northern Isles

Tiny Kerrera tranquilly guards the entrance Home to Shetland's only burgh of Lerwick, Islands. The long peninsula of South Mainland, south of Lerwick, consists mainly facilities of its own and is entirely of mixed farmland and moorland with many important archaeological sites, including Sumburgh and Scalloway. Blessed with varied scenery ranging from the charming to the wildly dramatic, the island is a paradise for birds and wildlife from otters to orcas. Please see pages 58.

Mingulay, Berneray and Pabbay Outer Hebrides

At the south tip of the Hebrides, these three uninhabited Bishop's Isles, swathed in white sandy beaches and flower-scattered the south, rising to 1,453 feet (443 m) on machair, are awe-inspiring from the sea. Around Berneray 600 feet (183 m) cliffs, nested by thousands of seabirds, tower up as the birthplace of Scottish Renaissance dramatically from the sea. In the north, the poet Sorley Maclean. The main village is Lewisian gneiss 'Hermit Island' of Pabbay, settled by an early Christian community, as its Old Norse name implies, is an ideal spot on which to land.

Muck, Small Isles Inner Hebrides

The flat and fertile Isle of Muck scattered with wild flowers and rimmed by silver shell-sand beaches, is a peaceful haven for puffin, kittiwake, fulmar, shearwater, seaeagle and the porpoises that swim off its shores. Port Mòr is the only village, where the tearoom and craft shop serves delicious home baking.

Mull Inner Hebrides

Fringed by an indented 300 miles (480 km) coastline, Mull is an island of sweeping moors broken occasionally by picturesque clearings. Colourful Georgian-fronted Tobermory is the capital and Craignure the main port, south-east of which lie Scottish Baronial Torosay Castle and ancient Duart Castle, seat of the Macleans.

North Ronaldsay Northern Isles

North Ronaldsay is the most remote of the Orkney Isles, further north than the southern tip of Norway. Today the island continues to be farmed from oldstyle crofts and supports an extremely rich and diverse population of wild flowers, mammals and rare birds. The lighthouse on North Ronaldsay is the tallest landbased lighthouse in Britain, rising to a height of over 100 ft with views on a clear day reaching to Fair Isle and Shetland. Please see page 58.

Oronsay Inner Hebrides

Oronsay is a small tidal island linked to Colonsay by a causeway known as An Traigh or 'The Strand'. The island has no dependent upon its tidal access to and from Colonsay. The whole of the island of Oronsay is designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest and Special Protection Area for its chough and corncrake populations.

Raasay Inner Hebrides

Located between Skye and the mainland, Raasay, 'Isle of the Roe Deer', is relatively low-lying in the north and mountainous in central Dun Caan. Visited by Boswell and Johnson in 1773, the island is most famous Inverarish.

Rum. Small Isles Inner Hebrides

Capped by Askival (2,664 ft/ 812 m) in the rocky Cuillin, the wildlife haven of Rum is a National Nature Reserve and research centre. Owned by Scottish Natural Heritage since 1957, it was bought by the Lancashire industrialist John Bullough in 1879. At the turn of the 20th century, his playboy son, Sir George built the folly of Kinloch Castle, which remains a timecapsule of those headier Edwardian days. Sanda Firth of Clyde Islands

Sanda, 'Sandaigh' in Gaelic, is a small, privately-owned island off the southern tip of the Kintyre Peninsula. An important bird migration and breeding point, it is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), housing the first bird observatory on the west coast of Scotland. Although the island is treeless today, north-western Wood Hill indicates that this was not always so. Please see page 21, 55 and 91.

Sanday, Orkney Northern Isles

One of the most northerly and third largest of the Orkney isles, fertile Sanday, named after its sandy shores, has been settled for some 5,000 years, as its prehistoric brochs and cairns attest. North Loch is home to a Site of Special Scientific Interest, the habitat of rare orchids, and the island's birdlife is prolific. The main settlements are Lady Village and Kettletoft.

St Kilda **Outer Hebrides**

The last 36 Gaelic-speaking residents of St Kilda evacuated the main island of Hirta at their own request in 1930, thereby ending some 5,000 years of continuous settlement. Behind them they left a deserted village that survives today as an outdoor museum, roamed by Soay sheep. Renowned for its awe-inspiring bird cliffs and stacs, St Kilda's remote and exposed Atlantic location makes visits weather-dependent. The archipelago is now a double UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Shiant Isles **Outer Hebrides**

Privately owned by the Nicolson family since 1937, the Shiant Isles are geologically outliers of Skye, ringed by basalt rocks, reminiscent of Staffa and the Giant's Causeway, that teem with thousands of seabirds. Mythically haunted by kelpies, the isles are a renowned wildlife haven for common seals, basking sharks, puffin, herring gull, oyster catcher, eider, shag and many more.

Skye Inner Hebrides

The largest of the Inner Hebrides, Skye was connected to mainland Scotland by the Skye Bridge in 1996. Created volcanically some 60 million years ago, its awe-inspiring landscapes are a paradise for walkers and climbers. Bizarre rock formations punctuate The Quiraing, with the Old Man of Storr. Trotternish to the north-east and Vaternish to the northwest.

Inner Hebrides

Cliffs rising to 131 feet (40 m) are riddled with caves, the most famous of which is Fingal's Cave at Staffa's southern tip, named after legendary Irish hero, Finn MacCool

Stronsay, Orkney Northern Isles

This fertile and flat island of rich farmland supports an array of rare plant species. including the blue-flowered oyster plant. Tanera Mòr, Summer Isles **Highland Isles**

Tanera Mòr is the largest of the Summer Isles, a cluster of scenic islets located off the coast of Ullapool. Atop a lush, grassy hill, the flat summit of Meall Mòr commands panoramic views over the surrounding area. The unique private post office issues its own stamps, and opens out of hours especially for our visits.

Tiree Inner Hebrides

Enjoying long hours of sunshine, mild, fertile Tiree is the most westerly of the Inner Hebrides. Duns and brochs bear witness to its ancient history, while the white Thatched House Museum in Sandaig reveals its more recent crofting past.

The second-largest of the Outer Isles, South Uist's softer, undulating landscape is carpeted in flower-decked machair and fringed by dunes.



Before a leisurely walk on neighbouring Little Cumbrae, the sumptuous and privately owned Ardgowan House awaits our arrival. The Ardgowan estate has been held by the Stewart family since the early 15th century and the present house dates to 1797.

The tiny Holy Isle allows us to take a stroll ashore, ahead of a tour of the Isle of Arran. Affectionately known as 'Scotland in miniature', this vibrant island is considered to possess the great qualities of Scotland.

With its magnificent mountainside setting, Benmore Botanic Garden boasts a world-famous collection of plants. Established in 1863, we are welcomed by an impressive avenue of giant redwoods which now stand over 50 metres high.

Our final afternoon is spent cruising the Upper Clyde and learning of how this mighty river was once so significant for industry and trade.

The relaxing ambience of Hebridean Princess allows us to enjoy the beauty of some of the lower Clyde islands on this cruise which encompasses history, heritage, a distillery and delightful walks ashore.

Sailing into mysterious Holy Loch our first visit is to Historic Kilmun and the Argyll Mausoleum. Built in 1790 the Argyll Mausoleum was constructed to house the remains of the Dukes and Earls of Argyll, Chiefs of the Clan Campbell and their families.

Travelling south we are welcomed to the privately owned Mount Stuart House, held by the Stuart family since the early 15th century.


The gardens at The National Trust for Scotland's Brodick Castle date back to 1710 and offer a glimpse into another world and another time, whilst the country park provides waymarked routes that extend for up to a mile.

Returning to the mainland we discover the oldest independent family-owned distillery in Scotland - Springbank, where many of the ancient distilling methods are still applied in the distillery today.

Onwards to the privately owned island of Sanda, designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest for its importance to both migrating and breeding birds and which is home to the first bird observatory on the west coast of Scotland.

Our cruise concludes with a circumnavigation of the imposing island of Ailsa Craig, once guarried for its blue hone granite used in the making of curling stones, but now home to vast numbers of gannets and an increasing population of puffins.



Ruins and Ramparts of the Lower Clyde

Friday 10th to Tuesday 14th March 2017 4 nights including 1 Gala Dinner

Embark on a journey of architectural exploration on this cruise that introduces us to a myriad of design masterpieces and rare private viewings, often by a member of the family, including ancient castles, private apartments and a fine house.



As we heave anchor and set sail from Greenock Hebridean Princess cruises north along one of the longest sea lochs, Loch Fyne. From our berth at Strachur we venture to the home of Sir Charles and Lady McLean, Strachur House, with its sheltered flower garden.

Before we head to the fishing village of Tarbert, with its ruined castle once occupied by Robert the Bruce, the fairy tale Inveraray Castle, ancestral home of the Duke of Argyll, Chief of the Clan Campbell, opens the private apartments for our visit. A castle has been standing on the shores of Loch Fyne since the 1400's, although the impressive Inveraray Castle of today was inspired by a sketch by Vanbrugh, the architect of Blenheim Palace and Castle Howard in the 1700's.

The ruined castle of Lochranza is wonderfully positioned on a curved shingle spit projecting into the water. Much of what can be seen today is the result of rebuilding in the 16th century, but there are remnants of the original castle built before 1261 for the MacSweens.

Before our short adventure draws to a close we make for the delightful island of Great Cumbrae, home of Britain's smallest cathedral, The Cathedral of the Isles, with its vivid tiles and stained glass.

Leaving Greenock a majestic cruise of Loch Long and Loch Goil allows us to admire the breathtaking scenery of this part of Argyll, ahead of stretching our legs at delightful Lochgoilhead.

A sail south takes us to the late 18th-century Ardgowan House and the remains of the 15th century Ardgowan Castle, before a tour of the Isle of Arran and the Machrie Moor Standing Stones.

From Troon, Dumfries House awaits. Saved by the intervention of The Duke of Rothesay in 2007, the house is one of Britain's most beautiful stately homes with an outstanding collection of 18th century furniture, including examples of Thomas Chippendale.

Boasting an impressive collection of rare rhododendrons, Achamore Gardens welcomes us, before a viewing of the ancient Ogham Stone and sailing to neighbouring Islay, home to the famous Laphroig Distillery. Here we learn of how one of the most distinctive single malts of the world is distilled, ahead of observing the Kildalton Cross.

Prior to exploring Kilmartin Glen and Museum, home to over 800 internationally significant historic sites and monuments dating back over 5,000 years, leisurely strolls can be enjoyed at picturesque Tayvallich and the famous Crinan Canal towpath.

With Oban almost upon us we venture ashore on the island of Kerrera, which stands guard over Oban harbour.

This season's first cruise from Oban allows us to explore the wonderful tapestry of landscapes in the sheltered waters off the west coast of Scotland and experience the diversity that makes this area unique.

Framed amid spectacular scenery at the head of Loch Shiel and where Bonnie Prince Charlie raised his standard to gather the Jacobite Clans, Glenfinnan Monument is host to our first visit. The lone kilted highlander atop the 18m high column surveys the land where the Highland way of life was soon to be cruelly extinguished.

The Glencoe Visitor Centre allows us to learn more of the remarkable history of this imposing landscape, before we explore the modern and sustainable estate of Kingairloch and venture into the Sunart ancient oakwoods for a stroll.

A cruise of the distinctively different Small Isles leads us to Loch Harport from where we enjoy a visit to the local oyster farm.

Loch Coruisk is a magnificent freshwater loch at the heart of the Cuillin and where we can take a stroll ashore, before a cruise of the fjord-like, Loch Hourn.

After reflecting in the tranquil and artist's gardens of Attadale, Britain's remotest pub, The Old Forge at Inverie, provides a welcome retreat in which to enjoy a drink. Our final full day allows us to stretch our legs on the Small Isle of Eigg, before we conclude with a visit to Ardnamurchan Distillery, Scotland's newest, greenest and most westerly mainland distillery.



South to the Atlantic Isles

Tuesday 28th March to Tuesday 4th April 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

With walks ashore, houses and gardens, museums, visitor centres and much more, this delightful cruise of the Atlantic Isles really does have something for everyone.

Departing from Oban, a southerly sail takes us to Ardfern from where we explore Kilmartin Glen and Museum, home to over 800 internationally significant historic sites and monuments dating back over 5,000 years.

After a stretch of legs at picturesque Tayvallich we head south to Gigha and Achamore Gardens. Set in mature and varied woodland, this 54 acre paradise hosts an impressive collection of rare rhododendrons and is home to many other tender plants, culminating in a 2 acre walled garden.

Sailing to the neighbouring whisky island of Islay an exploration of the award winning Ardbeg Distillery awaits, ahead of a leisurely stroll in Jura's only settlement of Craighouse and a visit to Colonsay House Gardens on the island of Colonsay.

Ulva is located to the west of Mull and Sheila's Cottage beckons; a faithful reconstruction of a traditional thatched croft house inhabited by Sheila MacFadyen. Following a glimpse of one of Telford's Parliamentary Churches, we go ashore at Iona to learn of how the island has been a centre of Christian worship since Columba's arrival in AD 563 and how the monastery thrived, despite repeated Viking raids.

The islands of Coll and Muck play host to delightful strolls ashore and the Nadurra Centre educates us on the vast variety of flora and fauna to be found in this part of the world. Our cruise concludes with a visit to the family run Isle of Mull Cheese farm.

Exploring the Small Isles and Inner Sound

Enjoy the comfort and elegance of *Hebridean Princess* as she explores the sheltered and distinctively different Small Isles, together with rugged mainland gems on a cruise of varied adventure.

Sailing the Sound of Mull we head for the Small Isle of Rum and the imposing Kinloch Castle. Built of red sandstone the castle was the first private residence in Scotland to have electricity and is the former home of Lancastrian industrialist Sir George Bullough.


A steam through the Sound of Sleat and Kyle Rhea takes us to the delightful village of Shieldaig before we venture to Inverewe Garden with its Wollemi pines, Himalayan blue poppies, New Zealand olearia, Tasmanian eucalypts and rhododendrons from China, Nepal and the Indian subcontinent.

Over the sea to Skye for a tour of the Trotternish Peninsula before crossing to neighbouring Raasay and Raasay House. Once the seat of Clan MacLeods of Raasay, this historic mansion house has unrivalled views of the Cuillin mountain range.

From the conservation village of Plockton, Attadale Gardens beckon. Started by Baron Schroder in the late 19th century, hill paths meander through 20 acres of conifers and rhododendrons with sculptures lurking in unexpected places.

At the point where three great sea lochs meet our visit to Eilean Donan allows us to discover this iconic castle, before returning to Skye and exploring Armadale Castle and Gardens.

After a wee dram at Britain's remotest pub, The Old Forge, we embrace on some wonderful walks ashore on the Small Isles of Canna and Eigg before our adventure draws to a close.

An Easter Pilgrimage

Tuesday 11th to Tuesday 18th April 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Experience the tranquillity of the Isle of Iona and its restored abbey on Easter Sunday and discover the uniquely different Small Isles as well as a farewell Champagne reception at historic Duart Castle.

Our exploration begins with a stretch of legs on the Small Isle of Eigg before continuing to St Columba's church on neighbouring Canna.

Ahead of a welcome drink at The Old Forge, Britain's remotest mainland pub, Kinloch Castle, the first private residence in Scotland to have electricity, awaits our arrival.

With its colourful sea front buildings, Tobermory is the Georgian capital of the island of Mull and we have the opportunity to explore, but beforehand Telford's Parliamentary Church and Sheila's Cottage on tiny Ulva beckon.

A sail round the Ross of Mull, and past the rich wildlife communities of the Treshnish Isles, takes us to Staffa where we board a local boat to land ashore and meet the resident puffins and walk into Fingal's Cave.

Easter Sunday takes us to the holy Isle of Iona, where we join the Easter Sunday service at the restored abbey, followed by a visit to Colonsay House Gardens. Planted in the 1930's the rhododendron and woodland garden is considered to be one of the finest in Scotland.

With Oban almost in sight our beach landing craft take us ashore at Oronsay, designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest and Special Protection Area.

Our cruise culminates with a Champagne reception at Duart Castle. hosted by Chieftan of Clan Maclean, Sir Lachlan Maclean.





Away to the Western Isles

Tuesday 2nd to Tuesday 9th May 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Wonder at the contrasts of Scotland's isles, from the Inner Hebridean islands of Mull and Skye to the Outer Isles of Barra, Vatersay, Benbecula, Harris and Lewis.

A leisurely cruise of the Sea of the Hebrides takes us to the most southerly inhabited island of the Outer Hebrides, Vatersay, where we land ashore using our beach landing craft. Heading north, to neighbouring Eriskay, we tour South Uist, Benbecula and North Uist, visiting Barpa Langass and Pobhull Finn, including a picnic ashore, before re-joining Hebridean Princess in Lochmaddy.


Arriving at Tarbert, on the Isle of Harris, an exploration of the island beckons, including a call at the ancient church of St Clement's, built in the 1500's, before heading to Stornoway and the more recently constructed Lews Castle Museum.

Located on the edge of the Outer Isles are the uninhabited Shiant Isles and, from the comfort of *Hebridean Princess*, we admire the thousands of breeding seabirds and puffins, but beforehand on Lewis, a journey to the famous standing stones at Callanish and the 2,000 year old Carloway Broch awaits.

Skye is the largest of the Western Isles and from Loch Dunvegan we discover Dunvegan Castle, the oldest continuously inhabited castle in Scotland and 800 year ancestral home of the Chiefs of Clan MacLeod, ahead of a cruise of the west coast of the island.

Our final full day allows us to enjoy scenic strolls on the beautiful island of Muck, prior to calling at the colourful town of Tobermory where we can indulge in some last minute shopping.

Nature's Island Paradise

Tuesday 9th to Tuesday 16th May 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Experience the great wilderness of north-west Scotland as we visit the seabird colonies of Handa Island and the Shiant Isles, make a beach landing to observe red deer and go in search of seals on Skye.

Our first day requires decisions! Local boats will be available to take us to Lunga, an island designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest and where Atlantic grey seals and birdlife are abundant. Alternatively, explore the restored Benedictine abbey on Iona.

On Mull we make a second choice; either the densely-planted garden of Lip na Cloiche or a ranger-led visit to view Britain's largest and most impressive bird of prey, the white-tailed eagle.


Boarding the beachcraft, a landing on the Small Isle of Rum takes us in search of its resident red deer, before a cruise of the Sound of Sleat and Kyle Rhea.

From Gairloch we visit Inverewe Garden where we enjoy the magnificent planting and rare species found here, prior to stretching our legs on the largest of the Summer Isles, Tanera Mòr.

Onwards to Handa Island and the Shiant Isles, both internationally important breeding colonies, before continuing across The Minch to the Outer Isles.

The Balranald RSPB Reserve on North Uist allows us to observe the birds nesting on the flower-rich machair and croft-land including, hopefully, the elusive Corncrake. Next we take a boat trip to view the resident seal population in the shadow of Dunvegan Castle.

A cruise of the west coast of Skye is enjoyed on our final morning and our cruise concludes with walks on the Small Isle of Muck.

Footloose to Barra Head

Tuesday 23rd to Tuesday 30th May 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Our first Footloose adventure of 2017 takes us around the northern tip of Skye and over The Minch to the most southerly of the Outer Hebrides, the Bishop's Isles, where we land by beach craft onto the white sands of this remote archipelago. As with all our Footloose cruises, there are less energetic visits for those who prefer a more relaxed pace.

After departing from Oban we stretch our legs at Inverie, the largest settlement in mainland Britain not connected to the road network, before berthing at Kyle of Lochalsh for walks ashore or an excursion to the most photographed castle in Britain, the iconic Eilean Donan.

Plockton is a conservation village and we explore here on foot ahead of our first island visit to Raasay, the 'Isle of Roe Deer'. On Skye a full day walk is the order of the day whilst the strollers enjoy a tour of the Trotternish Peninsula.

After cruising The Minch, berthing in Lochboisdale engages a full day walk on The Uists; alternatively, strollers may choose to visit Kildonan Museum and follow in the footsteps of Bonnie Prince Charlie at Prince's Bay, Eriskay.

From Castlebay, Barra we explore Vatersay on foot and board the beachcraft, Kiloran and Calgary, for a landing on one of the uninhabited Bishop's Isles. The most active guests may rise to the challenge of An Sgùrr on the Small Isle of Eigg ahead of our last visit to the colourful, Georgian capital of Mull, Tobermory.



The Atlantic Outliers of St Kilda

Tuesday 30th May to Tuesday 6th June 2017

This is the first of two visits to the remote archipelago of St

Kilda, the United Kingdom's only double UNESCO World

Heritage Site. Lying approximately 120 miles off the west

coast of mainland Scotland, man lived here in the harshest

Cruising north we appreciate the dramatic scenery of Loch Coruisk, lying

at the foot of the Black Cuillin on Skye. Our voyage continues through

Kyle Rhea and the Inner Sound to Shieldaig from where we drive the

Bealach na Bà, rising over 2,000 feet to the Applecross Peninsula.



From Gairloch we enjoy a late afternoon visit to Inverewe Garden. Perched on a peninsula at the edge of Loch Ewe, Inverewe is widely regarded as one of the most beautiful gardens in Scotland.

Before the uninhabited bird sanctuary of Isle Martin, the dramatic Corrieshalloch Gorge National Nature Reserve, a deep tree-shrouded chasm cutting through a highland wilderness rich in flora and fauna, beckons.

En-route to Stornoway, where the historic sites of Carloway Broch and the standing stones at Callanish await, a beach landing on the privately owned Shiant Isles allows us to observe the myriad of breeding seabirds, including colourful puffins.

Sailing overnight to St Kilda we arrive in the early morning to cruise between the seabird colonies of Stac Lee and Boreray, ahead of anchoring in Village Bay. Weather permitting we land on the main island of Hirta to explore the abandoned 19th century village.

The Macneil stronghold of Kisimul Castle, guarding the entrance to Castle Bay, provides a break in our journey home across the Sea of the Hebrides.

Hidden Gardens of the **Highlands and Islands**

Tuesday 6th to Tuesday 13th June 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

The western seaboard of Scotland is home to some of the finest gardens in Europe, where unusual and exotic plants flourish in the warm climate of the North Atlantic Drift. Many were planted in the Victorian era and designed to complement grand country homes, whilst others were secluded on the most beautiful of Hebridean islands.

Visiting An Cala Garden we embrace the romantic heyday of the 1930's with its colourful borders, natural rockeries and meandering streams. Arduaine is our next port of call where 20 acres of wonderful gardens are now under the supervision of the National Trust for Scotland.

Steaming south to Loch Sween we go ashore at the pretty village of Tayvallich and on Gigha we explore Achamore Gardens, hosting an impressive collection of rare rhododendron that thrives in the island's warm microclimate.

By contrast, the softer setting of the idyllic garden at Colonsay House awaits, before we head to the hidden gem of Lip na Cloiche, a private and self made garden in an extremely remote location.

Journeying to Attadale Gardens we enjoy the skilful restoration by owner Nick MacPherson, following the 1980 storm, and a cruise to Skye takes us to Armadale Castle where the 40 acre gardens attractively balance the Gothic mansion ruins.

The ancient oakwoods at Sunart permit the stretching of legs, before a visit to the Ardtornish Estate and Gardens on the Morvern Peninsula.

Our final foray is to Ardchattan Priory, where there has been a garden since the 13th century.

St Kilda, Islands on the Edge

Tuesday 13th to Tuesday 20th June 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners


Made up of five islands and three stacs, this is our second visit to St Kilda. Whilst the Double UNESCO World Heritage Site is the highlight of the cruise there are other ancient sites, medieval castles, an oyster farm distillery and seabird cliffs to enjoy.

Heading north our first port of call is the Sunart ancient oakwood, one of the very few such forests remaining in Europe, and on to the community owned Isle of Eigg. A full day on Skye includes a visit to the oyster farm in Loch Harport before our day ends at Dunvegan Castle, home of Clan MacLeod and an excellent location to observe the resident seal population.

Onwards to Harris for an island tour and Tweed weaving demonstration ahead of a gentle cruise past the Shiant Isles, with sea cliffs festooned with nesting seabirds.

On Lewis we discover the ancient standing stones at Callanish and traditional Black Houses, in addition to learning about the 300 year history of Lews Castle at the Lews Castle Museum.

Steaming overnight to St Kilda, we cruise beneath the seabird cliffs of Stac Lee and Boreray to Village Bay on the main island of Hirta. Here, weather permitting, we land ashore to explore the now preserved village, abandoned 86 years previously. An afternoon sail takes us to Barra and Castlebay, home to the Macneil stronghold of Kisimul Castle, which stands guard over the entrance to the bay. We conclude our voyage by crossing the Sea of the Hebrides en-route to our home port of Oban.



Historic Castles and Glorious Gardens

Tuesday 20th to Tuesday 27th June 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

The rich history of this deeply rooted region is unwrapped with this seven night cruise of stunning ancient castles and breathtaking, early summer gardens carried out in true Hebridean Princess style.

Arduaine Garden allows us to explore 20 acres of outstanding woodland plants under a canopy of Japanese larch, before exploring Colonsay House Gardens, considered to be one of the finest rhododendron gardens in Scotland.

We learn the history of Christianity at the restored Benedictine abbey on Iona, ahead of a visit to the densely planted Lip na Cloiche Garden, with stunning views of Loch Tuath and the Isle of Ulva.

Following a cruise of the Small Isles, Loch Dunvegan is where we enjoy the delights of the 5 acres of formal castle gardens, and as we admire the work of Osgood MacKenzie at Inverewe Garden we compare the feel of Attadale Gardens, with its waterfall and sunken fernery.

Onwards to the Isle of Rum and the Edwardian folly that is Kinloch Castle, built in 1901 by Lancaster industrialist George Bullough. We relive MacDonald clan history at Armadale Castle where the 40 acre gardens attractively balance the Gothic mansion ruins.

Ardtornish Estate spreads out around Loch Aline and is set against a backdrop of heather glens, babbling rivers and stunning shorelines. Here we discover the garden which has been sculpted out of a rocky hillside and boasts extensive views to the hills of Mull. We conclude our voyage with a Champagne reception at Duart Castle, hosted by the Chieftain of Clan MacLean, Sir Lachlan MacLean.

Footloose through the Irish Sea

Tuesday 27th June to Tuesday 4th July 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

For our second Footloose adventure of the season we venture south from Oban to capture the magical and mysterious spirit of three different cultures bound by their Celtic roots.

Our first foray ashore is on the whisky isle of Islay for walks or a visit to Laphroaig Distillery to sample this distinctive, peaty single malt. As we cruise the North Channel, the coast of Northern Ireland comes into view and we land at Bangor for a full day walk or excursion to Grey Abbey House, to enjoy lunch at the home of the Montgomery family since 1607. The third Celtic nation beckons as we arrive in Peel and the Isle of Man's mythological sea god, Manannan, welcomes us to his fascinating kingdom and guides us through its rich Celtic, Viking and maritime past. From Port St Mary we travel by steam train to explore the ancient capital of Castletown whilst walkers head off for a full day walk. Our final Manx visit is to the famous Laxey Wheel, designed in 1854 by the Victorian engineer, Robert Casement, to pump water from Glen Mooar, part of the Great Laxey Mines industrial complex.

Relaxing on board we cruise the Irish Sea on passage to Port Ryan where the walkers amongst us stretch our legs and the strollers appreciate the delights of the plantsman's paradise at Logan Botanic Garden, before landing on the privately owned Sanda Island.

The pretty Isle of Jura allows us to ramble to the island's only settlement at Craighouse ahead of a final and gentle stroll along the canal towpath at Crinan.

At the head of Loch Sween, the picturesque village of Tavyallich awaits our arrival before we cross to pretty island of Jura for walks at Craighouse, the island's only settlement. On neighbouring Islay we sample the distinctive, peaty malt whisky at Laphroaig Distillery and conclude our day by enjoying a performance by musicians from the Cantilena Festival.

A cruise of the narrow Sound of Islay takes us to Colonsay where we can explore Colonsay House Gardens, owned by the Strathcona family, before landing on the sacred island of Iona, birthplace of Christianity in Scotland. A local boat takes us to Staffa and Fingal's Cave with its spectacular hexagonal basalt columns; its sheer size and eerie sounds produced by the waves has encouraged legends and modern art.



Voyage to the Northern Isles

Monday 10th to Wednesday 19th July 2017 9 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Heading north our voyage takes us to the contrasting worlds of Orkney and Shetland. Nordic in culture and heritage these archipelagos are separated from mainland Scotland by the Pentland Firth. Ruled by the Scandinavian crown until 1468 they are distinctly different and full of hidden gems.

From Oban we round the most westerly point of the British mainland and sail through the Sound of Sleat and Kyle Rhea to stretch our legs on the Isle of Raasay. Cruising the scenic coast of Sutherland we appreciate the colourful displays at Inverewe Gardens, with a majestic setting on the water's edge of Loch Ewe. Rounding Cape Wrath, a Site of Special Scientific Interest and a Special Protection Area for birds, we steam the north coast to Scrabster from where we visit the Castle of Mey, providing HRH The Duke of Rothesay is not in residence.

Orkney beckons and we observe the islands' neolithic history at the pre-historic village of Skara Brae. We enjoy a tour of the island of Sanday with a local ranger, before landing on Fair Isle where our options are the bird observatory or South Lighthouse. Sailing for the most northerly point of Great Britain, the sub-arctic archipelago of Shetland, our port of call is Lerwick to explore the Shetland Museum and the restored lighthouse buildings and bird observatory at Sumburgh Head.

Returning to Orkney the spectacular Vat of Kirbister at Stronsay beckons en-route to the mainland and the local heritage museum at Wick. We reflect on our Orcadian adventure as our voyage concludes in Invergordon.



Stavanger and the Scenic **Southern Fjords**

Wednesday 19th or Friday 21st to Saturday 29th July 2017 10/8 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Cradled in deep valleys and carved by retreating glaciers flowing to the sea, the Norwegian fjords are a miracle of nature. Approaching this magical region from Stavanger we enter a spellbinding landscape of cascading waterfalls, snow-capped peaks and mighty glaciers.

Choose to join *Hebridean Princess* in Invergordon and cross the North Sea, or fly to Stavanger and embark in Sandnes. Sailing south to Lysefjord Hebridean Princess negotiates the tight turn into this narrow gorge, past the soaring Pulpit Rock. Passing spectacular waterfalls, tumbling into the dark waters below, we make for Lysebotn at the head of the fjord and take a panoramic drive to Øygardstøl.

A city tour of Stavanger allows us to explore this fascinating port, with its old town and largest concentration of 18th century timber buildings in Europe. The little fishing town of Skudeneshavn is our next port of call where we discover the fascinating history of Norwegian life. The island of Karmøy tells us about the sovereigns who controlled the coast of Norway at the Nordvegen History Centre at Avaldsnes.

A morning at leisure in Espavær is enjoyed ahead of our excursion to the Stord Maritime Museum in Leirvik, and a scenic cruise of Norway's second longest fjord, Hardanger and the steep-sided Fykesund fjord. Norheimsund plays host to our exploration of the Hardanger Maritime Museum before appreciating the dramatic 5,000 year old Folgefonna Glacier.

Bound for the island of Lysøen, the summer home of the eccentric 19th century violinist Ole Bull awaits and our voyage concludes with a city tour of Hanseatic Bergen.

Bergen and the Spectacular Western Fjords

Saturday 29th July to Tuesday 8th August 2017

10 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Through the rocky isles, islets and skerries north of Bergen lies the world's second longest and deepest fjord, the ethereal Sognefjord. Further north the unexplored Geiranger Fjord and the art-nouveau town of Ålesund conceal a host of hidden treasures. Cruise into the superlative majesty of Norway in inimitable Hebridean style.

Embark in the picturesque port of Bergen and cruise northwards into the sublime scenery of Fensfjord and Sognefjord en-route to Florø for a visit to the local coastal museum. At the fishing town of Måløy we enjoy a walking tour before heading to the island of Selje and its ancient monastic settlement. A relaxing cruise of the steepsided Storfjord leads us to Eidsdal at the elbow with the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Geiranger fjord, perhaps the most spectacular fjord in Norway, allowing a full day exploration.

A day in Ålesund unveils this 'Pearl of the North', destroyed by fire in 1904 and rebuilt in unusual art-nouveau style, ahead of a spectacular glacier trip from Olden at the head of Nordefjord. Heading south we cruise into Sognefjord and embark on a walking tour of the village of Eivindvik with its ancient history and centuries old church.

Onwards to the island of Lysøen, the 'Island of Light', and the holiday villa of the eccentric 19th century violinist Ole Bull, before concluding our voyage with a tour of the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Bryggen, the old wharf of Bergen, a reminder of the town's importance as part of the Hanseatic League's trading empire from the 14th to the mid-16th century.

Nordic Odyssey

Tuesday 8th to Wednesday 16th or Friday 18th August 2017 8/10 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

This enchanting cruise goes deep into the heart of Norway's fjordland, revealing a landscape of pine-clad mountains and placid blue-green waters, fertile farmland and fruit-filled orchards, waterfalls and icy rivers sprung from glaciers.

Our journey starts with a tour of the colourful city of Bergen. Onwards through Bjørnafjord to Hardanger, Norway's second longest fjord known as the Orchard of Norway. We follow its course to Jondal to wonder at the dramatic Folgefonna Glacier and watch craftsmen in the smithy and making ropes and wooden boats at the Hardanger Maritime Museum.


Sailing through Bømlafjord, en-route for the homeland of the Viking Kings, Haugesund, we visit the local museum and church. On the island of Karmøy we learn about the sovereigns who controlled the coast of Norway at the Nordvegen History Centre, ahead of a cruise picture-postcard Vindafjord. The Ryfylke Museum preserves a unique cultural heritage through its collection of 70 historic buildings, most of which are located where they were originally built. At Jelsa we visit the white, wooden church built in 1647.

Sailing south to Jøsenfjord and Lysefjord, *Hebridean Princess* negotiates the tight turn into this narrow gorge, past the soaring Pulpit Rock. We pass spectacular waterfalls as we make for Lysebotn to take a panoramic drive to Øygardstøl.

A tour of Stavanger and some free time allows us to explore this fascinating port, with its old town and the largest concentration of 18th century timber buildings in Europe. Sadly guests returning home by air disembark in Sandnes and those opting to return to Invergordon can reflect on their adventure as we steam the North Sea.

Rounding Cape Wrath, Lochinver presents a walk to take in the spectacular views of the Assynt Peninsula, or there is a visit to the innovative Highland Stoneware Pottery. Continuing south, along the scenic Sutherland coast, we spend a full day in Ullapool so walkers can tackle Knockan Crag, designated as a National Nature Reserve, whilst strollers visit the box canyon at Corrieshalloch Gorge and the award-winning Ullapool Museum.

The Isle of Raasay plays host to our next port of call where we explore on foot, or visit Raasay House where Boswell and Johnson stayed during their historic journey to the Western Isles in 1773. Later, the iconic Eilean Donan Castle beckons or we can ramble and appreciate the views to the hills of Skye beyond. The final day is spent at Armadale Castle, with its historic gardens and woodland trails, and on the Small Isle of Muck we roam in the peaceful and unspoilt Scottish countryside.





Unwind in Iona Abbey, one of the world's most historic and venerated religious sites, before continuing past Staffa, site of Fingal's Cave, formed entirely from basalt columns, similar in structure to the Giant's Causeway.

As we enjoy a morning ashore on the tiny, oval shaped island of Ulva we explore Sheila's Cottage Museum, documenting the history of the island, and the T-shaped church designed by Thomas Telford and built in 1828. Our final destination is Coll; this bird haven, picturesquely clad in flower dotted machair and fringed with silverwhite beaches, offers refreshing cycle rides and tranquil walks.



Unwind as *Hebridean Princess* sails far across the Sea of the Hebrides to the beautiful Outer Isles of North Uist, Harris and Lewis where we are free to explore the remote, wild landscapes and absorb the breathtaking scenery.

On Rum we visit Kinloch Castle, the first private residence in Scotland to have electricity, whilst on Skye we enter Loch Scavaig for walks to the spectacular Loch Coruisk, shadowed by the Cuillin ridge. Heading north, we pause at Loch Dunvegan and savour the wealth of history at the castle, the oldest continuously inhabited castle in Scotland which has been the ancestral home of the Chiefs of Clan MacLeod for 800 years, before we cross the Little Minch to Lochmaddy. A tour of North Uist includes the 5,000 year old burial chamber Barpa Langass and the dramatic stone circle of Pobull Fhinn.

On Harris we tour the island's newly opened distillery and enjoy a weaving demonstration of the world famous Harris Tweed. Landing on the beach at the Shiant Isles we venture on foot in the hope of spotting species of wildlife for which they are renowned. Continuing to Lewis the Iron Age structure of Carloway Broch, designed to impress and defend more than 2,000 years ago, awaits along with the Standing Stones of Callanish and the traditional Black Houses.

Returning to the mainland, the pretty conservation village of Shieldaig beckons ahead of our excursion to the iconic Eilean Donan Castle. Our voyage concludes with walks on the peaceful haven of Muck, and a lesson in traditional, farmhouse cheese-making at the Isle of Mull Cheese farm.



This cruise along the rugged Sutherland coast will appeal to lovers of real tranquillity. The dramatic coastline is noted for its wild beauty and is peppered with scenic lochs and remote mainland villages, a real feast for the senses.


Embrace a kaleidoscope of landscapes as *Hebridean Princess* steams from the Sound of Mull, through the scenic Kyles en-route for glorious Loch Carron and strolls through the picture-postcard village of Plockton. From the scenic Loch Ewe we travel to Inverewe Garden, ablaze with autumn hues, and onwards to the largest of the enchanted Summer Isles – Tanera Mòr where we call at the private post office selling collectors stamps.

Experience the rugged splendour of Sutherland along the silent banks of Loch a'Cháirn Bhàin and the hand made manufacture of ceramics at the Highland Pottery, Lochinver. Contrast the ambience of the fishing port of Ullapool and the coppered cleft of Corrieshalloch Gorge and Measach Falls. Cruising southwards we make for the Isle of Raasay, lying between Skye and the mainland, for a visit to Raasay House which played host to Boswell and Johnson in 1773.

Our berth at Kyle of Lochalsh allows us to venture to Attadale Gardens with its impressive collection of sculptures. Homewardbound we return through Kyle Rhea and the Sound of Sleat, as we call at the Small Isles of Canna, for walks on the island, and the nature reserve of Rum where the lavishly built Kinloch Castle lives on as a fitting memorial to more frivolous Edwardian days.



Call of the Emerald Isle

The very world 'Gaelic' conjures up poetic images of myth and legend; capture the magical and mysterious spirit of the Emerald Isle and immerse yourself in Gaelic history and culture on this unforgettable voyage of discovery.

Ashore on the whisky isle of Islay, sample the single malt created by generations of Bowmore craftsmen on a distillery tour en-route to Lough Foyle. Sailing to the head of the lough, with Northern Ireland to port and Eire to starboard, we take a city tour of Londonderry with its old walled town and newly opened Peace Bridge. From Port Rush discover the ruined 18th century mansion of the eccentric Earl Bishop at Downhill Demesne and learn about the reality of life in the rural 17th century cottage of Hezlett House, both now in the care of The National Trust.

Experience breathtaking scenery as we cruise the Antrim coast to the vibrant city of Belfast and Queen's Island, birthplace of RMS Titanic and the Titanic Exhibition. Continuing our voyage south we reach our second border town, Carlingford, a hub of heritage and folklore on the shores of Carlingford Lough. From Strangford Lough, designated an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, we explore historic Mount Stewart House, ancestral home of the Marquesses of Londonderry and set in spectacular gardens.

On the north east coast of Antrim, The Giant's Causeway was volcanically created 65 million years ago and declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1986. Homeward-bound for Oban we reflect on our Irish adventure.



Outlook on the Outer Isles

Tuesday 19th to Tuesday 26th September 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

The Hebrides form a paradise of hundreds of islands and islets set like precious stones off the North West coast of Scotland, each astoundingly different. Splendid in their isolation, timeless and surreal, their beauty is infinite, ever-changing with the day and season.

Departing from Oban and venturing round Ardnamurchan, we spend the morning cruising north through Kyle Rhea to the Brightwater Visitor Centre to learn about the natural and cultural history of Eilean Bàn, once

home to author Gavin Maxwell. From the island capital of Portree we take a tour of Skye's spectacular Trotternish Peninsula, re-joining the ship in Uig before sailing across The Minch to Harris.

After a weaving demonstration of the world famous Harris Tweed we voyage to Lochmaddy and explore the 5,000 year old burial chamber Barpa Langass and the dramatic stone circle known as Pobull Fhinn. We follow in the footsteps of Bonnie Prince Charlie at Prince's Bay and enjoy a welcome refreshment at the Am Politician, Eriskay's only public house. Ahead of our return across the Sea of the Hebrides, walks on the most southerly of the inhabited Outer Isles, Vatersay, await.

On Tiree we unearth the story of the Skerryvore Lighthouse at the museum housed in the old shore station at Hynish. The holy isle of Iona was chosen by St Columba in AD 563 to introduce Christianity to Scotland, here we absorb the restored Benedictine abbey and ruined nunnery before concluding our cruise in the peaceful woodland gardens of Colonsay House.



Year of History, Heritage and Archaelogy

Tuesday 26th September to Tuesday 3rd October 2017 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

2017 is a year that celebrates Scotland's historic environment and past. This cruise offers an opportunity to discover the spectacular landscapes of the Hebrides, visit archaeological sites, soak up rich culture and enjoy breathtaking scenery as we sail sublime coastlines.

At Finlaggan we explore the ancient sites where the installation of the Lords of the Isles took place in the 14th and 15th centuries, before sailing the Sound of Islay and past the Garvellachs. Kilmartin Glen, famous for its rich archaeological legacy, contains 800 ancient monuments including burial cairns, rock carvings, and standing stones.

On Tiree we discover the story of the Skerryvore Lighthouse and look forward to a tour of the Uists to discover the 5,000 year old burial chamber of Barpa Langass and the dramatic stone circle known as Pobull Fhinn. The Isle of Lewis is steeped in history and some of its secrets are revealed during our island tour of the traditional Black Houses, the 2,000 year old Carloway Broch and the ancient standing stones at Callanish.

Returning over The Minch, the Isle of Skye beckons as we go ashore at Armadale to uncover the history of the Highlands and Islands through the story of Clan Donald, its most powerful clan, at Armadale Castle. Our final port of call is the Isle of Eigg; its rich past is marked by Iron age forts, a 6th century church, Viking burial mounds and a graveyard that is moving testament to the 395 MacDonalds massacred in a cave by the McLeods in 1577.


A steam through the Sound of Sleat and Kyle Rhea takes us to the delightful village of Shieldaig before we venture to Inverewe Garden with its Wollemi pines, Himalayan blue poppies, New Zealand olearia, Tasmanian eucalypts and rhododendrons from China, Nepal and the Indian subcontinent.

Over the sea to Skye for a tour of the Trotternish Peninsula before crossing to neighbouring Raasay and Raasay House. Once the seat of Clan MacLeods of Raasay, this historic mansion house has unrivalled views of the Cuillin mountain range.

From the conservation village of Plockton, Attadale Gardens beckon. Started by Baron Schroder in the late 19th century, hill paths meander through 20 acres of conifers and rhododendrons with sculptures lurking in unexpected places.

At the point where three great sea lochs meet our visit to Eilean Donan allows us to discover this iconic castle, before returning to Skye and exploring Armadale Castle and Gardens.

After a wee dram at Britain's remotest pub, The Old Forge, we embrace on some wonderful walks ashore on the Small Isles of Canna and Eigg before our adventure draws to a close.





Houses and Castles of the Clyde

Tuesday 31st October to Tuesday 7th November 2017


The Clyde has a long and often turbulent history against a backdrop of stunning scenery evoking mystery and romance. On this ever popular cruise embrace architectural gems from medieval castles to grand mansions, some of which are still family homes today.

From Greenock we travel to Finlaystone House and are welcomed by the MacMillan family, ahead of cruising Britain's longest sea loch, Loch Fyne. Going ashore at Strachur we visit Ardkinglas House, designed by Sir Robert Lorimar and built in 1905, before travelling to Strachur House, residence of Sir Charles and Lady McLean.

The fairytale Inveraray Castle, seat of the Dukes of Argyll, opens the private apartments for us before a relaxing sail through the Kyles of Bute to Largs and a visit to the sumptuous and privately owned Ardgowan House. On the Isle of Arran we enjoy an exclusive tour of Brodick Castle.

Dumfries House was saved by the intervention of His Royal Highness, The Prince Charles, Duke of Rothesay in 2007 and combines the neoclassical architecture of Robert Adam with the furniture of Thomas Chippendale; here we spend a full day with lunch on the estate.

Seating barely 100 people and built in 1851, on land owned by the Boyle family, The Cathedral of the Isles on Great Cumbrae is reputed to be Britain's smallest cathedral. Mount Stuart is testament to generations of Stuart passion and flamboyance and as we explore this wondrous structure, with its labyrinth of gardens, we learn of how this neo-gothic mansion was one of the most technologically advanced houses of its age.

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

Highlights of the Firth of Clyde

Tuesday 7th to Saturday 11th November 2017 4 nights including 1 Gala Dinner This cruise also departs on 6th March 2017

The relaxing ambience of Hebridean Princess allows us to enjoy the beauty of some of the lower Clyde islands on this cruise which encompasses history, heritage, a distillery and delightful walks ashore.

Sailing into mysterious Holy Loch our first visit is to Historic Kilmun and the Argyll Mausoleum. Built in 1790 the Argyll Mausoleum was constructed to house the remains of the Dukes and Earls of Argyll, Chiefs of the Clan Campbell and their families.

Travelling south we are welcomed to the privately owned Mount Stuart House, held by the Stuart family since the early 15th century.

The gardens at The National Trust for Scotland's Brodick Castle date back to 1710 and offer a glimpse into another world and another time, whilst the country park provides waymarked routes that extend for up to a mile.

Returning to the mainland we discover the oldest independent familyowned distillery in Scotland - Springbank, where many of the ancient distilling methods are still applied in the distillery today.

Onwards to the privately owned island of Sanda, designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest for its importance to both migrating and breeding birds and which is home to the first bird observatory on the west coast of Scotland.

Our cruise concludes with a circumnavigation of the imposing island of Ailsa Craig, once guarried for its blue hone granite used in the making of curling stones, but now home to vast numbers of gannets and an increasing population of puffins.



After a leisurely walk on neighbouring Little Cumbrae, the sumptuous and privately owned Ardgowan House awaits our arrival. The Ardgowan estate has been held by the Stewart family since the early 15th century and the present house dates to 1797.

Mount Stuart is testament to generations of Stuart passion and flamboyance. As we explore this wondrous gothic structure and its labyrinth of gardens, we learn of how this neo-gothic mansion was one of the most technologically advanced houses of its age.

The tiny Holy Isle allows us to take a stroll ashore, ahead of a tour of the Isle of Arran. Affectionately known as 'Scotland in miniature', this vibrant island is considered to possess the great qualities of Scotland.

With its magnificent mountainside setting, Benmore Botanic Garden boasts a world-famous collection of plants. Established in 1863, we are welcomed by an impressive avenue of giant redwoods which now stand over 50 metres high.

Our final afternoon is spent cruising the Upper Clyde and learning of how this mighty river was once so significant for industry and trade.





Our reservations staff can advise and arrange flights from most UK airports to the airport nearest to your port of embarkation in order to meet with our coach transfer.

Rail

We can arrange standard or first class rail travel from/to your local UK railway station, together with seat reservations where available, to the station nearest to the port of embarkation in order to meet with our coach transfer.

Airports and railway stations

For cruises starting and/or ending in Oban and Greenock the nearest transport terminals are Glasgow Central Railway Station and Glasgow International Airport.

For cruises starting and/or ending in Invergordon the nearest transport terminals are Inverness Railway Station and Inverness Airport.

Private coach transfers

Guests travelling by rail or air to embark in Greenock, Oban or Invergordon will be collected at the railway stations or airports listed and transported by coach to join Hebridean Princess.

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On board A-Z

Animals

We regret that no animals are permitted on board the vessel other than assistance dogs accompanying disabled passengers.

Binoculars

Wildlife lovers may wish to bring binoculars as there are only a limited number on board for loan.

Communications

There are iPads in the Library and Wi-Fi access is available.

Mobile phones should be switched off in public rooms. The cellular system in the Highlands and Islands is somewhat patchy and reception can be irregular.

In an emergency, the ship can be reached by satellite phone, full details of which will be forwarded prior to your cruise.

Dining and restaurant arrangements

The Columba Restaurant is sufficiently large for all guests to dine at the same time. The majority of tables are for two, but should guests wish to dine together we shall be delighted to reserve a table for a maximum of eight. Guests travelling on their own will be seated at a larger table, usually hosted by an Officer, unless they indicate otherwise.

Special diets: We can cater for most dietary preferences, with the exception of strict kosher and one or two other regimes. Special requests should be included in the Pre-Cruise Questionnaire; our reservations staff will be pleased to advise you.

Dress and footwear

Daytime: During the day dress is casual. It is advisable to bring suitable clothing for the area in which you will be cruising.

Evening: For dinner in the evening, guests prefer to dress more formally, with a jacket and tie for gentlemen and the equivalent for ladies.

Gala evenings: The recommended dress code for Gala evenings is black tie for gentlemen and evening wear for ladies, although this is by no means mandatory.

On these evenings, the Officers will wear formal dress. The number of Gala evenings depends on the length of the cruise, but as a guideline, two formal Gala Dinners will be held during a seven-night cruise.

Footwear: Non-slip shoes should be worn on deck and in the ship's small boats when going ashore. Some cruises visit remote locations where heavy-soled shoes or walking boots are recommended for shore visits and serious walking.

Footloose cruises: In addition to walking boots, we recommend that guests protect themselves against the unpredictable weather with waterproof clothing; we would stress that jeans are considered unsuitable. A reasonably sized rucksack would also be useful.

Electricity supply

The electricity supply on *Hebridean Princess* is 240v AC and standard UK 3-pin sockets are provided in cabins. If guests wish to use 110v equipment, a transformer will be required - a limited supply is available on board for loan. The ship also carries adaptors for European and US style plugs, obtainable from the Housekeeper.

Going ashore

Since many of the places on our itineraries are unsuitable for berthing alongside, *Hebridean Princess* is equipped with sturdy and seaworthy tenders to transport guests ashore. Buoyancy aids are provided and must be worn in all small boat operations. Please note, however, that use of the ship's tenders does require a certain degree of agility. If in doubt, guests with physical disabilities and elderly or infirm passengers should contact our reservations staff before booking.

Our itineraries are planned to allow frequent visits ashore to interesting and unusual places, but participation is by no means compulsory. The emphasis is on pleasing one's self. As alternatives, we can usually suggest an independent stroll or a more serious walk ashore, perhaps a bike ride or, as many guests have discovered, the relaxation of staying on board.

Gratuities

Hebridean operates a 'no tipping' policy.

Hebridean shop

There is a small shop on board selling souvenirs and a basic supply of essentials. Cigarettes and tobacco products are not sold on board. As many of the areas we visit are remote, it may not be possible to purchase specialised items such as specific camera equipment, batteries, etc.

On board leisure

Hebridean Princess boasts a well-stocked library, and a card and games area with a range of board games, jigsaws, chess and backgammon. Gym equipment is available on the Waterfront Deck. There is no organised gambling, apart from the occasional 'frog race' to raise money for charity. Each cabin is equipped with satellite television; should you wish to view a DVD in your cabin, a number of DVD players are available for this purpose and DVDs may be borrowed from the Library.

Payment of shipboard accounts

The currency on board is pounds sterling. Payment of shipboard accounts may be made in sterling, either debit or credit Visa or Mastercards, or cheques; sterling travellers cheques are also accepted.

Sailing

Most sailing on *Hebridean Princess* is scheduled to take place over breakfast and lunch, apart from overnight sailings to St. Kilda. Smaller ships tend to have a certain amount of vibration and some noise is inevitable when the main engines are running. At night, a sound insulated generator supplies domestic power to the vessel.

Smoking

Smoking is not allowed inside the vessel at any time and is not permitted in cabins. Smoking is allowed only on the outer decks, and guests occupying balcony cabins are asked to show consideration to other balcony users.

Stairs

Please note that there are no lifts (elevators) on board Hebridean Princess and, although well equipped with handrails, some of the ship's stairways are steep, particularly those from the Princess Deck to the Waterfront and Hebridean Decks.

Valuables

A small safe is provided in your cabin to secure valuables. Hebridean cannot accept any responsibility for loss or damage to guests' valuables.

What you need to know

Disabled facilities

If wheelchair users wish to cruise with us, they must be accompanied by a fare-paying able-bodied companion to assist them on board and ashore. Wheelchair access may be limited. Entrances to the vessel have raised coamings and almost all cabins have a raised lip or step from bedroom to bathroom. Please note that bedroom doors are no wider than 70cm. As the vessel does not carry a supply of narrow wheelchairs for general use, guests should check that their own chair is of a suitable width.

Although well equipped with handrails, some of the ship's stairways are steep, particularly those from the Princess Deck to the Waterfront and Hebridean Decks. As there are no lifts (elevators), the severely disabled or handicapped may find their enjoyment of the cruise impaired if they experience difficulty in moving between decks and over coamings between cabins and bathrooms.

Fitness on board and ashore

Many of our visits ashore call for reasonable walking ability if guests are to gain maximum enjoyment from the cruise. As many are to lesser-known and remote places, there are frequently landing stages, steps, slopes and rough ground to contend with. We therefore reserve the right not to take a guest on a particular visit if we feel that it would be beyond his or her capabilities or might affect the enjoyment of fellow guests. If you are uncertain of your ability to participate in these activities, please contact our reservations staff to discuss the route in detail before confirming your booking. Those requiring wheelchairs and/or regular assistance in order to participate in shore visits must be accompanied by a fare-paying, able-bodied companion to assist them.

We can usually organise alternative self-guided walks ashore for less agile guests to enjoy at their own pace, or make other arrangements, including taxis, at guests' own cost.

Health

When booking, guests must advise Hebridean of particular health conditions necessitating special precautions and of any subsequent change. It is the responsibility of each guest to inform Hebridean of any prevailing condition which may affect them on board or ashore and, equally, other guests' ability to enjoy to the full any shore visits during their cruise. Please refer to the section 'Fitness on board and ashore' relating to the requirements for able-bodied companions.

Itinerary detail and variations

Cruise itineraries are published in good faith but may have to be altered on board to take into account climatic, geographical, political and other factors over which Hebridean or its agents have no control. We shall do our best to minimise alterations and their potential effect on guests.

While the Captain will do his utmost to follow the itinerary, he will, where appropriate, adapt the route to suit the prevailing and forecast weather conditions. The Captain's decision is always final. If such amendments need to be made at short notice, we cannot make any financial adjustments. Please see page 4 of the 2017 Cruise Diary & Tariff for our Conditions of Business.

Medical facilities

Guests are advised to pack all necessary medical supplies, as our ports of call are generally off the beaten track and may lack facilities. If guests intend to bring any electrical or electronic medical equipment, they should first check with our reservations staff that it is compatible with the ship's 240v electricity supply.

Hebridean Princess does not routinely carry a doctor as she is never far from land. Guests should ensure that, to their knowledge, they are fit to take a holiday during which immediate medical assistance may not be available. Arrangements to consult a doctor on land can be made at relatively short notice and assistance can be summoned quickly in the event of an emergency. Any medical and repatriation costs will be charged to the guest's account.

The ship's Officers are trained in first aid and a comprehensive medical supply is kept for emergency use.

Minors

We regret that children under the age of nine cannot be accommodated.

Single room occupancy

Ten of our cabins are designed and let on a single occupancy basis. Once these cabins have been booked, solo guests requesting a double cabin for single occupancy will be charged a supplement of 85% of the per-person fare for that cabin grade. Please refer to the Cabin Facilities and Dimensions Guide in the inside back cover or contact our reservations staff for further details.


