




The soft tones furnishing the Look-Out Lounge flow seamlessly from the colour palette in the foyer areas, creating a relaxing space to take in the stunning views.

On most days *Hebridean Princess* berths or anchors in different locations both morning and afternoon, whilst the ship's tenders are on hand to operate a shuttle service ashore. Should you choose to wander at will, the small boats are always available to transport you back on board if the yearning for a glass of something or chef's afternoon tea prove too hard to resist.

Some of the islands we visit are so off the beaten track that no landing place is available. We will then use our special beach landing craft for an exciting chance to wander an uninhabited island or headland.



Scottish Islands A-Z

The wildly beautiful coast of Scotland is scattered with hundreds of islands and islets shaped by the relentless pounding of the sea and the ever-changing weather. Sublimely secluded, all are unique, forming a world apart that is little-known and accessible to the very few – yours to explore from the comfort of our delightfully small ship, *Hebridean Princess*. Experience their magic and mystery; revel in their rich diversity from the Firth of Clyde to the Inner and Outer Hebrides. Come and discover these precious island gems.



Arran Firth of Clyde Islands

Influenced by the mild North Atlantic Drift, Arran is a wildlife haven rising to high peaks, including four Corbetts. At the foot of the highest, Goatfell, nestles 16th century red-sandstone Brodick Castle, close to Brodick town. Fifteen miles (24 km) to the north, the 14th century ruined castle of Lochranza was once a royal hunting lodge.

Barra

Outer Hebrides

Named after a 6th century saint and world-famous for its unique beach airport, Traigh Mòr, Barra is a beautiful, tranquil island with a fascinating history. Golden beaches backed by sandy, wild flowerdotted machair surround a more rugged interior. The main centre is the once prosperous herring port of Castlebay, where the Macneil's medieval fortress, Kisimul Castle, perches on a rocky outcrop offshore.

Berneray Outer Hebrides

Berneray, connected by a causeway to North Uist, is a sleepy island of vast shellsand beaches, hills and a tight-knit, if dispersed community. Little more than 2 miles long and 2 miles wide, Berneray offers solitude and magnificent views over the Sound of Harris.

Bute

Firth of Clyde Islands

Crossed by the Highland Boundary Fault, Bute is an isle of distinctly contrasting landscapes from the bare, rounded and craggy uplands of the north to the lower, undulating and fertile south. Golden beaches fringe the west coast, many with views over the Sound towards Arran. The Victorian resort of Rothesay is the only town.

Canna, Small Isles

Joined to Sanday by a causeway, secluded Canna lies less than 5 miles (8 km) off Rum. Dubbed the 'Garden of the Hebrides', this elongated, green and grassy isle is capped by magnetic Compass Hill at 458 feet (140 m) in the north. Canna was one of the earliest Christian settlements, associated with St Columba, who was later adopted as its patron saint.

Coll

Inner Hebrides

The rocky, wild and virtually treeless island of Coll was first settled in the Stone Age. Dotted with ruined cottages, this bird haven is picturesquely clad in flowerdotted machair, fringed by silver-white beaches, and offers refreshing bike rides and walks.

Colonsay

Inner Hebrides

Another bird haven, home to some 200 bird species including the elusive corncrake, and 400 species of flora, Colonsay is a landscape of many contrasts from machair to woods, moors to green fields and rocky to sandy cliff-backed shores. Its finest beach is dramatic Kiloran Bay and inland lie the exotic woodland gardens of Colonsay House.

Cumbraes

Firth of Clyde Islands

The contrasting Cumbraes afford fine views to the mainland, Arran and Bute. Green and undulating Great Cumbrae is home to the only town at Millport, elegantly lining Millport Bay. Here the tiny but beautiful Cathedral of the Isles, regarded as Britain's smallest cathedral, seats only 100 worshippers. Rough and rocky Little Cumbrae, held by the Hunters and later by the Montgomeries, was maintained as a royal hunting forest. Its surviving ruins include the castle demolished by Oliver Cromwell's army in 1650 and a small chapel dedicated to St Beya.

Eigg, Small Isles

Bought out by its islanders in 1997, Eigg has been settled since prehistoric times and was once the seat of the Lord of the Isles. Its rich past is marked by Iron Age forts, a 6th century church, Viking burial mounds and a graveyard that is a moving testament to the 395 MacDonalds massacred in a cave by the MacLeods in 1577. Rising sheer above the plateau of this wildlife reserve, columnar pitchstone An Sgùrr adds magic and mystery. Please see pages 28, 32, 38, 42, 48, 72 and 76.

Eriska

Inner Hebrides

'Water-nymph Island' in Gaelic, Eriska is a flat tidal 300 acres (121 ha) island at the entrance to Loch Creran, linked by bridge to the mainland. Privately-owned, it is run as a luxury hotel, based at Scottish Baronial Eriska House, built in 1884 by the Stewarts of Appin, in wooded grounds. Please see page 32.



Eriskay

Outer Hebrides

The reputation of the tiny, hilly yet well-populated isle of Eriskay extends far beyond its shores. Home to a rare pony breed, once used in the mines, it was here that Bonnie Prince Charlie first stepped onto Scottish soil in 1745. Eriskay is also famed as the site of the sinking of the *SS Politician* offshore in 1941, which inspired Compton MacKenzie's novel and the 1949 film, 'Whisky Galore'.

Gigha

Inner Hebrides

Three miles (4.8 km) west of Kintyre, green and fertile Gigha, 'God's' or 'Good Island', is now owned by its community. In addition to dairy farming, goats are reared to produce a distinctive, fruit-shaped cheese – one of the isle's main exports. Ardminish is the only village and site of Achamore House set in 50 acre (20 ha) gardens planted by Sir James Horlick. Please see pages 50 and 84.



Handa

Inner Hebrides This small, rocky isle sits across the Sound of Handa from the wildly beautiful west coast of Sutherland. Magnificent, horizontally stratified rocks of Torridonian sandstone to the north-west, weathered through time into ledges, form a perfect habitat for nesting seabirds, making Handa one of the largest colonies in northwestern Europe. Puffin have returned, and other species include the red-throated and black-throated diver, eider and shell duck. The island was abandoned by its eight resident families in 1847. Please see page 44.

Harris

Outer Hebrides

Historically and geographically apart from Lewis, Harris is a small region of many contrasts, offering wonderful walks and the beauty of Luskentyre beach on its sandy western shores. Rodel boasts the finest Pre-Reformation church in the Western Isles and the Harris tweeds produced here are world-famous. Although tenacious Gaelic strongholds today, Harris and neighbouring Lewis were the last of the Hebrides to adopt the language.

Holy Isle

Firth of Clyde Islands

Located across Lamlash Bay, Holy Isle has a long history as a sacred site; a spring or Holy Well held to have healing properties, the hermit cave of 6th century monk Saint Molaise and evidence of a 13th century monastery can be found here and there is evidence of some runic writing on the roof of the cave of Saint Molaise. Iona

Inner Hebrides

The exiled Irish prince and missionary St Columba reached Iona in 563 to found his community, landing at pebbled St Columba's Bay in the south, as the legend goes. Originally dating from the 12th century, the restored abbey remains a much-revered place of pilgrimage. An enjoyable walk across the windswept machair leads to the Bay at the Back of the Ocean, with its Spouting Cave, facing the open Atlantic and America. Islay

Inner Hebrides

Erstwhile seat of the MacDonalds, Lords of the Isles, mild Islay is renowned for the peaty single malts of its eight operating distilleries. Islay abounds in birdlife at the RSPB Loch Gruinart Nature Reserve, hub of a barnacle geese colony and historic treasures from the 18th century round church at Bowmore to the late 9th century High Cross of Kildalton. Isle Martin, Summer Isles Highland Isles

Isle Martin is an uninhabited island in Loch Broom, on the west coast of Scotland. It is the closest of the Summer Isles to Ullapool and has been the site of a monastery, a herring curing station and a flour mill. Now recognised as a bird sanctuary, it is owned and managed by a community trust.

Jura

Inner Hebrides

Crowned by the landmark Paps, Jura is a place of wild beauty offering a haven to a wide range of wildlife, including some 6,500 red deer. Glaciated raised beaches are a marked feature of its western shores, with the treacherous Corryvreckan Whirlpool to the north. Jura has one tiny village of 200 residents, Craighouse, where the small Jura Distillery has produced a unique single malt since 1810. Please see pages 24, 26, 52, 66, 76 and 84.

Kerrera

Inner Hebrides

Tiny Kerrera tranquilly guards the entrance to Oban from its two sheltered harbours at Ardentrive Bay and Horse Shoe Bay. Historically a stepping-stone for cattle drovers between Mull and the mainland, this fertile and hilly isle is crowned by the Renaissance MacDougall stronghold of Gylen Castle.

Lewis

Outer Hebrides

Lewis is the largest and most northerly of the Hebrides, forming one island with Harris. Most of its wild landscape, rising to 1,800 feet (549 m) in the south, is cloaked in peat bog - hence its Gaelic name 'Leodhas', meaning 'marshy'. The Callanish Standing Stones and well-preserved Carloway Broch stand testament to its occupation since prehistoric times. The port of Stornoway is the only town. Lunga, Treshnish Isles

Designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest, Lunga is rich in plant life with many rare and endangered species native to the island. Described as a 'green jewel in a peacock sea' Lunga was inhabited until 1857 and the remains of the ruined village and its blackhouses can still be seen today. Please see page 44.

Mingulay, Berneray and Pabbay Outer Hebrides

At the south tip of the Hebrides, these three uninhabited Bishop's Isles, swathed in white sandy beaches and flower-scattered machair, are awe-inspiring from the sea. Around Berneray 600 feet (183 m) cliffs, nested by thousands of seabirds, tower up dramatically from the sea. In the north, the Lewisian gneiss 'Hermit Island' of Pabbay, settled by an early Christian community, as its Old Norse name implies, is an ideal spot on which to land.

Muck, Small Isles

The flat and fertile Isle of Muck scattered with wild flowers and rimmed by silver shell-sand beaches, is a peaceful haven for puffin, kittiwake, fulmar, shearwater, seaeagle and the porpoises that swim off its shores. Mull

Inner Hebrides

Fringed by an indented 300 miles (480 km) coastline, Mull is an island of sweeping moors broken occasionally by picturesque clearings. Colourful Georgian-fronted Tobermory is the capital and Craignure the main port, south-east of which lie Scottish Baronial Torosay Castle and ancient Duart Castle, seat of the Macleans.

Oronsay Inner Hebrides

Oronsay is a small tidal island linked to Colonsay by a causeway known as An Traigh or 'The Strand'. The whole of the island of Oronsay is designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest and Special Protection Area for its chough and corncrake

Raasay

Inner Hebrides

Located between Skye and the mainland, Raasay, 'Isle of the Roe Deer', is relatively low-lying in the north and mountainous in the south, rising to 1,453 feet (443 m) on central Dun Caan. Visited by Boswell and Johnson in 1773, the island is most famous as the birthplace of Scottish Renaissance poet Sorley Maclean. The main village is Inverarish.

Rum, Small Isles

Capped by Askival (2,664 ft/ 812 m) in the rocky Cuillin, the wildlife haven of Rum is a National Nature Reserve and research centre. Owned by Scottish Natural Heritage since 1957, it was bought by the Lancashire industrialist John Bullough in 1879. At the turn of the 20th century, his playboy son, Sir George built the folly of Kinloch Castle, which remains a timecapsule of those headier Edwardian days. Sanda Firth of Clyde Islands

Sanda, 'Sandaigh' in Gaelic, is a small, privately-owned island off the southern tip of the Kintyre Peninsula. An important bird migration and breeding point, it is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), housing the first bird observatory on the west coast of Scotland. Although the island is treeless today, north-western Wood Hill indicates that this was not always so. Please see pages 24 and 84.



St Kilda Outer Hebrides

The last 36 Gaelic-speaking residents of St Kilda evacuated the main island of Hirta at their own request in 1930, thereby ending some 5,000 years of continuous settlement. Behind them they left a deserted village that survives today as an outdoor museum, roamed by Soay sheep. Renowned for its awe-inspiring bird cliffs and stacs, St Kilda's remote and exposed Atlantic location makes visits weather-dependent. The archipelago is now a double UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Shiant Isles Outer Hebrides

Privately owned by the Nicolson family since 1937, the Shiant Isles are geologically outliers of Skye, ringed by basalt rocks, reminiscent of Staffa and the Giant's Causeway, that teem with thousands of seabirds. Mythically haunted by kelpies, the isles are a renowned wildlife haven for common seals, basking sharks, puffin, herring gull, oyster catcher, eider, shag and many more.

Skye

Inner Hebrides

The largest of the Inner Hebrides, Skye was connected to mainland Scotland by the Skye Bridge in 1996. Created volcanically some 60 million years ago, its awe-inspiring landscapes are a paradise for walkers and climbers. Bizarre rock formations punctuate The Quiraing, with the Old Man of Storr, Trotternish to the north-east and Vaternish to the north-west.

Staffa Inner Hebrides

Cliffs rising to 131 feet (40 m) are riddled with caves, the most famous of which is Fingal's Cave at Staffa's southern tip, named after legendary Irish hero, Finn MacCool.

Tanera Mòr, Summer Isles Highland Isles

Tanera Mòr is the largest of the Summer Isles, a cluster of scenic islets located off the coast of Ullapool. Atop a lush, grassy hill, the flat summit of Meall Mòr commands panoramic views over the surrounding area. The unique private post office issues its own stamps, and opens out of hours especially for our visits.

Tiree

Inner Hebrides

Enjoying long hours of sunshine, mild, fertile Tiree is the most westerly of the Inner Hebrides. This wild flower and birdlife haven, with shell-sand blown machair and surf-washed beaches, is much favoured by artists for its natural beauty and colour. Duns and brochs bear witness to its ancient history, while the white Thatched House Museum in Sandaig reveals its more recent crofting past.

The Uists

Outer Hebrides

A paradise for walkers, the tranquil Uists abound in geological and historical contrasts. The second-largest of the Outer Isles, South Uist's softer, undulating landscape is carpeted in flower-decked machair and fringed by dunes.

Ulva

Inner Hebrides

Situated off Mull, the tiny isle of Ulva is a traffic-free haven covering barely 2 square miles (5 km2) and home to only 16 permanent residents. Ulva's past is well documented at Sheila's Cottage Museum on the west coast.

The most southerly of the inhabited Outer Isles, Vatersay is sliced in two by a narrow bar of sand and machair. 
Sailing from Greenock we head to the delightful island of Great Cumbrae where the 'city' of Millport boasts the smallest cathedral in Britain. Next the sumptuous and privately owned Ardgowan House awaits our arrival. The Ardgowan estate has been held by the Stewart family since the early 15th century and the present house dates to 1797.

Known as 'Scotland in Miniature' Arran is home to only one working distillery and here we learn the art of whisky making, before heading to Tarbert to explore on foot and take in views of Loch Fyne from the ancient castle.

Cruising further into Britain's longest sea loch, Loch Fyne, we venture ashore at Crarae to discover Scotland's rural history at Auchindrain Township Museum. Inveraray Jail, one of the finest and best preserved jail and courtroom complexes in the world, plays host to our next visit ahead of a guided tour of Strachur House built by General John Campbell in the 1780s.

A scenic cruise of the Kyles of Bute and Loch Striven precedes an exploration of the Isle of Bute, a popular destination in Victorian times during the heyday of holidays 'Doon the Watter'.

Our final afternoon is spent at Hill House appreciating the beautifully restored arts and crafts and Art Nouveau masterpiece designed by celebrated architect Charles Rennie Mackintosh.

Sea Lochs of the Lower Clyde

Wednesday 7th to Tuesday 13th March 2018

The Firth of Clyde is one of the largest areas of sheltered deep water in the British Isles and the area's many long lochs penetrate far into the Highlands giving rise to dramatic fjord-like scenery all waiting to be explored.

Our first port of call is the Isle of Bute where we discover the Victorian Neo-Gothic Mansion of Mount Stuart House. Stepping ashore on the Isle of Arran we explore the grand baronial castle, formal gardens and woodland country park at Brodick.


At the Robert Burns Birthplace Museum we delve into the history of Scotland's favourite son, before taking a guided tour of the remarkable Culzean Castle, associated with the Kennedy family since the 14th century.

Described as 'one of the showpieces of Galloway' the 75 sculptured acres at Castle Kennedy are one of Scotland's most important historical landscaped gardens, with rhododendrons, championship trees and rare species. Cruising north, the dramatic sea cliffs of Ailsa Craig offer tantalising views.

Guarding the entrance to Lamlash Bay, Holy Isle has been a place of worship and meditation since the 12th century. Here we stretch our legs ahead of a landing on the privately owned nature reserve of Little Cumbrae.

Picturesque Holy Loch provides the setting for our visit to Historic Kilmun and the Argyll Mausoleum. The name 'Holy Loch' is believed to date from the 6th century, when Saint Munn landed there after leaving Ireland.

Finally, we appreciate the breath-taking panorama of Loch Long and Loch Goil, surrounded by the mountains of the Arrochar Alps.



Having heaved anchor *Hebridean Princess* cruises across the Clyde to appreciate the beautifully restored masterpiece of Hill House, designed by celebrated architect Charles Rennie Mackintosh. Set in 500 acres of ancient woodland and mature gardens, Finlaystone House has been the home to five families throughout its 800 hundred year history.

Spending a full day at the stunning 18th century Dumfries House we appreciate its 2,000 acre setting, neoclassical architecture and Thomas Chippendale furniture, ahead of a visit to Brodick Castle on Arran and a scenic cruise of Loch Fyne.

From our berth at Strachur we venture to the home of Sir Charles and Lady MacLean, Strachur House, with its sheltered flower garden, before enjoying a private visit to Ardkinglas House, generally considered to be architect Sir Robert Lorimer's finest work. The fairy tale Inveraray Castle, ancestral home of the Duke of Argyll, Chief of the Clan Campbell, opens the private apartments for us to uncover the secrets of its past.

After navigating the narrow Kyles of Bute and Loch Striven, we step ashore on the Isle of Bute to wonder at the astounding Victorian Gothic mansion, Mount Stuart House, believed to be the first home in the world to have a heated indoor swimming pool. Our final architectural gem is the sumptuous Ardgowan House, which has been held by the Stewart family since the early 15th century.



Greenock - Oban

Heart of Argyll to Oban

Tuesday 20th to Tuesday 27th March 2018 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Leaving Greenock, and heading around the Mull of Kintyre, we take this last opportunity to enjoy the Clyde islands in spring as we voyage to our home port of Oban and our first visit of the year to some of the southern Hebridean islands.



Sailing into picturesque Holy Loch we venture ashore at Benmore Botanic Garden, to witness the vibrant colours of early spring, before wondering at the awe-inspiring Victorian Gothic mansion, Mount Stuart House, traditional home to the Bute family for over 250 years.

After navigating Loch Striven we steam south through the Firth of Clyde, taking in views of Ailsa Craig, ahead of a landing on the privately owned Sanda Island. Our final port of call on the Clyde is Campbeltown where we look forward to tasting a wee dram at Springbank Distillery, established in 1828 and located in the once proclaimed 'whisky capital of the world', before we round the Mull of Kintyre, on passage to Port Ellen on the Isle of Islay.

Later we sample the peaty malts at Laphroaig Distillery and enjoy walks ashore on neighbouring Jura, in advance of crossing the Sound of Jura to stroll the towpath of the Crinan Canal. At Kilmartin Glen we explore some of the 800 ancient monuments to discover the rich archaeological legacy for which the area is famous.

The 20-acre coastal garden at Arduaine is well-known for its wonderful collection of rhododendrons, grown largely under a canopy of mature Japanese larch. With Oban almost upon us, we venture ashore on the island of Kerrera, standing guard over Oban harbour.

At Kilmartin Glen we explore some of the 800 ancient monuments ahead of stretching our legs on the 'deer island' of Jura, in the shadow of the landmark Paps. Crossing to neighbouring Islay we sample the distinctive peaty malts at Ardbeg Distillery and behold one of the finest early Christian crosses in Scotland, the High Cross of Kildalton.

Traversing the Sound of Islay, Colonsay House and Gardens awaits our arrival ahead of a landing on the tiny tidal island of Oronsay, named after St Oran, the founder of the original priory in AD 563. A morning sail allows us to observe the spectacular, cathedral like structure of Fingal's Cave, along with Inch Kenneth, named after St Kenneth who established a monastery on the island.

Ashore at Iona we learn of how the island has been a centre of Christian worship since Columba's arrival in AD 563, with the opportunity to join the Easter Sunday service.

From the museum housed in the old signal tower at Hynish on Tiree, we appreciate the immense feat of engineering that is Skerryvore Lighthouse.

Hebridean fleece from the farm at Ardalanish is used on site by the Isle of Mull weavers; here we enjoy a weaving demonstration before concluding our voyage on the bird haven of Coll, fringed by silverwhite beaches.

West Coast Wonders

Scotland's Western Seaboard is unspoilt, wild and beautiful. Explore this Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty from the comfort and elegance of *Hebridean Princess* as she discovers hidden Hebridean highlights, together with rugged mainland gems on a cruise of varied adventure.


Rounding the Sound of Mull, we head for the Small Isle of Rum and the imposing Kinloch Castle. Built of red sandstone, the castle was the first private residence in Scotland to have electricity.

A cruise through the Sound of Sleat takes us to the delightful village of Inverie and Britain's remotest pub, The Old Forge Inn, before we venture to Eilean Bàn and the Bright Water Visitor Centre.

Before steaming north to Ullapool and the dramatic Corrieshalloch Gorge, a sail under the Skye Bridge takes us to the Isle of Raasay and Raasay House. Once the seat of Clan MacLeods of Raasay, this historic mansion house has unrivalled views of the Cuillin mountain range.

The Summer Isles beckon and we land on both Isle Martin, an uninhabited bird sanctuary, and Tanera Mòr, home to a post office issuing its own stamps. We pause to enjoy the colours of spring at Inverewe Garden, and reflect on our voyage so far, as we return south through the Inner Sound and The Narrows on passage to Armadale. Here we learn of the history of the Highlands and Islands at the Clan Donald Centre and Museum of the Isles.

Finally, we embrace wonderful walks ashore on the Small Isle of Eigg, ahead of our adventure drawing to a close.



After a visit to the National Trust for Scotland's Arduaine Garden, our Footloose adventure commences with a ramble to Loch Ardlarench or a tour of the historic monuments at Kilmartin Glen.

A full day walk from Crinan is the order of the day for the more energetic or alternatively, strolls along the canal towpath followed by a scenic exploration of the pretty fishing village of Tayvallich on the shores of Loch Sween.

On Islay, strollers can visit Finlaggan and Bowmore Distillery whilst the walkers strike out from Port Ellen and take lunch ashore. Colonsay House Gardens beckon for the strollers whilst the walkers head for the white sands at Kiloran Bay. Onwards to sacred Iona for a visit to the restored Benedictine Abbey or a scenic hike to the Bay at the Back of the Ocean.

Tiree is home to the Skerryvore Lighthouse Museum at Hynish, where our strollers can appreciate this great feat of engineering, whilst the walkers ramble through machair covered meadows to Hough Bay. The bird haven of Coll plays host to an afternoon visit for all with views of silver-white beaches.

Our voyage concludes with strolls and walks on the Small Isles of Canna and Muck, before we cruise the Sound of Mull and return to our home port of Oban.

A gentle stroll ashore at Shieldaig creates an appetite prior to lunch at the three rosette awarded restaurant at The Torridon Hotel. Onwards to the Kyle of Lochalsh and our overnight berth.


The far north west Highlands offer superb scenery, mountain peaks, unspoilt sandy beaches, magnificent walking and wide open spaces. Add in the famous sub-tropical garden at Inverewe, the remote Summer Isles and the seabird cliffs of the Shiants to make this cruise a fascinating journey through beautiful landscapes of lochs and mountains.

Exploring the ruined castle and woodland garden at Armadale we learn about the history of the isles at the Clan Donald Centre, ahead of a leisurely cruise through the Sound of Sleat to Lochs Hourn and Torridon. We stretch our legs at the pretty conservation village of Shieldaig and delight in the vibrant colours of exotic plants at Inverewe Garden.

The Summer Isles beckon as we land on the largest, Tanera Mòr, Iying in the mouth of Loch Broom. Located on the edge of the Outer Isles are the uninhabited Shiant Isles and from the comfort of *Hebridean Princess* we admire the thousands of breeding seabirds and puffins.

Skye is the largest of the Western Isles and from Loch Dunvegan we discover Dunvegan Castle, the oldest continuously inhabited castle in Scotland and 800 year ancestral home of the Chiefs of Clan MacLeod. As our journey continues we can observe the everchanging panorama during a cruise of the west coast of the island and the Small Isles.

Prior to calling at Ardchattan Priory Garden, first established in the 13th century, our final full day permits us to enjoy a visit to the impressive Duart Castle, standing proudly on a clifftop guarding the Sound of Mull.


Often referred to as the 'Long Isle', the Outer Hebrides are an area of unspoilt natural beauty with spectacular scenery, impressive mountain ranges, moorland, lochs, machair, golden sandy beaches and turguoise seas. Explore this area with a unique Gaelic culture on this Footloose cruise that has something for everyone.

Our first morning is spent at Armadale on the Isle of Skye to learn of clan history or treading the woodland trails with panoramic views of the Sleat peninsula and beyond. Sailing through Kyle Rhea and The Narrows our walkers head for the hills of Wester Ross whilst the strollers explore picturesque Shieldaig and the sub-tropical garden of Inverewe.

A cruise of The Minch takes us to Stornoway where the secrets of the Isle of Lewis are uncovered at Callanish Stones and Lews Castle; the energetic can strike out for the northern tip of the archipelago, the Butt of Lewis.

Neighbouring Harris plays host to our next forays ashore, the 15th century church of St Clement's at Rodel, a demonstration of the world-famous Harris Tweed and a tour of the tiny island of Scalpay. Sailing south to North Uist, the options are a full day walk or a tour of the island, re-joining the ship in South Uist.

Returning over the Little Minch the dramatic volcanic peak of An Sgùrr draws our walkers, with strolls on Eigg for those who prefer a more relaxed pace. Our voyage concludes with a call at the colourful capital of Mull, Tobermory.

Secret Gardens of the Western Seaboard

Tuesday 15th to Tuesday 22nd May 2018 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

The western seaboard of Scotland is home to some of the finest gardens in Europe, where unusual and exotic plants flourish in the warm climate of the North Atlantic Drift. Many were planted in the Victorian era and designed to complement grand country homes.







Guest Speaker Richard Baines

Richard Baines was a lecturer in horticulture before becoming Curator of Logan Botanic Garden, part of The Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh. A regular contributor to gardening magazines he has participated in many Gardeners' Question Time panels, lectures on various topics and has appeared on both TV and radio. His plant specialities include rhododendrons, hardy palms and southern hemisphere exotics.



Departing from Oban we head for Attadale Gardens and the impressive sculptures scattered amongst water gardens, woodland and rhododendrons. At Loch Ewe we explore the lush oasis of Inverewe Garden, before steaming north to Ullapool and marvelling at the dramatic Corrieshalloch Gorge and its spectacular waterfalls.

Little Loch Broom is home to the ancient walled garden at Dundonnell House which boasts a restored Edwardian glasshouse, riverside walk and arboretum. The coastal garden at neighbouring Durnamuck offers a rich mix of herbaceous borders, trees and shrubs, wild meadow and stunning views.

Loch Dunvegan is where we enjoy five acres of formal castle gardens, before arriving at the hidden gem of Lip na Cloiche, a private and selfmade garden in an extremely remote location on the Isle of Mull. On a headland overlooking the Atlantic, Glengorm Castle plays host to our next visit; on a clear day views extend as far as the Outer Hebrides.

Nestling on the shore of Loch Linnhe, Ard Daraich is a magical hill garden and a delight for garden lovers.

The gardens at Ardtornish Estate were sculpted out of a rocky hillside creating a natural landscape; the late nineteenth century planting was intended to be enjoyed by sea approach, with the towers of Ardtornish House springing from a semi-circle of trees.

The Islands of the Inner & Outer Hebrides SEASONS



Tuesday 22nd to Tuesday 29th May 2018 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

First operated in 1989, we are replicating this delightful cruise in celebration of our 30th anniversary season with visits to six different islands, a passage to the Outer Hebrides and a visit to the famous garden at Inverewe.



Departing from Oban, we enter the famous Tobermory Bay for a stretch of legs in the colourful Georgian capital, whilst a venture ashore on Eigg highlights the stark contrast between lush vegetation and rocky peak. Sailing onwards, the famous Black Ridge of the Cuillins on Skye may well be visible as *Hebridean Princess* steams into Loch Scresort on Rum for a visit to Kinloch Castle.

Continuing to the Sleat peninsula and Armadale on Skye we discover the Clan Donald Centre, set in the landscaped gardens of the ruined castle, before berthing at Kyle of Lochalsh for an excursion to the most photographed castle in Britain, Eilean Donan.

Plockton is a conservation village and we explore the bay bordered by palm trees, ahead of landing once more on Skye at the sheltered natural harbour of Portree. Heading northwards to Gairloch we marvel at the tropical plants that flourish outdoors at Inverewe Garden, but would have to be grown under glass at Kew Gardens!

To get a first-hand feel for life in the remote Outer Hebrides we tour the island of Harris, before retuning across The Minch to visit the oldest continually inhabited castle in Scotland, Dunvegan. Our final island port of call is the Small Isle of Canna where we tender ashore to experience the peace and solitude of this sparsely populated isle.





St Kilda and Western Isles Wildlife

Tuesday 29th May to Thursday 7th June 2018 9 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

As the remotest part of the British Isles, the UNESCO World Heritage Site of St Kilda forms the most important seabird breeding site in northwest Europe. With cliffs, sea stacs and grassy slopes, the islands are ideally suited to nesting birds like puffin, kittiwake, fulmar, razorbill and guillemot.







Guest Speaker David Sexton

David Sexton works for the RSPB on the Isle of Mull. He was previously Head of RSPB's Land Management Department in Edinburgh and now as Mull Officer he is responsible for monitoring the important populations of white-tailed and golden eagles and overseeing the award-winning public viewing project Mull Eagle Watch. He is the author of 'Birdwatching on Mull and Iona' and lives on Mull with his wife, two teenage daughters and black Labrador Cally.

Boarding the beachcraft, a landing on the Small Isle of Rum takes us in search of red deer, before a cruise of the west coast of Skye. We take a boat trip to view the resident seal population in the shadow of Dunvegan Castle and observe the wading and farmland birds at the Balranald RSPB Reserve on North Uist.

A cruise of the seabird cliffs of the privately owned Shiant Isles allows us to witness the myriad of breeding seabirds, whilst an afternoon cruise of The Minch provides the ideal opportunity for cetacean watching. Onwards to Handa Island, an internationally important breeding colony, before continuing across The Minch to Stornoway and Lews Castle Museum.

Venturing through the Sound of Harris to St Kilda we cruise the archipelago and seabird colonies of Stac Lee and Boreray, ahead of anchoring in Village Bay. Weather permitting, we land on the main island of Hirta to explore the abandoned 19th century village, before a relaxing cruise of the Sea of the Hebrides.

Local boats take us to Lunga, an island designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest and where Atlantic grey seals and puffins are abundant. After stretching our legs on Ulva our final destination is Mull, to view Britain's largest and most impressive bird of prey, the whitetailed eagle.



00 In the Footsteps of Sir Jamie Stormonth Darling

Follow in the steps of Old Wykehamist Sir Jamie Stormonth Darling, Director of the National Trust for Scotland in its formative years, visiting some of the most beautiful and remote islands managed by the National Trust for Scotland, most of which were acquired under his leadership.

Sailing from Oban we head for our peaceful overnight anchorage, before continuing to the secluded Isle of Canna for a full day of cultural and natural history exploration.


A cruise past the Balmacara Estate leads us to Inverewe Garden with its heritage garden, comprising species from across the globe and created from a barren wilderness in the 19th century. Corrieshalloch Gorge is one of the finest box canyons in the British Isles and here we marvel at the giant waterfall as it cascades through a wilderness rich in flora and fauna.

St Kilda, the United Kingdom's only double UNESCO World Heritage Site, is where man lived in the harshest of conditions until 1930. Our overnight sail allows us to arrive early morning and cruise the imposing sea stacs, before going ashore at Village Bay for a warden-led tour.

Heading for the southern tip of the Outer Hebrides our on board commentary provides an insight into Barra Head, Mingulay and Pabbay, ahead of traversing the Sea of the Hebrides.

In advance of landing on the sacred isle of Iona, a local boat takes us to Staffa and Fingal's Cave with its spectacular hexagonal basalt columns; its sheer size and eerie sounds produced by the waves has encouraged legends and modern art.

Our cruise draws to a close as we enjoy a sumptuous farewell gala



St Kilda, Islands on the Edge

Tuesday 12th to Tuesday 19th June 2018 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Made up of five islands and three stacs, this is our third visit of the year to St Kilda. Whilst the Double UNESCO World Heritage Site is the highlight of the cruise there are other ancient sites to enjoy.

Our voyage of discovery commences with a visit to Colonsay House Gardens, considered to be one of the finest rhododendron gardens in Scotland, ahead of landing on the serene Isle of Iona, home to the oldest and most sacred religious site in western Europe, Iona Abbey.



Before sailing the Sea of the Hebrides, we pause to wonder at the magnificent feat of engineering that is Skerryvore Lighthouse from the museum housed at Hynish on Tiree.

Steaming overnight to St Kilda, we cruise beneath the seabird cliffs of Stac Lee and Boreray to Village Bay on the main island of Hirta. Here, weather permitting, we land ashore to explore the now preserved village, abandoned 86 years previously. An afternoon sail takes us past the Flannan Isles where, in December 1900, three lighthouse keepers mysteriously disappeared.

On Lewis, we discover the ancient standing stones at Callanish and journey to the northern most point of the Outer Isles, where the unique and beautiful St Moluag's Church has stood since the 13th century.

A gentle cruise takes us past the Shiant Isles, with sea cliffs festooned with nesting seabirds, and onwards to Skye and Dunvegan Castle, home of Clan MacLeod and an excellent location to observe the resident seal population. Heading south through the Small Isles our final foray ashore is the community owned Isle of Eigg.

A popular itinerary from our 10th season, this is a cruise that, for the most part, remains within sight of land. The ever-changing panorama will appeal to those who like to escape to dramatic, off the beaten track locations


Departing from our home port of Oban we cruise south through the Firth of Lorn and enter Loch Sween, to tender ashore and explore on foot at Tayvallich. On the fertile Isle of Gigha we visit the 50 acre gardens of Achamore House, planted by Sir James Horlick.

Our voyage continues with a visit to Colonsay House Gardens, considered to be one of the finest rhododendron gardens in Scotland, ahead of discovering the history of Christianity at the restored Benedictine Abbey on Iona. At Sheila's Cottage Museum, on the traffic free haven of Ulva, we uncover the island's past.

Fingal's Cave was immortalised by Mendelssohn in his Hebrides Overture and here we admire the distinctive six-sided columns of rock formed from basalt. Crossing the Sea of the Hebrides, we head for Kisimul Castle, guarding the entrance to Castlebay on Barra, before strolling the white sands of Prince's Bay on Eriskay.

Ahead of sailing into Loch Scavaig, where the Black Cuillins sweep down to the sea to create one of the wonders of the West Coast, we have the chance to view the famous seal colony at Dunvegan Castle on Skye.

Our final day provides the opportunity to embrace scenic walks on the Inner Isles of Muck and Coll.

Pearls of the Irish Sea

Tuesday 26th June to Tuesday 3rd July 2018 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Venturing out of Scottish waters for the first time this season, we head south from Oban to capture the magical and mysterious spirit of three different cultures bound by their Celtic roots.

On the whisky isle of Islay we sample the distinctive, peaty malt at Ardbeg on the south coast of the island. As we cruise the North Channel, the coast of Northern Ireland comes into view and a landing at Ballycastle allows us to walk in the footsteps of Irish legend, Finn MacCool, at the Giant's Causeway.

A visit to the Neo-Classical Mount Stewart House, located on the shores of Strangford Lough in County Down, would not be complete without wandering through celebrated gardens, planted in the 1920s. Nearby Castle Ward is a unique 18th century mansion, famed for its mixture of architectural styles.

Our third Celtic nation beckons and we uncover layers of Manx history at the majestic fortress of Peel Castle, before taking a ride on the historic steam train at Douglas. A detour via the English coast takes us to the birthplace of the famous romantic poet, William Wordsworth, at Cockermouth.

Sailing back across the Irish Sea we admire the beautiful waterfall at Glenoe, nestling in the glens of Antrim and the conservation village of Cushendun, which has been protected by the National Trust since 1954.

Returning to home waters, the pretty Isle of Jura allows us to ramble to the island's only settlement at Craighouse, ahead of a final and gentle stroll along the canal towpath at Crinan.

Classical Inspiration

Tuesday 3rd to Tuesday 10th July 2018 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

The beauty of Scotland's Highlands and Islands has inspired numerous artists, composers and musicians, most famously the dramatic cathedral-like Fingal's Cave on Staffa. This cruise uncovers the talent of local musicians and artists who have also been stimulated by the unique atmosphere of the environs in which they live.

The Crinan Hotel is a renowned gallery venue on Scotland's west coast, where contemporary artists Frances Macdonald and her son Ross Ryan regularly exhibit. The picturesque village of Tayvallich plays host to scenic strolls before we cross to Islay for a visit to Islay House Square, built by Walter Campbell in the 1790s to house servants and workshops. After tasting a wee dram at Laphroaig Distillery, we conclude our day with a performance by musicians from the Cantilena Festival.

A cruise of the narrow Sound of Islay takes us to Colonsay where we can explore Colonsay House Garden, ahead of a landing on the sacred island of Iona, birthplace of Christianity in Scotland. A local boat leads us to Staffa and Fingal's Cave with its spectacular hexagonal basalt columns; its sheer size and eerie sounds produced by the waves have encouraged music, legends and modern art.

At mainland Britain's most westerly point we take in the breathtaking panorama from the Ardnamurchan Lighthouse and visit the Resipole Studios, a contemporary gallery on the edge of Loch Sunart that provides an exciting space for Scottish artists to develop and exhibit their work.

On the Isle of Mull, we discover Duart Castle, home to the Clan Maclean for over 800 years, and enjoy a musical interlude by the artistes of the Mendelssohn on Mull Festival, in Craignure.

Our eagerly anticipated journey south takes us on a sojourn of discovery, allowing us to uncover the heritage of three Celtic nations en route to the magical Isles of Scilly and the architectural and maritime gems of the southern coast of England.

Heading for Islay the award-winning Laphroaig Distillery hosts our first visit, before a sail of the North Channel and the Antrim coast.







Grey Abbey House

Guest Speaker Graham Clarke

Graham Clarke, artist, author and humourist is one of Britain's foremost printmakers. His 'arched top' etchings are to be found in royal and public collections across the world, as well as on the walls of countless homes. They are produced entirely by hand using methods that are hundreds of years old. He has also written and illustrated more than a dozen books.



Built in 1762, and located on the shores of Strangford Lough, Grey Abbey House contains interesting family collections and a garden that boasts herbaceous borders, a walled garden and historic apple orchards.

Onwards to the Isle of Man for an exploration of Peel Castle with its ancient round tower, atmospheric crypt and vast layers of Manx history, before traversing the Irish Sea for a tour of Dublin that highlights the vibrancy of the city.

From Rosslare, we tour the medieval streets of Wexford and learn of how the town's rich and bloody history was nearly obliterated by Oliver Cromwell, ahead of discovering the 12th century Selskar Abbey where Henry II spent Lent as sacrament for having beheaded Thomas Becket.

A gentle steam takes us to the largest island of the enchanting Isles of Scilly, St Mary's, before visiting Tresco and the sub-tropical Abbey Garden, home to thousands of exotic plants.

From Falmouth, we visit Truro with its magnificent cathedral and from Fowey venture to one of the most mysterious estates in England, the Lost Gardens of Heligan.

Continuing to Plymouth the Tudor Mount Edgcumbe House awaits, before an exploration of the Britannia Royal Naval College at Dartmouth and a visit to Agatha Christie's former holiday home at Greenway.

Experience the Channel Island beauty of Jersey, Guernsey, Sark and Alderney and uncover the delights of Brittany, including Roscoff, Port Clos and Cherbourg as *Hebridean Princess* embarks on this wonderful Anglo-French itinerary.

Departing from Portland, a morning sail across the busy shipping lane of the English Channel leads us to Cherbourg for a guided tour of the city.



From St Peter Port, our first Channel Island visit permits us to discover the delights of Guernsey with a tour of the island, before taking a local ferry to Sark and enjoying a trip in the island's famous horse drawn carriages.

After a leisurely cruise of the Brittany coast we return to France and, by local boat, venture to Île de Batz with its wonderful beaches and 19th century lighthouse.

Roscoff is renowned for its picturesque architecture and known as 'petite cité de caractère de Bretagne'; our tour includes Saint-Pol-de-Léon, noted for its 13th century cathedral and the 80 metre high tower of Notre-Dame du Kreisker Chapel, the highest in Brittany.

Continuing to Port Clos a landing at one of Brittany's loveliest islands, Île de Bréhat, beckons before a second cruise of the Brittany coast takes us to our final French port, St Malo and its ancient Old Town.

Leaving France, a return to the Channel Islands allows an island tour of Jersey, and on Alderney we travel on the only working railway in the Channel Islands, where diesel locomotives pull London Underground carriages to Alderney Lighthouse.

Honfleur is renowned for its beautiful and picturesque port and from here we explore St Catherine's church, the largest wooden church in France.

A cruise of the French coast leads us to Dieppe and the Notre-Dame-de-Bon-Secours, built in 1879 on a cliff in memory of sailors lost at sea.

Continuing to Boulogne-sur-Mer, the largest fishing port in France, a tour of the city permits us to appreciate the Old Town, dominated by the belfry and dome of the cathedral, ahead of cruising to Dunkirk for a visit to the World War II museum that tells the story of the evacuation of Dunkirk, codenamed Dynamo.

A relaxing cruise takes *Hebridean Princess* to Belgium for the very first time and the port of Ostend. From here we discover the fairy-tale and medieval town of Bruges with cobbled lanes, tranquil canals and old whitewashed alms-houses.

Traversing the English Channel once more the famous white cliffs at Dover welcome our return and an excursion to historic Canterbury allows us explore the city and cathedral.

Our adventure comes to a close with a cruise up the mighty River Thames to the iconic Tower Bridge.

After a relaxing day cruising, Honfleur awaits. The city is renowned for its beautiful and picturesque port and St Catherine's church, the largest wooden church in France.

From the port of Cherbourg, we tour the village of Sainte-Mère-Église, an important crossroads in the allied campaign, before visiting Utah Beach where the majority of US forces landed on D-Day in 1944.

Closer to France than England, Guernsey awaits our arrival, before taking a local ferry to Sark and enjoying a trip in the island's famous horse drawn carriages.

On Alderney, we travel on the only working railway in the Channel Islands, where diesel locomotives pull London Underground carriages to Alderney Lighthouse, after which *Hebridean Princess* returns across the English Channel to Portland as our cruise sadly ends.

The Mayflower Museum at Plymouth allows us to explore the story of the voyage of the Pilgrim Fathers and their journey aboard the Mayflower to the New World, ahead of visiting the National Trust garden of Trellisick sheltered by woodland and surrounded by 376 acres of parkland.

A gentle steam takes us to the largest island of the enchanting Isles of Scilly, for an exploration of St Mary's, and then onwards to Lundy, a 400 feet peaceful and unspoiled granite outcrop located in the Bristol Channel. St David's is situated within the Pembrokeshire Coast National Park and our visit introduces us to the spectacular coastal scenery renowned for its beauty and wildlife, before a cruise of the Welsh coast and the Menai Strait.

From Beaumaris, we explore Plas Newydd Country House and Garden and then from Douglas we enjoy a ride on the Snaefell Mountain Railway, operating from the village of Laxey to the summit of Snaefell.

A cruise of the North Channel return us to more familiar waters, before our adventure ends with a tour of the Ardbeg Distillery on Islay and a stretch of legs at the pretty village of Tayvallich.



Our next port of call is Iona Abbey, one of the oldest and most significant religious centres in Western Europe and previously a focal point for the broadening of Christianity throughout Scotland.

Sailing on to the Isle of Coll we uncover some of the finest beaches within the Hebrides and take in the charms of the island whilst being alert for the rare corncrake bird.

To conclude the cruise, Glenmore Bay's Nadurra Centre will provide us with an abundance of information on the flora and fauna that flourishes in this wonderful corner of Scotland.



Returning over The Minch to Rum we visit the eccentric Edwardian sandstone folly of Kinloch Castle, the first private residence in Scotland to have electricity, whilst our final island port of call is Mull where the colourful Georgian harbour town of Tobermory plays host to walks ashore and perhaps a little souvenir shopping.



Footloose from Skye to the Outer Isles



Whether you are a keen walker or just prefer to take it easy and soak up the scenery, this cruise combines the best of Skye and the Inner Isles together with the rich diversity of the southern Outer Isles of Eriskay and Vatersay.

Our first morning offers walks on the wildlife haven of Rum, or the opportunity to visit the red sandstone folly of Kinloch Castle. Embrace a kaleidoscopes of landscapes as *Hebridean Princess* steams into Loch Scavaig for walks or strolls around the cauldronlike Loch Coruisk in the shadow of the awe-inspiring Black Cuillin Ridge. On the shores of Loch Carron, Plockton is an idyllic setting for a morning of strolls or a more energetic stretch of legs before we head to the Isle of Raasay to follow in the footsteps of Boswell and Johnson.

With bizarre rock formations punctuating the landscape, the Trotternish Peninsula on Skye plays host to a full day walk or a guided tour by coach. The walker's paradise of Skye is also home to Dunvegan Castle, stronghold of the Clan MacLeod for over 800 years; here we can explore the castle and gardens or strike out to explore the rugged backdrop in which they sit.

A cruise of The Minch leads us to Eriskay to stride where Bonnie Prince Charlie first stepped onto British soil before strolling on the dramatic beaches of Vatersay. Steaming over the Sea of the Hebrides we land on the most westerly point of the UK mainland, the Ardnamurchan Peninsula where strollers can take in the panoramic vista from the top of the lighthouse and the walkers can enjoy a final ramble from Kilchoan.



The arc of the Outer Hebrides tenaciously shields the Inner Isles from the Atlantic Ocean which has so dramatically sculpted their landscapes. This unforgettable voyage discovers the diversity of these two different island chains, separated by the crystal waters of the Sea of the Hebrides.

Ashore on the Jurassic Isle of Eigg, rich in history and wildlife, we enjoy tranquil walks against the sheer rocks of An Sgùrr ahead of a cruise of Skye's spectacular south-west coast. Across the Little Minch, explore some of Scotland's most dramatic scenery on a kaleidoscopic tour of Harris taking in a weaving demonstration. In the afternoon contrast the more rugged, mountainous appeal of North Harris and the tiny isle of Scalpay.

Cruising the crescent arc of the Outer Isles we make a thrilling beach landing onto one of the uninhabited bird isles of Pabbay, Mingulay or Berneray, abandoned by their last residents in 1912. From Castlebay we travel through the Macneil stronghold of Barra to their medieval fortress of Kisimul Castle.

Returning to the Inner Hebrides and Iona where St Columba founded his historic community in 563, savour the serenity of the restored Benedictine Abbey. The traffic-free island of Ulva proudly displays its crofting heritage at Sheila's Cottage Museum. Relish the remoteness of the walker's paradise of Coll, ringed by sweeping sandy beaches, far removed from bustling Tobermory with its bright shops and pleasant strolls en route to Oban.

Footloose to Assynt

A legacy of glaciation, the landscape consists of rugged mountains set amongst moorland where deer are more numerous than humans. The coastline is deeply indented by numerous lochs, producing stunning glimpses of savage beauty at every turn.

Our first call is the Isle of Muck with walks and strolls for all before we sail though Kyle Rhea and under the Skye Bridge to Shieldaig where we stretch our legs. From Gairloch walkers head off to observe the awe-inspiring vistas of Wester Ross, while strollers savour the colours of autumn at Inverewe Garden.

From Lochinver the crofting community at Elphin beckons our walkers, as the strollers visit Ardvreck Castle and Calda House. Following lunch on board the options are a ramble to the Falls of Kirkaig or the chance to visit the most remote bookshop on mainland Britain, Achins.

Cruising the Summer Isles we land on Tanera Mòr to explore this beautiful island, the largest in the archipelago, ahead of a sail into Loch Broom. From Ullapool we unlock the mysteries of one of Europe's oldest landscapes at Knockan Crag where the story of ancient oceans, ice sheets and crashing continents is told through poetry, sculpture and interactive exhibitions.

As the strollers spend the morning at Portree and the afternoon at the Aros Centre, the more energetic strike out for a full day on the walker's paradise of Skye. The final foray ashore is Raasay to appreciate the breathtaking panorama of the Cuillins to the west and the Torridon hills to the east. We reflect on our voyage as we cruise the Sound of Sleat and the Small Isles on passage to Oban.



Islands are quintessentially places of mystery and mystique and nowhere more so than in the Hebrides, Europe's bestkept secret. Wondrously carved by nature, each is unique, concealing precious secrets that are ours to share on this cruise which was first operated in our 10th season of 2008.



The wild, deer isle of Jura is a breathtaking first landfall, a world apart from the soft, quiet beauty of Colonsay and the woodland gardens of Colonsay House. The tiny, sacred isle of Iona still upholds Celtic Christian tradition as St Columba's final refuge in AD 563 and we absorb its spirituality at the medieval abbey. Landing on Tiree, ringed by silver shell-sands, we learn of the great feat of engineering that is Skerryvore Lighthouse.

After relishing the peacefulness of the fertile wildlife haven of Muck, we head for the picturesque charms of Barra on a captivating island tour. Across the causeway to discover idyllic Eriskay and the white sands where Bonnie Prince Charlie first stepped on Scottish soil.

The magnetic Black Cuillin draws us over the sea to Skye to walk in the awe-inspiring cauldron of Loch Coruisk before cruising south to Eigg to savour its rugged appeal on invigorating walks beneath the rocky volcanic plug of An Sgùrr.

Now a nature reserve, neighbouring Rum breathes mystery at Kinloch Castle, Sir George Bullough's once opulent hunting lodge. Onwards to Mull and a stroll along the bright Georgian quayside at Tobermory concludes our voyage.



Steaming south from Oban we explore the exotic woodland gardens of Colonsay House ahead of a cruise of the Sea of the Hebrides. Barra is our next island call and here we view the Macneil stronghold of Kisimul Castle which guards the entrance to Castlebay. Following the in the footsteps of Bonnie Prince Charlie, Eriskay is home to a rare pony breed and was the site of the sinking of the *SS Politician* in 1941.

Our autumn journey through the Outer Isles continues on North Uist where the ancient sites of Barpa Langass and Pobull Fhinn await. Crossing the causeway to the beautiful, but tiny isle of Berneray, we learn of its rich and colourful history. Our tour of Harris and Lewis takes in the well-preserved Carloway Broch and the impressive Standing Stones of Callanish which stand testament to the island's occupation since prehistoric times.

Crossing The Minch to Skye we enjoy free time in the capital of Portree and wonder at the eccentric Edwardian folly of Kinloch Castle on the Small Isle of Rum. We conclude our voyage with a stroll around the colourful Georgian town of Tobermory.

Accompanied by an experienced cycling guide and Olympic Cyclist Chris Boardman, you do not need to be an expert to enjoy the thrill of riding through the awe-inspiring scenery of the Hebrides, some of which are almost traffic-free! With alternative visits for the non-cyclists this cruise offers something for everyone.

First settled in the Stone Age, the bird haven of Coll offers refreshing walks or a circular bike ride, neighbouring Tiree allows the cyclists to observe the surf-washed beaches whilst others visit the Skerryvore Lighthouse Museum. Crossing the Sea of the Hebrides to Barra our options are a tour by coach or a linear bike ride through this beautiful, tranquil island, ahead of arriving on Eriskay for strolls on Prince's Beach or a cycle ride.

Our cyclists head out for a full day ride on The Uists or there is the opportunity for a guided tour of these isles which abound in geological and historical contrasts. From East Loch Tarbert the destination for the cyclists is Stornoway, otherwise discover the highlights of Harris and the Lews Castle Museum.

The Trotternish Peninsula on Skye is our next destination where the alternatives are a scenic excursion or ride to Portree before sailing to Raasay for an afternoon pedal or visit to Raasay House. Finally we return to Skye and the Sleat Peninsula for a final cycle, or else uncover the history of the Clan Donald at the Museum of the Isles.





Join *Hebridean Princess* as she says farewell to her home port of Oban for another season. A cruise of enticing variety, wonderful gardens, distilleries, architectural gems and the final Hebridean islands of the year all await.



After stretching our legs on the southern Hebridean island of Jura, we sample the distinctive peaty malts at Lagavulin Distillery on the whisky isle of Islay. The final Hebridean island of the year is Gigha and here we explore the gardens of Achamore House, planted by Sir James Horlick.

Rounding the Mull of Kintyre we berth at Campbeltown for our visit to Saddell Abbey and the truly remarkable collection of late medieval grave slabs and effigies that marked burials here. We pause awhile on Sanda, site of the first bird observatory in Scotland, ahead of a guided tour of the only legal distillery on Arran at Lochranza and an afternoon spent discovering the treasures on display at Brodick Castle.

Lying in Lamlash Bay, just off the coast of Arran, we learn of the spiritual heritage of Holy Isle which dates back to the 6th century. Said to be Britain's smallest, the Cathedral of the Isles on Great Cumbrae is certainly one of the finest in architecture and setting; neighbouring Little Cumbrae plays host to refreshing walks ashore. Bute is our final port of call where the flamboyant Victorian Neo-Gothic creation of Mount Stuart House stands testament to the eclectic taste of the 3rd Marquess of Bute.



Architectural Gems of Argyll and The Isles

Tuesday, 30th October to Tuesday, 6th November 2018 7 nights including 2 Gala Dinners

Hebridean Island Cruises is proud to offer this special Historical Interest cruise to celebrate the society's 50th Anniversary.

Embark on a journey of architectural exploration as this cruise introduces us to a myriad of design styles and rare private viewings, often by a member of the family, including fine houses, baronial mansions, private apartments and an arts and crafts masterpiece.



From Greenock we travel to Finlaystone House and are welcomed by the MacMillan family, ahead of an afternoon spent at Hill House appreciating the beautifully restored arts and crafts and Art Nouveau masterpiece designed by celebrated architect Charles Rennie Mackintosh.

Cruising Britain's longest sea loch, Loch Fyne, to Crarae where the fairytale Inveraray Castle, seat of the Dukes of Argyll, opens the private apartments for us. Going ashore at Strachur we visit Ardkinglas House, designed by Sir Robert Lorimer and built in 1905, before travelling to Strachur House, residence of Sir Charles and Lady MacLean.

A relaxing sail through the Kyles of Bute brings us to the island of the same name where Mount Stuart is testament to generations of Stuart passion and flamboyance. Dumfries House was saved by the intervention of His Royal Highness, The Prince Charles, Duke of Rothesay in 2007 and combines the neoclassical architecture of Robert Adam with the furniture of Thomas Chippendale; here we spend a full day with lunch on the estate.

Seating barely 100 people and built in 1851, on land owned by the Boyle family, The Cathedral of the Isles on Great Cumbrae is reputed to be Britain's smallest cathedral. Our final visit is the sumptuous and privately owned Ardgowan House.





Guest Speaker Caroline Knight, FSA

Caroline Knight is an Caroline is an Accredited Art Society Lecturer and architectural historian, with an MA from the Courtauld Institute of Art. She specialises in British architecture of the 16th - 18th centuries, and is an independent lecturer. She has researched the history of Kensington Palace for the Curators of the State Apartments, has contributed to several books, and has published many academic articles.


Sailing from Greenock we head to the delightful island of Great Cumbrae where the 'city' of Millport boasts the smallest cathedral in Britain. Next the sumptuous and privately owned Ardgowan House awaits our arrival. The Ardgowan estate has been held by the Stewart family since the early 15th century and the present house dates to 1797.

Known as 'Scotland in Miniature' Arran is home to only one working distillery and here we learn the art of whisky making, before heading to Tarbert to explore on foot and take in views of Loch Fyne from the ancient castle.

Cruising further into Britain's longest sea loch, Loch Fyne, we venture ashore at Crarae to discover Scotland's rural history at Auchindrain Township Museum. Inveraray Jail, one of the finest and best preserved jail and courtroom complexes in the world, plays host to our next visit ahead of a guided tour of Strachur House built by General John Campbell in the 1780s.

A scenic cruise of Loch Fyne precedes an exploration of the Isle of Bute, a popular destination in Victorian times during the heyday of holidays 'Doon the Watter'.

Our final afternoon is spent at Hill House appreciating the beautifully restored arts and crafts and Art Nouveau masterpiece designed by celebrated architect Charles Rennie Mackintosh.

Sea Lochs of the Lower Clyde

The Firth of Clyde is one of the largest areas of sheltered deep water in the British Isles and the area's many long lochs penetrate far into the Highlands giving rise to dramatic fjord-like scenery all waiting to be explored.

Our first port of call is the Isle of Bute where we discover the Victorian Neo-Gothic Mansion of Mount Stuart House. Stepping ashore on the Isle of Arran we explore the grand baronial castle, formal gardens and woodland country park at Brodick.



At the Robert Burns Birthplace Museum we delve into the history of Scotland's favourite son, before taking a guided tour of the remarkable Culzean Castle, associated with the Kennedy family since the 14th century.

Described as 'one of the showpieces of Galloway' the 75 sculptured acres at Castle Kennedy are one of Scotland's most important historical landscaped gardens, with rhododendrons, championship trees and rare species. Cruising north, the dramatic sea cliffs of Ailsa Craig offer tantalising views.

Guarding the entrance to Lamlash Bay, Holy Isle has been a place of worship and meditation since the 12th century. Here we stretch our legs ahead of a landing on the privately owned nature reserve of Little Cumbrae.

Picturesque Holy Loch provides the setting for our visit to Historic Kilmun and the Argyll Mausoleum. The name 'Holy Loch' is believed to date from the 6th century, when Saint Munn landed there after leaving Ireland.

Finally, we appreciate the breath-taking panorama of Loch Long and Loch Goil, surrounded by the mountains of the Arrochar Alps.





Bed: Super Super king-size or twin Bathroom: Full-size bath with thermostatic shower

Cabin category

The ship's largest cabin, the Isle of Arran Suite, is located on the port side of the Princess Deck and, as all windows are on the ship's side, privacy is assured. It comprises a large, separate day room, a spacious bedroom and a wellequipped bathroom with bath and separate walk-in thermostatic shower. The bedroom contains a super king-size bed, which can be re-arranged as twins, generous wardrobes, drawers, dressing table and a second television.

Balcony cabins Isle of Barra Isle of Benbecula

Bed: King-size Bathroom: Full-size bath with thermostatic shower

Cabin category

The Isle of Barra and Isle of Benbecula are located on the port and starboard sides forward on the Princess Deck. The balconies, which afford total privacy as they cannot be overlooked from the ship, are fitted with teak tables and chairs for you to enjoy the magnificent scenery. The bathrooms are generous in size with full-size baths and thermostatic showers.

Isle of Coll Isle of Colonsay

Bed: Super king-size or twin Bathroom: Full-size bath with thermostatic shower

Cabin category

Located on the same deck as Reception and the Columba Restaurant, these roomy, forwardfacing cabins, at the forward end of the Princess Deck, are fitted with three large picture windows offering excellent views ahead over the bow. The super king-size beds can be re-arranged as twins. A well deck, some 40 feet (12 m) in length, between the cabins and the forecastle, ensures privacy. Large bathrooms feature full-size baths with thermostatic showers.



Isle of Danna

Bed: Super king-size or twin Bathroom: Thermostatic shower

Cabin category

A roomy cabin that is in great demand with returning guests, the Isle of Danna is tucked into a quiet corner on the port side of the Princess Deck. It contains a super king-size bed, which can be converted into twin beds, and two comfortable chairs from which to enjoy panoramic views through full-size picture windows. Charming private facilities include a thermostatic shower.

Cabin category

This popular, double-bedded cabin, located on the starboard side of the Princess Deck, has three full-size picture windows, which afford superb views and give the room a bright, airy feel. Private facilities include a thermostatic shower.





Although there are no windows or portholes, fresh air is circulated day and night by the ship's forced-air ventilation system. Spacious private facilities include a thermostatic shower.

Cabin category

These charming, well-appointed cabins, located on the starboard side of the Hebridean Deck, offer spacious bathrooms and full-size baths with thermostatic showers. As they are not fitted with windows or portholes, fresh air is supplied by the ship's forced air ventilation system.

Loch Scresort

Bed: Single Bathroom: Thermostatic shower

Cabin category

This delightful cabin, located on the starboard side of the Hebridean Deck, is well-appointed and offers the single traveller excellent value for money. Fresh air is supplied by the ship's forcedair ventilation system, as this cabin does not have windows or portholes. Loch Scresort has good-sized private facilities with a thermostatic shower.

Flights

Our reservations staff can advise and arrange flights from UK airports to the airport nearest to your port of embarkation in order to meet with our coach transfer.

Rail

We can arrange standard or first class rail travel from/to your local UK railway station, together with seat reservations where available, to the station nearest to the port of embarkation in order to meet with our coach transfer.

Airports and railway stations

For cruises starting and/or ending in Oban and Greenock the nearest transport terminals are Glasgow Central Railway Station and Glasgow International Airport.

For cruises starting and/or ending in Portland the nearest transport terminals are Weymouth Railway Station and Southampton Airport.

For cruises starting and/or ending in London the nearest transport terminals are cental London railway stations.

Private coach transfers

Guests travelling by rail or air to embark in Greenock, Oban, Portland or London will be collected at the railway stations or airports listed and transported by coach to join *Hebridean Princess*.

Secure car parking

A valet car parking facility is provided for cruises starting and ending in Oban and secure car parking is available for Greenock and Portland departures.

Door-to-door transfers

As an added touch of luxury, our door-to-door service makes it possible for you to enjoy the comfort of chauffeur driven travel from most places in the UK to your embarkation port, or any UK railway station or airport.

Luggage transfers

You may prefer to extend your cruise with a pre- or post-cruise hotel stay and many of our hotel partners, like *Hebridean Princess*, are members of Connoisseurs Scotland or Pride of Britain Hotels.

Cruises that start and finish in different ports

For cruises that embark and disembark in different ports, trouble-free arrangements have been made by our reservations staff.

Heart of Argyll to Oban 20th to 27th March 2018 Greenock to Oban

Coach transfers will be provided from Glasgow Central Railway Station and Glasgow International Airport to Greenock at the start of the cruise, and from Oban to Glasgow International Airport and Glasgow Central Railway Station at the end of the cruise.

Car parking is available at Greenock and a complimentary transfer will be provided from Oban to Greenock on the day of disembarkation for guests wishing to utilise the car parking facility in Greenock.

Isles of Scilly and Celtic Coasts 10th to 20th July 2018 Oban to Portland

Coach transfers will be provided from Glasgow Central Railway Station and Glasgow International Airport to Oban at the start of the cruise, and from Portland to Weymouth Railway Station and Southampton Airport at the end of the cruise.

France, Belgium and the River Thames 30th July to 8th August 2018 Portland to London

Coach transfers will be provided from Weymouth Railway Station and Southampton Airport at the start of the cruise, and from *Hebridean Princess* to central London railway terminals at the end of the cruise.

Treasures of Normandy and the Channel Isles 8th to 17th August 2018 London to Portland

Transfers will be provided from central London railway terminals to *Hebridean Princess* at the start of the cruise, and from Portland to Weymouth Railway Station and Southampton Airport at the end of the cruise.

British Isles Explorer 17th to 27th August 2018 Portland to Oban

Coach transfers will be provided from Weymouth Railway Station and Southampton Airport at the start of the cruise, and from Oban to Glasgow International Airport and Glasgow Central Railway Station at the end of the cruise.

Paradise Islands of Argyll 23rd to 30th October 2018 Oban to Greenock

Coach transfers will be provided from Glasgow Central Railway Station and Glasgow International Airport to Oban at the start of the cruise, and from Greenock to Glasgow International Airport and Glasgow Central Railway Station at the end of the cruise.

Car parking is available at Greenock and a complimentary transfer will be provided from Greenock to Oban on the day of embarkation for guests wishing to utilise the car parking facility in Greenock.



On board A-Z

Animals

We regret that no animals are permitted on board the vessel other than assistance dogs accompanying disabled passengers.

Binoculars

Wildlife lovers may wish to bring binoculars as there are only a limited number on board for loan.

Communications

There are iPads in the Library and Wi-Fi access is available.

Mobile phones should be switched off in public rooms. The cellular system in the Highlands and Islands is somewhat patchy and reception can be irregular.

In an emergency, the ship can be reached by satellite phone, full details of which will be forwarded prior to your cruise.

Dining and restaurant arrangements

The Columba Restaurant is sufficiently large for all guests to dine at the same time. The majority of tables are for two, but should guests wish to dine together we shall be delighted to reserve a table for a maximum of eight. Guests travelling on their own will be seated at a larger table, usually hosted by an Officer, unless they indicate otherwise.

Special diets: We can cater for most dietary preferences, with the exception of strict kosher and one or two other regimes. Special requests should be included in the Pre-Cruise Questionnaire; our reservations staff will be pleased to advise you.

Dress and footwear

Daytime: During the day dress is casual. It is advisable to bring suitable clothing for the area in which you will be cruising.

Evening: For dinner in the evening, guests prefer to dress more formally, with a jacket and tie for gentlemen and the equivalent for ladies.

Gala evenings: The recommended dress code for Gala evenings is black tie for gentlemen and evening wear for ladies, although this is by no means mandatory.

On these evenings, the Officers will wear formal dress. The number of Gala evenings depends on the length of the cruise, but as a guideline, two formal Gala Dinners will be held during a seven-night cruise.

Footwear: Non-slip shoes should be worn on deck and in the ship's small boats when going ashore. Some cruises visit remote locations where heavy-soled shoes or walking boots are recommended for shore visits and serious walking.

Footloose cruises: In addition to walking boots, we recommend that guests protect themselves against the unpredictable weather with waterproof clothing; we would stress that jeans are considered unsuitable. A reasonably sized rucksack would also be useful.

Electricity supply

The electricity supply on *Hebridean Princess* is 240v AC and standard UK 3-pin sockets are provided in cabins. If guests wish to use 110v equipment, a transformer will be required – a limited supply is available on board for loan. The ship also carries adaptors for European and US style plugs, obtainable from the Housekeeper.

Going ashore

Since many of the places on our itineraries are unsuitable for berthing alongside, *Hebridean Princess* is equipped with sturdy and seaworthy tenders to transport guests ashore. Buoyancy aids are provided and must be worn in all small boat operations. **Please note, however, that use of the ship's tenders does require a certain degree of agility**. If in doubt, guests with physical disabilities and elderly or infirm passengers

guests with physical disabilities and elderly or infirm passengers should contact our reservations staff before booking.

Our itineraries are planned to allow frequent visits ashore to interesting and unusual places, but participation is by no means compulsory. The emphasis is on pleasing one's self. As alternatives, we can usually suggest an independent stroll or a more serious walk ashore, perhaps a bike ride or, as many guests have discovered, the relaxation of staying on board.

Gratuities

Hebridean operates a 'no tipping' policy.

Hebridean shop

There is a small shop on board selling souvenirs and a basic supply of essentials. Cigarettes and tobacco products are not sold on board. As many of the areas we visit are remote, it may not be possible to purchase specialised items such as specific camera equipment, batteries, etc.

On board leisure

Hebridean Princess boasts a well-stocked library, and a card and games area with a range of board games, jigsaws, chess and backgammon. Gym equipment is available on the Waterfront Deck. There is no organised gambling, apart from the occasional 'frog race' to raise money for charity. Each cabin is equipped with satellite television; should you wish to view a DVD in your cabin, a number of DVD players are available for this purpose and DVDs may be borrowed from the Library.

Payment of shipboard accounts

The currency on board is pounds sterling. Payment of shipboard accounts may be made in sterling, either debit or credit Visa or Mastercards, or cheques; sterling travellers cheques are also accepted.

Sailing

Most sailing on *Hebridean Princess* is scheduled to take place over breakfast and lunch, apart from overnight sailings to St. Kilda. Smaller ships tend to have a certain amount of vibration and some noise is inevitable when the main engines are running. At night, a sound insulated generator supplies domestic power to the vessel.

Smoking

Smoking is not allowed inside the vessel at any time and is not permitted in cabins. Smoking is allowed only on the outer decks, and guests occupying balcony cabins are asked to show consideration to other balcony users.

Stairs

Please note that there are no lifts (elevators) on board *Hebridean Princess* and, although well equipped with handrails, some of the ship's stairways are steep, particularly those from the Princess Deck to the Waterfront and Hebridean Decks.

Valuables

A small safe is provided in your cabin to secure valuables. Hebridean cannot accept any responsibility for loss or damage to guests' valuables.

What you need to know

Disabled facilities

If wheelchair users wish to cruise with us, they must be accompanied by a fare-paying able-bodied companion to assist them on board and ashore. Wheelchair access may be limited. Entrances to the vessel have raised coamings and almost all cabins have a raised lip or step from bedroom to bathroom. Please note that bedroom doors are no wider than 70cm. As the vessel does not carry a supply of narrow wheelchairs for general use, guests should check that their own chair is of a suitable width.

Although well equipped with handrails, some of the ship's stairways are steep, particularly those from the Princess Deck to the Waterfront and Hebridean Decks. As there are no lifts (elevators), the severely disabled or handicapped may find their enjoyment of the cruise impaired if they experience difficulty in moving between decks and over coamings between cabins and bathrooms.

Fitness on board and ashore

Many of our visits ashore call for reasonable walking ability if guests are to gain maximum enjoyment from the cruise. As many are to lesser-known and remote places, there are frequently landing stages, steps, slopes and rough ground to contend with. We therefore reserve the right not to take a guest on a particular visit if we feel that it would be beyond his or her capabilities or might affect the enjoyment of fellow guests. If you are uncertain of your ability to participate in these activities, please contact our reservations staff to discuss the route in detail before confirming your booking. Those requiring wheelchairs and/or regular assistance in order to participate in shore visits must be accompanied by a fare-paying, able-bodied companion to assist them.

We can usually organise alternative self-guided walks ashore for less agile guests to enjoy at their own pace, or make other arrangements, including taxis, at guests' own cost.

Health

When booking, guests must advise Hebridean of particular health conditions necessitating special precautions and of any subsequent change. It is the responsibility of each guest to inform Hebridean of any prevailing condition which may affect them on board or ashore and, equally, other guests' ability to enjoy to the full any shore visits during their cruise. Please refer to the section 'Fitness on board and ashore' relating to the requirements for able-bodied companions.



Ship's Telegraph

Itinerary detail and variations

Cruise itineraries are published in good faith but may have to be altered on board to take into account climatic, geographical, political and other factors over which Hebridean or its agents have no control. We shall do our best to minimise alterations and their potential effect on guests.

While the Captain will do his utmost to follow the itinerary, he will, where appropriate, adapt the route to suit the prevailing and forecast weather conditions. The Captain's decision is always final. If such amendments need to be made at short notice, we cannot make any financial adjustments. Please see page 4 of the 2018 Cruise Diary & Tariff for our Conditions of Business.

Medical facilities

Guests are advised to pack all necessary medical supplies, as our ports of call are generally off the beaten track and may lack facilities. If guests intend to bring any electrical or electronic medical equipment, they should first check with our reservations staff that it is compatible with the ship's 240v electricity supply.

Hebridean Princess does not routinely carry a doctor as she is never far from land. Guests should ensure that, to their knowledge, they are fit to take a holiday during which immediate medical assistance may not be available. Arrangements to consult a doctor on land can be made at relatively short notice and assistance can be summoned quickly in the event of an emergency. Any medical and repatriation costs will be charged to the guest's account.

The ship's Officers are trained in first aid and a comprehensive medical supply is kept for emergency use.

Minors

We regret that children under the age of nine cannot be accommodated.

Single room occupancy

Ten of our cabins are designed and let on a single occupancy basis. Once these cabins have been booked, solo guests requesting a double cabin for single occupancy will be charged a supplement of 85% of the per-person fare for that cabin grade. Please refer to the Cabin Facilities and Dimensions Guide in the inside back cover or contact our reservations staff for further details.






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Promenade Deck (No 4 Deck level)




