




From Europe to the Middle East

A midsummer cruise to discover the highlights of Norway. Depart historic Portsmouth for Florø, a pretty waterfront town, cross the Arctic Circle, to enter the land of the midnight sun and Bodø, home to the world's strongest maelstrom.

Tromsø's most recognisable landmark is the Arctic Cathedral, built in 1965 and inspired by northern landscapes. Learn about the Arctic's daring explorers before cruising to Honningsvåg and then drive across the tundra to the high sea cliffs of the North Cape. Visit Sortland in the remote Vesteralen Islands and Leknes on the rugged Lofoten Islands, delighting in these islands' spectacular scenery and colourful fishing villages.

Minerva then cruises the mighty Sognefjord to Flåm, where you can board the famous Flåm Railway – one of the world's steepest mountain railways on normal guage – to Vatnahalsen, passing spectacular waterfalls and stunning scenery en route. In Bergen take the funicular to the top of Mount Fløien for spectacular views over the city or enjoy an enigmatic piano recital of Grieg's music inspired by the

land and seascapes of Norway before *Minerva* heads south to Portsmouth.



Cruise up the Tagus River to Lisbon, passing the Monument to the Discoveries, to visit the magnificent Manueline Jeronimos Monastery. Continue through the Straits of Gibraltar to Spain.

From Motril travel to the Moorish Alhambra Palace in Granada to marvel at its richly decorated interior. Cartagena is one of Spain's hidden gems, its city centre a dense mass of narrow streets which conceal a well preserved Roman Theatre. On the beautiful island of Sardinia discover Cagliari's evocative medieval centre and follow in the footsteps of the Romans to Tunisia to explore the ruins of Carthage, legacy of Rome's supremacy in this region.

Trapani, on the volcanic island of Sicily, was once situated at the heart of a powerful trading network that stretched from Carthage to

Venice, while off the shores of Sicily, lies Lipari, one of the volcanic Aeolian islands. Conclude your cruise in the colourful, crowded city of Naples, where Vesuvius looms over the ruined Roman cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum.

Professor of Mediterranean History at Cambridge University and Fellow of the British Academy. He has written extensively on the history of the Mediterranean and Atlantic, especially southern Italy, Sicily and Spain. His best-selling *The Great Sea: A Human History of the Mediterranean* was published by Penguin Books in 2011 for which he was awarded one of the inaugural British Academy Medals in 2013.

PROFESSOR CHRISTOPHER ANDREW

is Emeritus Professor of Modern and Contemporary History at Cambridge University, Honorary Professor at Queen's University, Belfast, former Visiting Professor at Harvard, Toronto and Canberra, and Honorary Air Commodore. Christopher Andrew's *Defence of the Realm*, written as Official Historian of MI5, was 2010's 'Politics' best-seller.

DR MERI ARICHI is Senior Teaching Fellow in the Department of History of Art and Archaeology at SOAS, the University of London. She received her PhD from SOAS in 2003 and a post-doctoral fellowship from the CSJR (Centre for the Study of Japanese Religions) at SOAS in 2003/4. Her area of research interest is Buddhist art of Japan, particularly focusing on the Shinto-Buddhist syncretism in medieval Japan. She has been teaching History of Japanese Art at SOAS since 2007.

PROFESSOR IAN BECKETT FRHistS is





DR ROBERT BRADNOCK is a Senior Visiting Research Fellow in Geography at King's College London and Associate Research Fellow at Chatham House. His main interests are in the fields of geopolitics and environment. He was Director of the Geopolitics Research Centre at the School of Oriental and African Studies, a founder of the Journal *Geopolitics*, and Head of the Department of Geography at SOAS. His major research has been in the political and environmental geography of South Asia and its region. His latest book is *An Atlas of South Asian Affairs*.

ROFESSOR DAVID BRAUND MA PhD (Cantab) DLitt (Batumi) has been working in the Mediterranean and in the Black Sea region for over 30 years, mostly on ancient history and archaeology. He has spent most of his career at Exeter University, where he has been Professor of Black Sea & Mediterranean History since 1996. Fluent in Russian, Georgian and Modern Greek, he is currently completing a book on Artemis and Aphrodite. In 2014 he is an Onassis Fellow in Greece.

SIR TONY BRENTON KCMG is a

distinguished British diplomat and a fellow of Wolfson College Cambridge where he is writing a book on Russia at the time of Peter the Great. He joined the British Diplomatic Service in 1975. In a 33 year career he served in the Arab world, the European Union, the USA and Russia; he was British Ambassador in Moscow (2004-2008) during the most difficult period in British/Russian relations.

THE VERY REV'D DAVID BRINDLEY has been Dean of Portsmouth since 2002. He has worked in a variety of parochial and academic appointments, including Rector of Warwick and Principal of an ordination training college. He is particularly interested in the interplay between theology and history, and also has an interest in the relationship between religion and the arts.

THE REVD PROFESSOR HUDITH

BROWN was born in India and educated in England. As an academic, specialising in South Asia and wider aspects of imperial history, she taught as a Fellow of Girton College, in Manchester University, and then in Oxford, as Beit Professor of Commonwealth History and Professorial Fellow of Balliol College (1990-2011). Most of her writing has been on modern Indian politics (with biographical studies of Gandhi and of Nehru), the South Asian diaspora, and more generally on the British empire. She trained for ordination at Cuddesdon.

MR ANDY BUNTEN is an obsessive enthusiast about wildlife, who obtained degrees in Zoology and Environmental Technology at Newcastle and Imperial College, before embarking on a career in nature conservation. He has worked for local government, wildlife trusts, and, for 26 years, the RSPB. Now a Consultant, Andy is an enthusiastic traveller who has led wildlife groups to numerous destinations around the world.

DR ANDREW BURNETT CBE FBA was, until recently, Deputy Director of the British Museum, having spent his earlier career in the museum's Department of Coins and Medals, being Keeper from 1992 – 2003. His books include Coinage in the Roman World and the first two volumes of Roman Provincial Coinage. Dr Burnett was appointed a CBE in the 2012 New Year Honours List for services to The British Museum and Numismatics. He is currently a Trustee of the Royal Armouries and an Honorary Professor of UCL.

CANON DR RUPERT BURSELL QC was called to the Bar and ordained in the same year and, since 1968, has combined the professions of priest and lawyer. A former honorary chaplain to the TA intelligence battalion, he is Chancellor of the Diocese of Durham and Chancellor Emeritus of the Diocese of Oxford, Chairman of the Legal Advisory Commission of the General Synod of the Church of England and an honorary Canon of Christ Church, Oxford.

DR PETER CADDICK-ADAMS TD FRHS was educated at Sandhurst and Wolverhampton University. Since May 1999 he has lectured at the UK Defence Academy where he gained his PhD. He has also served in the Regular and Reserve Forces and was NATO Historian in Bosnia (1996-7), and UK Historian in Iraq (2003). His recent books are *Monty and Romnel: Parallel Lives* (2011) and *Monte Cassino: Ten Armies in Hell* (2012). One of the UK's most experienced battlefield guides, Peter has led over 200 visits to more than 50 battlefields around the world.

DR PETER CATTERMOLE Formerly a lecturer in volcanology and planetary geology at the Universities of Sheffield and UCW Aberystwyth, Peter was for many years a Principal Investigator with NASA's Planetary Geology and Geophysics Program, specialising in the study of volcanoes on Mars and Venus. Peter has travelled widely, working in South America, the Atlantic Islands and the Mediterranean. He has written 20 books and many academic papers, several in collaboration with the late Sir Patrick Moore.

THE RT REVD & RT HON DR RICHARD CHARTRES KCVO DD FSA has been the 132nd Bishop of London and Dean of the Chapels Royal since 1995. After reading history at Trinity College, Cambridge, he taught ancient history in the International School in Seville. He served as Gresham Professor of Divinity for some years and was elected as a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries after writing the history of Gresham College. Dr Chartres has also published in the field of science, religion and the environment.

MISS THEODORA CLARKE is an expert
on Russian and Soviet art and lectures
widely on classical and modern painting.
She attained her Masters at the Courtauld
Institute of Art. She is the Director of

Russian Art Week in London and edits the online arts magazine Russian Art and Culture. As a freelance art critic she has written for The Telegraph and The Burlington Magazine. Her latest book on contemporary and avant-garde art is *Re-imagining Russia*.

LIEUTENANT COLONEL ANTHONY COUTTS-BRITTON served as an infantry officer before pursuing a second career with NATO and its Partnership for Peace Programme. He is a history lecturer and battlefield guide. He specialises in the wars of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries making the Balkans and the Black Sea Region a specific area for study.

PROFESSOR SIR BARRY CUNLIFFE CBE is Emeritus Professor, European Archaeology, Oxford University. He has excavated widely in Britain, France and Spain. He has served as a Governor of the Museum of London, President of the Society of Antiquities and the Council for British Archaeology, Trustee of the British Museum and Commissioner of English Heritage. His most recent book is *Britain Begins* (2013). He is now working on a book about the prehistory and early history of Eurasia.

SIR RICHARD DALES KCVO CMG is a former Ambassador to Norway and High Commissioner to Zimbabwe. He retired in 2002 after 38 years in the Diplomatic Service. Since retirement, he has been Chairman of the Anglo-Norse Society and a member of the Governing Council of the University of East Anglia and was Chairman of International Alert from 2006 to 2010.

MR STEPHEN DUFFY has recently retired as Senior Curator at the Wallace Collection. Educated at Oxford University, his specialist interest is the art

of the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, but he is also fascinated by many other periods. A very experienced lecturer and exhibition organiser, his books include *The Discovery of Paris, Richard Parkes Bonington* and (with Jo Hedley) *The Wallace Collection's Pictures: A Complete Catalogue.*

MR TIM EARL has his roots in Guernsey where he still does a little wildlife journalism although he has recently moved to the Isle of Man. Most of his time is spent leading wildlife tours worldwide. He co-authored the *Insight Guide to the Channel Islands* shortly after writing *Explore Guernsey*. He helped set up most of the island's nature reserves including one at L'Eree which is now part of a Ramsar wetland site of international importance.

1985-2002. He was in the Foreign &











He has a particular interest in the origins of Christianity across the region and an understanding of contemporary issues confronting Christians in Palestine/Israel, Syria, Iraq and Egypt, who see their history and their destiny bound up with the countries where they live and with the dominant Muslim/Jewish culture.

THE REVD ROBIN GRIFFITH-JONES worked at Christie's after leaving Oxford and, prior to ordination, worked with Mother Teresa's Sisters in India and with the long-term homeless in London. Appointed Master of the Temple Church, London, in 1999, he has written books on the gospels, St Paul and Mary Magdalene, and has edited books on the Temple Church and on Islam and English Law.

MS JOANNA HARDY FGA DGA FRSA is



a gemmologist and an independent jewellery specialist with over 30 years' experience in the jewellery industry. She trained as a goldsmith before working at

De Beers, where she valued and graded rough diamonds. As a polished diamond dealer she worked in Antwerp, Tel Aviv and Mumbai, and later joined Philips Auctioneers. For 14 years she was a senior specialist and auctioneer in the iewellery department at Sotheby's, London, Joanna is a Freeman of the City of London and Liveryman of the Goldsmiths Company.

PROFESSOR LORD (RICHARD) HARRIES OF PENTREGARTH FRSL is an Emeritus Gresham Professor and an Honorary Professor of Theology at KCL. He has written 26 books on the interface of Christian faith and wider culture, including the arts, his most recent book being The Image of Christ in Modern Art. After retiring as Bishop of Oxford in 2006 he was made a Life Peer and continues to be active in the House of Lords.

MR GEORGE HART was principal lecturer on the British Museum's antiquities collections from Egypt, Greece, the Levant and the civilisations of the ancient world. For 12 years he was Chairman of the Friends of the Petrie Museum of Egyptian Archaeology, and is on the Board of Trustees of

the Egypt Exploration Society. He is also an

editorial advisor on its bulletin, Egyptian Archaeology. He has written books on Egyptian mythology and religion and is the author of a two-volume history of the Pharaohs.

PROFESSOR CHARLES HIGHAM FBA is Research Professor at the University of Otago, New Zealand, a Fellow of the Royal Society of New Zealand and an Honorary Fellow of St Catharine's College, Cambridge. For over 40 years he has undertaken archaeological fieldwork in Southeast Asia and southern China, his most recent research involving the origins of the civilisation of Angkor. His books include an Encyclopaedia of Asian Civilisations, The Civilisation of Angkor and Early Mainland Southeast Asia: from First Humans to Angkor.


PROFESSOR TOM HIGHAM is a Professor of Archaeological Science at the University of Oxford. He is a specialist in archaeological dating, using radiocarbon methods. He is also the Director of the Advanced Studies Centre at Keble College, Oxford, where he is a Fellow by Special Election. He is originally from New Zealand.

PROFESSOR CAROLE HILLENBRAND OBE FBA is currently Professor of Islamic History at the University of St Andrews. In 2005 she was awarded the King Faisal International Prize in Islamic Studies - the first non-Muslim ever to receive this award. She has published six books and many articles on the Crusades, Islam, and Muslim history. She was awarded an OBE in the 2009 New Year's Honours List.

PROFESSOR ROBERT HILLENBRAND

FBA taught Byzantine art for many years at Edinburgh University. He is an Emeritus Professor of Fine Art at Edinburgh University, and is currently Professor of Islamic Art at St Andrew's University. His 170 publications include prize-winning books on Islamic architecture and Islamic painting. He has held visiting professorships at seven universities and was Slade Professor of Art at Cambridge in 2008.

PROFESSOR ANDREW HOPKINS is



L'Aquila and is a recognised authority on Italian architecture. He has been a fellow at Harvard University's Villa I Tatti in Florence, the Center for Advanced Studies in the Visual Arts at the National Gallery in Washington D.C., the Getty Research Institute in Los Angeles and at the British School at Rome. His books include Italian Architecture from Michelangelo to Borromini (Thames & Hudson's World of Art series (2002), and Baldassare Longhena and Venetian Baroque Architecture for Yale University Press (2012).

PROFESSOR TONY HOPKINS is Emeritus Smuts Professor of Commonwealth History at the University of Cambridge and a Fellow of Pembroke College. He is known for his work on international history, the British Empire, and globalization. He is a Fellow of the British Academy and holds honorary doctorates from the Universities of Stirling and Birmingham

THE RT REVD GRAHAM JAMES read history at the University of Lancaster and completed his theological training at Oxford prior to his ordination in 1975. He was appointed Bishop of St Germans in his native Cornwall in 1993 and translated to Norwich in 1999. He is the lead bishop for the Church of England on media issues. He entered the House of Lords in 2004, and currently serves on the Select Committee on Communications.

PROFESSOR COLIN JONES FBA is

Professor of History at Queen Mary University of London and an historian of France. He has taught at universities in Britain, France and the United States, President of the Royal Historical Society (2009-2012), his books include The Cambridge Illustrated History of France (1994), The Great Nation: France from Louis XV to Napoleon (2002), Paris: Biography of a City (2004) and, forthcoming in summer 2014, The Smile Revolution in 18th-century Paris.

DR MARA KALNINS is a Life Fellow of Corpus Christi College and former University of Cambridge Reader in Modern Literature. She has published extensively in nineteenth and twentieth century studies, has edited several volumes in the scholarly Cambridge University Press edition of D H Lawrence, and is General Editor of Conrad's works for Oxford University Press. Her most recent book - The Ancient Amber Routes: Travels from Rīga to Byzantium explores the cultural links between the Baltic and the civilisations of classical antiquity.

DR STEVE KERSHAW As a Classics Tutor for Oxford University Department for Continuing Education, Professor of History of Art for Rhodes College and the University of the South, and as a lecturer for the V&A. Steve Kershaw has travelled extensively in the world of the Greeks and Romans both physically and intellectually. His books include A Brief Guide to the Greek Myths and A Brief History of the Roman Empire.

MR STUART LAING was elected Master of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, in 2008, following a career in the British Foreign Service. Specialising in Arab and Middle Eastern affairs, he served in Saudi Arabia and in Cairo and then as Deputy Ambassador in Riyadh. He was appointed High Commissioner to Brunei, Ambassador in Muscat and Ambassador in Kuwait Stuart researches on Arab and East African history and is the co-author of a book on Omani-British history, Unshook Till the End

REAR ADMIRAL JOHN LIPPIETT CB CBE had a 36 year career in the Royal Navy culminating in three jobs as Rear Admiral. His book, War and Peas: Intimate Letters from the Falklands War, based on his experiences 'Down South', was broadcast on BBC radio to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the war. He became Chief Executive of the Mary Rose Trust in 2003 and has overseen the creation of a stunning new museum which opened in 2013.

MR NIGEL McGILCHRIST was a scholar at Winchester College and a First Class graduate from Oxford, and has lived and worked in the Mediterranean - Italy, Greece and Turkey - for 30 years. He is author of the twenty-volume series of cultural guides to the Greek Islands,

McGilchrist's Greek Islands, and of the *Blue Guide* to *The Aegean Islands*. He lectures widely in art and archaeology at museums and institutions in Europe and the USA.

THE REVD PROFESSOR TERESA MORGAN is University Lecturer in Ancient History, Fellow of Oriel College, Oxford, and an associate priest in the parish of Littlemore. A historian of culture and *mentalité*, she has written extensively on Greek and Roman education, ethics, and early Christianity. She has also written two popular religious books: *Seasons of the Spirit* and *Every-Person Ministry*.

MR JEREMY PATERSON taught ancient history for nearly 40 years at Newcastle University, where he was also Dean of Arts. He studied in Oxford and at the British School at Rome. Although primarily a social and economic historian, his research and publications range widely and include the ancient wine trade, the archaeology of the Roman Empire, early Christianity, and Cicero. He also chairs the Minimus project to introduce Latin in primary schools.

THE RT REVD STEPHEN PLATTEN, recently retired as Bishop of Wakefield, is a well-travelled ambassador in international affairs, and was for a number of years lead speaker on this for the Bishops in the House of Lords. A former lecturer in theology and Dean of Norwich, he has written widely on theology and its historical and literary background. He is at present Rector of St Michael's Cornhill in the City of London and an assistant Bishop in that Diocese.

GENERAL THE LORD RICHARDS OF HERSTMONCEUX GCB CBE DSO has commanded operations in NI, East Timor, Sierra Leone, and Afghanistan. In 2010 he became Chief of the Defence Staff, the professional head of Britain's armed forces and their strategic commander as well as the PM's military adviser. He retired in 2013. His operational awards include a MiD, CBE, DSO and KCB; he was the first officer to receive an operational knighthood since WW2. A visiting Professor of Exeter University and a Fellow of Kings College London and Cardiff University, he has edited or contributed to a number of books. In 2011 he received the annual Churchill Award for leadership. He became Baron Richards of Herstmonceux in February 2014.

THE RT REVD BARRY ROGERSON retired as Bishop of Bristol in 2002 after forty years of ministry as parish priest, lecturer in theological colleges in England and overseas and, for many years, a member of the World Council of Churches. His interests lie in interfaith dialogue and history, with a growing penchant for post-colonial political history.

MISS LOUISE SCHOFIELD was, for 13 years, Curator of Greek Bronze Age and

years, Curator of Greek Bronze Age and Geometric Antiquities at the British Museum, publishing widely on the Minoans and the Mycenaeans. Since leaving the British Museum she has made a

leaving the British Museum she has made a programme with the BBC's Horizon team on Mycenae and the truth behind the story of the Greek sack of Troy. Her book *The Mycenaeans*

(2007, reprinted 2013) looks in detail at the Bronze Age Greeks and at their relationship with their neighbours on Crete, Santorini and the coast of Asia Minor.

PROFESSOR GARY SHEFFIELD is

Professor of War Studies at the University of Wolverhampton. A leading military historian with particular expertise in the two world wars, he has published many books including, most recently, *The First World War in 100 Objects* (2013) and *A Short History of the First World War* (forthcoming in 2014). He regularly broadcasts on radio and television, writes for the national press, and leads tours to the world's battlefields.

MR ADRIAN SINDALL CMG has – among other diplomatic postings – been British Ambassador to Syria and Deputy Ambassador to Jordan. Since leaving the FCO he has been Chairman of the Arab British Centre in London, of the Council for British Research in the Levant and has served as a Council Member of the Centre for Near and Middle East Studies at SOAS, London University.

DR MICHAEL SQUIRE is Lecturer in Classics at King's College London, with a special interest in Graeco-Roman art and the history of its reception. His books include Panorama of the Classical World (2nd ed. 2008), Image and Text in Graeco-Roman Antiquity (2009), The Iliad in a Nutshell: Visualizing Epic on the Tabulae Iliacae (2011) and The Art of the Body: Antiquity and its Legacy (2011).

She read chemistry at Oxford University and studied paintings conservation at the Courtauld Institute of Art. THE VERY REVD VICTOR STOCK has discussed Religion and Science with Brian Cox, taken people to Amsterdam, St Petersburg and Venice, hosted 15 years of Dialogues at St Mary le Bow and, for 10 years, was Dean of Guildford. In retirement he looks at pictures and enjoys being a Priest Vicar at Westminster Abbey.

PROFESSOR TONY STOCKWELL is Emeritus Professor of Modern History, Royal Holloway, University of London. His interest in Southeast Asia began in 1965-66 as a VSO teacher in Sarawak. He has published extensively on British imperial history and the recent history of Southeast Asia. He is on the Council of the Royal Asiatic Society, of which he has twice been president.

SIR ROY STRONG FRSL is an historian, broadcaster, diarist and gardener. He is a former Director of the V&A and of the National Portrait Gallery. A prolific writer on a wide range of subject matter his latest books are *Visions of England* (2011) and *Self-Portrait as a Young Man* (2013). He has a keen interest in the British Raj and in recent years has been exploring what remains of its architecture and artefacts on the Indian subcontinent.



The balance is due from your travel agent no later than 119 days prior to your sailing.

WHAT'S NOT INCLUDED IN YOUR CRUISE FARE

Flights; meals other than onboard your cruise (aboard Minerva); beverages (beer, wine, spirits, sodas) travel insurance; optional shore excursions; items of a personal nature; passport costs or visa fees; vaccinations (if required); transfers; pre- and/or post-cruise hotel accommodation and porterage.

Bookings in Australia and New Zealand may be made through your preferred travel agent.

PASSPORTS AND VISAS

Swan Hellenic requires a full 10 year Australia passport or full 5 year New Zealand passport with spare pages, valid for at least six months after the date of return for all Australian/New Zealand citizens. Depending on your cruise itinerary and countries visited, you may need to purchase and obtain required visas prior to departure from your home country. As there are limited foreign exchange facilities on board, we would recommend that you purchase any currency requirements you expect to need before you travel. There is little opportunity to visit banks whilst on excursions. For purchases ashore, many shops accept most Travellers' Cheques and major Credit Cards. A cashless system operates on board with passengers settling accounts at the end of the cruise.

Payment methods – Visa, Mastercard and American Express credit cards (2% surcharge), Visa debit cards only, Travellers Cheques and cash are accepted for payment of shipboard accounts. Personal cheques and Mastercard debit cards are not accepted.

ON BOARD BAR CREDIT

Where on board credit has been allocated, please note that this is for the use of non alcoholic or alcoholic drinks only purchased in the Minerva bars and restaurants. On board bar credit is non-transferable, non-refundable and cannot be exchanged for cash.

HEALTH, VACCINATIONS AND MEDICAL INFORMATION

As health regulations are ever changing, we recommend that you consult your GP a or travel clinic t least 12 weeks before your intended departure to check the latest requirements for the countries you will be visiting and take a copy of your itinerary and personal travel plans for review with your practitioner. It is your responsibility to ensure that you are fully protected with the appropriate vaccination certificate(s) for your cruise. Vaccination requirements are subject to change without notice. Any passenger arriving at the airport/port without the correct vaccination or exemption certificate (s) will be refused permission to board the ship. No passenger refund is applicable. Depending on the itinerary, passengers should consult their GP regarding the possibility of

taking a course of anti-malarial tablets prior to their departure.

Conditions of entry to each port vary according to the conditions set by each country and port authority and may differ to the advice given by the World Health Organisation and doctors. We have to abide by the latest information given to us by the port authorities that allow the ship entry to the port of call. In certain countries. Yellow Fever inoculations are mandatory for each passenger whether or not you intend to proceed ashore. You will be required to obtain and carry an original Yellow Fever certificate stamped by an authorised Yellow Fever Vaccination Centre. The certificate itself is valid from 10 days after vaccination for a period of ten years. If you are excused on medical grounds you will be required to obtain and carry an original Yellow Fever (charges apply) Exemption Certificate stamped by an authorised Yellow Fever Vaccination Centre. Certificates will be inspected upon embarkation. You will not be able to travel or embark the ship without a valid certificate as stated. Regulations requiring mandatory Yellow Fever Vaccinations and certificates are laid down by the local Port and Health Authorities, and the vessel will be unable to obtain entrance to certain ports if the correct paperwork, as stated above, is not available This requirement may differ from the advice given by the World Health Organisation and your local doctor Other countries recommend that precautions are taken against Malaria and other diseases. You should seek advice with regard to your personal itinerary, including pre/post voyage travel, as Malaria advice and/or prophylaxis may be recommended. Health advice varies from time to time depending on the situation of the country you are visiting. Seasonal influenza vaccination

If you do not normally enjoy good health, you should consult your doctor regarding the advisability of taking a cruise and being away from the usual medical and hospital facilities. Your insurance company must be advised of any pre-existing conditions at the time of booking and of any conditions arising subsequently prior to departure, otherwise your insurance may be invalid and you will be responsible for any costs arising from medical treatment or repatriation.

We ask you to advise us at the time of booking of any disability or illness so that we can advise our onboard medical team.



MEDICAL ATTENTION

We hope you will find it unnecessary to use the ship's medical facilities during your voyage. If, however, the occasion does arise, it is comforting to know that we do carry a fully qualified doctor and nurses. The doctor or nurse will make a charge for their services as well as requiring payment for any medicines or drugs needed. Such charges are normally reclaimable under your travel insurance, less any excess. In the unlikely event that you require urgent medical attention ashore, we will assist by contacting your insurer who will make the necessary arrangements for your treatment and repatriation.

BARS & ALCOHOL

Please note that bars may have to be closed for the sale of alcohol and cigarettes in certain waters. Only alcohol purchased in the ship's bars and restaurants may be consumed on Minerva.

DINING ARRANGEMENTS

Breakfast, lunch and dinner are arranged on an open sitting basis and may be taken in the Swan Restaurant or the Veranda. Opening times will vary according to the daily programme.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS

Our onboard telecommunications systems mean that you are never more than a telephone call away from your home or office. All cabins feature direct-dial telephones, whilst fax facilities are available at Reception. The Internet Lounge, situated on Bridge Deck, allows you to access your email account (please note certain types of access, including Skype and other VOIP protocols are blocked due to bandwidth restrictions). This also applies to Apple and MS programmes, such as iCloud. com which, because of band width restrictions, are also unavailable on board. Internet cards are available for purchase on board. WiFi is available for use on personal laptops in certain areas. Satellite coverage cannot be guaranteed. Kindle users; please note that you will not be able to access the mailbox, on your device, via the onboard WiFi system. Please use the terminals in the Internet Lounge.

ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES

Cabins and suites feature 220 volt current. The use of hair dryers, electric rollers, curling irons, electric shavers and other small appliances should be checked with Reception, but, for safety reasons, the use of travel irons and any personal tea/coffee making equipment is **strictly prohibited**. Each cabin is equipped with a hairdryer.

LAUNDRY & PRESSING

Valet service is available for laundry and pressing. A laundry bag and order form are provided in your cabin wardrobe. Some passengers may wish to make use of the self-service launderette on Aegean Deck – washing powder is provided. Dry cleaning is not available on board.

WHAT TO WEAR

As a general rule, for days on board and ashore, summer clothing/casual wear is the order of the day. It should be light, comfortable and easy to care for. A sweater and jacket for cooler evenings and a light raincoat are also advisable.

On cruises to northern latitudes, warmer, layered, windproof clothing will be necessary. On more southerly cruises the weather will usually be suitable for sunbathing, so don't forget your wrap, bathing suit, sunglasses, sunhat and sunscreen. For trips ashore and for getting into and out of the ship's tenders, comfortable, sturdy walking shoes are a must. You may also want to bring with you a camera, extra binoculars, an umbrella, suncreen and insect repellent.

In certain countries, shorts, short skirts, bare arms and shoulders will not be appreciated locally and you may be prohibited entry to certain sites. Please refer to the notes section in the Cruise Book for each excursion.

During the day, the general atmosphere on board is informal and casual clothing, including shorts, is perfectly acceptable. However, just as at a land based resort, we ask you to cover swimwear when entering the ship from the open decks. In the evening, the dress code varies according to your chosen restaurant. The Veranda is smart casual; for ladies that means dresses or blouses with skirts or trousers and, for gentlemen, long trousers and shirts with collars. In the Swan Restaurant gentlemen are required to wear a jacket

and tie. As a courtesy to other passengers, the dress code will be observed; please ensure you are correctly dressed to avoid any embarrassment on entering the Swan Restaurant for dinner in the evening. On formal nights (approximately two in a 15 day cruise), gentlemen are invited to wear black tie or dark suits and ladies to wear evening gowns or cocktail dresses.

SMOKING

Smoking is only permitted in designated areas on the open decks. Smoking outside these areas, including in cabins and on excursion coaches, is strictly prohibited.

EMERGENCY MUSTER DRILL

After embarkation and prior to Minerva setting sail there will be a full emergency muster station drill. This exercise is to give all passengers precise information on the correct route from their cabins to the places where they should muster in an emergency, together with instructions about life jackets and emergency procedures. This Muster Drill is a requirement of law and all passengers must attend.

NOISE

There are all kinds of noise associated with a working vessel when the ship is in motion. We recognise that tolerance levels vary so please contact the Reservations Department if you require further information before you book.

PORT HOLES

In rough weather or for operational and security reasons, port hole covers (known as deadlights) may need to be closed. Cabins with port holes are located on Baltic Deck. On cruises where the vessel sails through the Red and Arabian Seas, the vessel is subject to the requirements of the International Maritime Organisation for anti-piracy. The requirements are designed to protect the ship from the potential risk of attack, which includes the rigging of razor-wire and the closing of the cabin deadlights. The captain is required to comply with these requirements, which vary day to day dependent upon the reported level of risk.



GENERAL

SPECIAL REQUESTS

We are unable to accept 'conditional bookings'. Please advise any special requests clearly at the time of booking and we will do our best to comply with your wishes. We must point out that failure to fulfil a special request cannot be considered a breach of Contract on the part of the company.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

We particularly ask you to tell us in writing of any alterations to your address before departure, and in any communication, please state the cruise on which you are travelling.

DATA PROTECTION

Please be assured that we have methods in place to protect the personal booking information held by us. This information will be passed on to the principal and to the relevant suppliers of your travel arrangements. The information may also be provided to public authorities such as customs or immigration if required by them, or as required by law. Certain information may also be passed on to security or credit checking companies.

If you travel outside the EU, controls on data protection may not be as strong as the legal requirements in your country of residence. We will only pass your information on to persons responsible for your travel arrangements. This applies to any sensitive information that you give to us such as details of any disabilities or dietary/religious requirements. (If we cannot pass this information to the relevant suppliers, whether in the EU or not, we will be unable to accept your booking). In making your booking you consent to this information being passed on to the relevant persons

CHANGES TO YOUR CRUISE & ITINERARY

The information in this brochure outlines details of our carefully planned programme. Should any subsequent events cause us to change our plans or affect the published itinerary in any way, we will let passengers know as soon as possible. Disembarkation at anchorage ports are subject to local weather and sea

state conditions. However, in the event of war or threat of war, political unrest, terrorist activity, piracy, natural or nuclear disaster, we maintain the unreserved right to cancel, postpone or alter without prior consultation, any itinerary in whole or in part, in order to safeguard passengers, the ship and employees. GUEST SPEAKERS/SPECIALIST ENTERTAINMENT

If any of our confirmed Guest Speakers or specialist entertainers are unable to travel on their allotted cruise, Swan Hellenic reserves the right to engage alternative Guest Speakers, specialist entertainers or to alter the advertised programme.

OVERSEAS STANDARDS

It is a fact of life that when we travel to different countries, we often find that the customs, traditions and general pace at which things are done can be very different from what we are used to in Australia/New Zealand. In so far as standards of safety are concerned, the suppliers of services must comply with the rules and regulations of their own country and these are not always as strict as they are in Australia/New Zealand. Every care is taken to contract the best available transport. However, standards can vary and not all vehicles will have airconditioning or seat belts.

1 THE CONTRACT

- 1.1 The contract is between All Leisure Holidays Limited trading as "Swan Hellenic" ("The Company) and each person booking with the Company (including the parents or guardian of any person under 18 years of age) ("the Passengers"). Please note that information contained in the section headed "General Information" in our brochure or in these or any other comparable sections, and any other relevant information on our website also form part of your contract with the Company.
 1.2 The Lead Passenger warrants as a fundamental term of the
- 1.2 The Lead Passenger warrants as a fundamental term of the contract that he/she has read and agrees to these terms and conditions and has the authority by each Passenger named on the confirmation invoice to be bound by them. Furthermore that he/she is authorised by each passenger named on the confirmation invoice (and, where such passenger is under 18 years of age, by his/her parents or guardian) to enter into a contract with the Company on their behalf. Unless otherwise indicated, the Lead Passenger warrants that the Passenger information given may be used by the Company or its partners for future marketing purposes.
- 1.3 A binding contract comes in to place when you pay the full deposit (or where appropriate the full price) and a confirmation invoice is issued even if the Company is unable to confirm all holiday details (e.g. flights) at the time of booking. A confirmation invoice will be sent to the Lead Passenger. If you pay by credit card, a fee will be charged to your tour price. Fees differ by card type. Please contact us to obtain the applicable surcharge fee for your card type.
- 1.4 All details on the confirmation invoice (and on any additional documents produced by the Company) will be deemed to have been accepted unless the Company receives notification to the contrary, in writing, from the Lead Passenger immediately that the confirmation invoice is received. If you have not received your confirmation invoice within 7 days of booking your cruise please contact us immediately. If any errors are not immediately identified and reported, any cost of rectifying the same at a subsequent date must be met by the Passenger. Please note that Passengers not following these instructions will be fully liable for any costs that may subsequently be incurred in rectifying errors at a later date. v All invoices and vouchers must be checked by Passengers and the Company must be notified of any errors immediately.

- 1.7 The Company reserves the right to cancel bookings and levy cancellation charges on the scale in section 8 below if balance payments are not received in full 119 days before departure. Trave insurance (where purchased through us or directly with a third party) does not form part of your contract with the Company or of arry "package".

 1.8 The contract and all other proceedings arising out of or in connection with it shall be governed by English law and the jurisdiction of the English courts. If and in so far as a claim against the Company is governed EU Regulation 392/2009 relating to the Liability of carriers of passengers by sea in the event of accidents (or the Passenger Liability Regulation (EU 392/2009) or in respect of non-international carriage by the Athens Convention 1974 or 2002 and or in the case of river cruises. The Convention on Limitation of Liability for Maritime Claims 1996 (LLMC 96) as amended by SI 1998/1258 in the Court competent to hear such claims.

2 THE BOOKING PROCESS

- 2.1 A non-refundable deposit of AU\$1,000 or 10% of the total fare due, whichever is greater (or full payment for bookings taken within 19 days of departure) is due upon booking. A higher Deposit amount may be payable if any supplier(s) require additional payments for a service prior to the balance due date.  2.3 Passengers must be fit to travel. Any passengers with reduced mobility or with other physical or mental disabilities or conditions which may require special treatment or assistance (including Passengers who may require the use of a wheelchair) must advise the Company prior to booking. They may be required to complete a questionnaire and provide medical evidence of fitness to travel at the time of booking and upon receipt of which they may be asked to accept additional Booking Terms & Conditions before a confirmation invoice is issued and a contract entered into.  2.4 The Company may (at its discretion) offer Passengers at the time of booking a guaranteed cabin booking (a "Guarantee Cabin"). Under such offers a Passenger is guaranteed to receive a cabin of a specified type although the precise location of the cabin is at the Company's discretion. The Company may (at its discretion) upgrade a Guarantee Cabin to a higher category cabin at no additional cost to the Passenger. The Company may allocate specific cabins under guarantee offers at any time up until the Passenger arrives on the vessel at the port of embarkation. Once Guarantee Cabins have been allocated, the Company is unable to accept Passenger change requests. If Passengers book one or more back-to-back cruises and one or more cruise includes Guarantee Cabins, it is possible that Passengers may be allocated different cabins on each cruise and may need to move between cabins on changeover day(s).

3 PRICES AND SURCHARGES

3.1 The Company reserves the right to alter the published prices of any of the cruise holidays. Passengers will be advised of the current price of the holiday that they wish to book before any

contract is confirmed.

- 3.2 The price of the travel arrangements was calculated using exchange rates quoted in the appropriate brochure. Changes in transportation costs (including the cost of fuel, port costs, taxes or other fees) and exchange rates mean that the price of travel arrangements may change after booking. The Company reserves the right to adjust cruise/package prices accordingly at any time, however, the Company undertakes that no changes to the price will be made within 30 days of departure.
- 3.3 The Company will absorb and the Passenger will not be charged for, any increase equivalent to up to 2% of the total holiday cost (excluding insurance premiums and/or any amendment charges). The Company may, at its discretion, and subject to the approval of the relevant authority (ies), charge the Passenger any increase above 2% in respect of (i) transportation costs, including the cost of fuel, (ii) dues, taxes or fees chargeable for services such as landing taxes or embarkation or disembarkation fees at ports and airports, or (iii) the exchange rates applied to the package. If the increase is more than 10% of the price of their travel arrangements, Passengers will have the option of accepting a change to another holiday or cancelling and receiving a full return of all monies paid, except for any insurance premiums and amendment charges. If the Company is able to offer another holiday and this alternative holiday is of equivalent or higher price to the original holiday booked, then the Passenger will not have to pay more. - 3.5 All outstanding balances on on-board accounts must be settled in full before the Passenger disembarks the vessel. If any Passenger fails to settle their on-board account then the Company shall be entitled to take whatever steps may be necessary to recover the monies due and shall be entitled to pass on any costs incurred in doing so.
- 3.6 Passengers must be aware that the holiday price quoted may include different points of departure and return from/to the UK. In such cases there may be additional costs associated with transfer between the two places not included in the holiday price that will be passed on to the customer.
- 3.7 We may decide, at any time, to advertise Saver Fares on selected cruises or cabin grades. These are subject to availability and your cabin number will not be allocated at the time of booking.

4 OUR RESPONSIBILITY AND SHORE EXCURSIONS

- 4.1 Except where otherwise expressly stated in these booking conditions, we regret that the Company cannot accept liability or pay any compensation where the performance or prompt performance of our contractual obligations is prevented or affected by or you otherwise suffer any damage or loss as a result of Force Majeure. In this Contract, "Force Majeure" includes any event which the Company or any supplier of the service(s) in question could not even with all due care, forese or avoid. Such events may include (whether actual or threatened) war, riot, civil strife, terrorist activity, industrial dispute, natural or nuclear disaster, technical problems with transport, closure of airports, ports or airspace, changes of schedules by airlines, adverse weather conditions, epidemics, health risks and pandemics, fire, closed or congested airports or ports and all similar events outside the control of the Company and our suppliers.
- 4.2 The Company is not responsible for any improper or non-performance of any services of the package holiday which are wholly attributable to the fault of the Passenger, the unforeseeable or unavoidable act or omission of a third party unconnected with the provision of any of the services to be provided under the Contract; unusual and unforeseeable circumstances beyond the control of the Company and/or the relevant supplier, the consequences of which could not have been avoided even if all due care had been exercised including (but not limited to) an event of Force Majeure; or any event which the Company and / or relevant suppliers could not even with all due care have foreseen or forestalled. In the event that the Company is responsible for any death, injury or illness caused by the negligent acts and / or omissions of its suppliers of services which form part of the Package then the Company limits its liability, where applicable, by the International Conventions.
- 4.3 Where death and or personal injury and or loss of or damage to property occurs during carriage by air or by sea then the liability and the extent of damages recoverable will be dealt with by their conditions of carriage and the International Conventions set out in paragraphs 12 and 13 and not otherwise.
- 4.4 Where there is any loss of or damage to property including luggage which is not covered by any International Convention and where liability is not limited by reference to any enactment, terms or conditions, then any legal liability that the Company may have for any such losses or damage will not exceed £500 per Passenger.
- 4.5 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary elsewhere in this Contract, the Company shall not in any circumstances be liable to the Passenger for any loss or anticipated loss of profit, loss of revenue, loss of use, loss of contract or other opportunity nor for any other consequential or indirect loss or damage of a similar pattern.

- 4.6 Where the Company provides or sells a shore excursion to the Passenger the Passenger shall be bound by the terms and conditions of the supplier of the shore excursion supplier.

 4.7 The Company does not perform shore excursions which it sells to Passengers. These are performed by local operators who may themselves engage the services of third party suppliers. The Company will at all times endeavour to appoint reputable and competent operators who comply with all prevailing local rules,

- regulations and standards. It should be noted that, outside the UK, standards of hygiene, accommodation and transport might differ from comparable standards in the UK.
- 4.8 Local laws and regulations of the relevant country will be applied to assess the performance of suppliers and the Company. The Company's legal obligations will have been performed if the supplier has complied with local laws and regulations even if the laws of England have not been met.
- 4.9 Passengers should be aware that they may also be subject to terms and conditions imposed by local excursion operators.
- 4. 10 In the event of an excursion being cancelled, the Company will take all reasonable steps to ensure that Passengers are offered a choice of an alternative excursion and/or a full refund in the case of ontional excursions.

 4. 11 Passengers cancelling optional excursions prior to departure will be refunded in accordance with the schedule set out in clause \$1. Passengers cancelling optional excursions after departure will not be entitled to a refund. If in such cases the cancellation is due to ill health a supporting letter from the ship's Doctor (charges may apply) may enable Passengers to make a claim on their Travel Insurance Policy. Any Passenger that fails to attend an excursion for whatever reason will be deemed to have cancelled.
- 4. 12 Passengers wishing to change optional excursion details will be allowed to do so on presentation of the appropriate ticket(s) at the shore excursion desk during the acvertised opening hours and at least 72 hours prior to the ship's arrival in the excursion port. 5 TRAVEL INSURANCE

5.1 It is a condition of booking that each Passenger has adequate travel insurance in force from the time of deposit being made for the entire duration of the holiday. We suggest you discuss with your travel agent the various travel insurance policies that are available. Policies can be purchased that provide protection in the event of a trip cancellation, interruption, personal illness, injury, medical fees or damage to property. Verification of your travel insurance policy may be required by Swan Hellenic or its agents. 5.3 The Company is not responsible for checking that Passengers have the correct level of insurance and will not be liable for any costs, howsoever arising, in excess of any travel insurance cover purchased. In particular Passengers should check that their insurance arrangements cover all likely scenarios should they have to cancel their cruise.

6 PASSPORTS & VISAS

- 6.1 It is the responsibility of all Passengers to check and fulfil the passport, visa, and immigration requirements applicable to their itinerary. Passengers must check passport and visa requirements for their own specific circumstances with the relevant Embassies or Consulates as applicable.
- 6.2 Passengers must understand that passport, visa and immigration requirements do change. Passengers are responsible for checking the up to date position in good time before departure.
 6.3 The Company requires a full 10 year Australian passport or a full 5 year New Zealand passport with spare pages valid for at least six months after the date of return for all Australian/New Zealand citizens. Passengers, must check passport and visa requirements with the Embassy or Consulate of the country (ies) to or through which they intend to travel.
- 6.4 All Passengers must ensure that they have the correct travel documents in their possession before departure. Passengers may incur fines if they fail to comply with documentation or visa requirements. The Company will re-charge to the Passenger any such fines that have been paid by the Company on the Passenger's behalf.
- 6.5 The Company does not accept any responsibility for Passengers who are denied disembarkation or are unable to travel, or who incur any other loss because they fail to comply with any passport, visa, or immigration requirements. Cancellation of any part of the holiday that arises due to problems with visa/passport, or immigration requirements will be subject to cancellation charges set out in section 8.

7 CHANGES TO BOOKING DETAILS BY PASSENGERS

- 7.1 The Company will do its utmost to ensure that amendments requested by Passengers are accommodated, but the Company makes no guarantee that these requests will be met. Any change request must be made by the Lead Passenger and the Company reserves the right to pass on the costs of making any such changes. Passengers must be aware that charges associated with amendments are likely to increase nearer to the date of departure. 7.2 Additional passengers or cruises may be added to a booking at any time subject to availability. In each case a deposit (or full payment, as relevant) per additional Passenger will be required by the Company and all other booking conditions must be met before the new contract exists.
- 7.3 Requests for significant amendments to booking details (e.g. change of sail date) received before the balance due date will be treated as a new booking. At the Company's sole discretion, the original booking will either be deemed cancelled (and be subject to the cancellation charges set out in section 9), or will be deemed amended (and be subject to an Amendment fee of

AU\$200 per Passenger). A maximum of one change of sail date per booking will be considered for an Amendment fee of AU\$200 per Passenger as long as the change to the sail date is requested at least 119 days before the booked departure date. Any deposit paid, discount applied or promotion applicable to a booking that is cancelled or amended will only be transferred to a new booking at the Company's discretion. Any offers currently available on the cruise that the Passenger wishes to transfer their booking to will also only be applied at the Company's discretion.

7.4 For amendments to booking details received before the balance due date (e.g. passenger name changes) an administration charge of AU\$100per Passenger affected will be charged. If name changes are required to scheduled flight details the charge may be significantly more than \$100 per Passenger and will be quoted on request. Passengers should also be aware that airlines may not allow transfer of Passenger names and in such cases a flight booking might need to be cancelled and rebooked, subject to availability, and at the Passenger's expense 7.5 After an amendment is applied a new confirmation invoice will be issued at which point the contract will be deemed to be amended accordingly.

CANCELLATION BY A PASSENGER

8.1 A Passenger may cancel a booking at any time. Cancellation will take effect when the Company has received written notice of cancellation signed by the Lead Passenger. Cancellation charges payable to the Company are:

Cancellation and/or amendment fees charged by your travel agent and/or associated supplier are not included and may be additional to Swan Hellenic's fees as outlined above.

8.2 A Passenger will not have a right to exclusive occupancy of a cabin with two or more berths unless any applicable single occupancy premium has been paid. In the event of a Passenger becoming a single occupant of such a cabin due to a cancellation he/she will become liable to pay any applicable single occupancy premium.

CANCELLATION OR ALTERATION BY THE COMPANY

9.1 The Company reserves the right at its sole and absolute discretion at any time to cancel, postpone or alter without prior notice or consultation any cruise in whole or in part in order to safeguard its Passengers, its crew, its employees or the vessel in the event of war or threat of war, political unrest, terrorist activity or threat of terrorist activity, nuclear or natural disaster, riots, civil strife, adverse weather conditions or other similar events as provingly defined ["Experie Meigure"] for party whet yearlife. as previously defined ("Force Majeure") or for any other valid operational reason. If the majority of ports that the Company aims to visit during any one cruise have to be changed on UK Foreign Office advice before the cruise commences, the Compan undertakes to offer Passengers an alternative cruise or refund of the cost of their cruise in full.

9.2 If under clause 9.1 the Company cancels a cruise before the scheduled departure date it will offer, when possible, a subsequent alternative departure of similar standard (which must be accepted in writing within 14 days of the offer being made), or the choice of a full refund of all monies paid

9.3 If under clause 9.1 the Company cancels a cruise after the scheduled departure date, it will return all Passengers as soon as practicable to the UK and make a proportional refund for any unused services, less any non-recoverable expenses incurred 9.4 If under clause 9.1 the Company alters the planned itinerary only, refunds will be limited to any balances outstanding on shore

9.5 In any of the circumstances mentioned above the Company

s-still not be liable to pay any compensation, nor shall Passengers have any further claim against the Company.

9.6 The Company and the Captain of the ship are unable to guarantee that the ship will call at every advertised port or follow every part of the advertised route. They will at all times endeavour to maintain the advertised programme but reserve the right at their sole discretion to make any alternations they deem necessary. 9.7 The company also reserves the right to cancel any cruise by

9.7 The company also reserves in right to carbor any cruits or giving written notice at least eight weeks before departure if sales of that departure have not reached 70% of capacity. Under such circumstances clause 9.2 will apply and the Company shall not be liable to pay compensation, nor shall Passengers have any further claim against the Company.

9.8 The Company reserves the right at its sole and absolute discretion to use a substitute ship of similar standard to the original ship should it prove necessary to do so.

9.9 In addition to the rights of the Company, Aircraft and Ship's Captains always have the right at their absolute discretion to vary

captains always have the fight at their absolute inscituent or the any planned routing without prior notice or consultation if they deem it necessary to do so in the interests of safety.

9.10 Any flight details contained in the Company's brochures and on confirmation invoices are provisional. Final flight details (including timings and routings) will be issued near to departure and may differ significantly from any provisional information previously provided. previously provided

9.11 If for any reason details of a cruise have to be altered before departure (and subject to Clause 9.1) the Company will notify the Lead Passenger as soon as possible.

9.12 The Company will not be held responsible for nor have in the company will not be the respect of, delays caused by third parties during passage through sea areas controlled by vessel traffic schemes, canals, rivers or any other navigable waterways.

9.13 In respect of cruise travel where the port of embarkation is

in the EU and the Company reasonably expects the departure of a cruise to be delayed for more than 90 minutes beyond its scheduled departure time, Passengers departing from port terminal shall be offered free of charge snacks, meals or refreshments as are appropriate given the waiting time, provided they are available and can reasonably be supplied. If the delay in departure necessitates a stay of one or more nights or a stay additional to that intended by the passenger where and when physically possible the Company shall, subject to the Package Travel Regulations 1992, offer Passengers departing from port terminals free of charge adequate accommodation on board or ashore, and transport to and from the port terminal and place of accommodation in addition to the snacks, meals and refreshments previously referred to. The maximum amount that the company will pay for accommodation ashore and transport to and from the port terminal shall be equivalent to 80 Euros per person per night for a maximum of three nights. The company will not have an obligation to provide such accommodation ashore where the delay is caused by weather conditions endangering the operation of the ship.

PITNESS TO TRAVEL ON THE CRUISE SHIP, PREGNANCY, BEHAVIOUR, DISABILITY OR REDUCED MOBILITY, MEDICAL AND MOBILITY EQUIPMENT

10.1 The Company's priority is the comfort and safety of its Passengers who are asked to provide prior to booking as much information as possible regarding any special assistance that may be required in the port, during embarkation and on board the vessel. This information is required in order to ensure that the carrier is able to carry Passengers safely and in accordance with applicable safety requirements established by international, EU or national law or in order to meet safety requirements established by competent authorities including flag state.

10.2 Every Passenger warrants that he/she is fit to travel by sea and that his/her conduct or condition will not impair the safety of the cruise ship or inconvenience the other Passengers salesy of the dustes ship or inconvenence the owner assengery. The Company and the carrier reserve the right to require any Passenger to produce medical evidence of fitness to travel in order to assess whether that Passenger can be carried safely in accordance with applicable international, EU or national law. 10.3 For the purposes of EU 1177/2010 Disabled Person' or Person with Reduced Mobility includes any person whose mobility when using transport is reduced as a result of any physical disability (sensory or locomotor, permanent or temporary) intellectual or psychosocial disability or impairment, or any othe cause of disability, as a result of age, and whose situation needs appropriate attention and adaption to his particular needs for the service made available to all passengers. Passengers with Reduced Mobility and or Disabilities must advise at the time of booking of their specific needs with regard to accommodation, seating or services required from the carrier or terminal operator or their need to bring medical equipment, or to bring a recognised of their need to bring medical equipment, or bring a recognise assistance dog on board the vessel or of any other known disabilities or who in the Carrier's and or Master's opinion is unfit or unable to travel or anyone whose condition may constitute a danger to themselves or others on board on the grounds of safety. 10.4 The requirement to notify the Company at the time of booking of any medical equipment required on board is to ensure that the medical equipment can be lawfully carried and/or carried safely. It is the passenger's responsibility to ensure that all medical equipment is in good working order and for arranging enough equipment and supplies to last the entire voyage. The ship does not carry any replacement and access to shore side care and equipment may be difficult and expensive. Passengers must be

equipment may be difficult and expensive. Passengers must be able to operate all equipment.

10.5 If it appears to the Company or the carrier, the Master or the Cruise Ship's doctor that a Passenger is for any reason unfit to travel, likely to endanger safety, or likely to be refused permission to land at any port, or likely to render the Carrier liable for to land at any port, or linkely to fender the Larrier liable for Passenger maintenance, support or repatriation, then the Carrier or the Master shall have the right to take any of the following courses: (i) Refuse to embark the Passenger at any port; (ii) Disembark the Passenger at any port; (iii) Transfer the Passenger to another berth or cabin; (iv) If the Cruise Ship doctor considers it advisable, to place or confine him/her/her in the Cruise Ship's Hospital or to transfer the Passenger to a health facility at any port, at the Passenger's expense (v) to administer first aid and administer any drug, medicine or other substance or to admit and/or confine the Passenger to a hospital or other similar institution at any port provided that the ship's doctor and/or Master considers that any such steps are necessary.

10.6 The vessels have a limited number of cabins equipped for Disabled Persons or Persons with Reduced Mobility. Not all area or equipment on the vessels are suitable for access to Disabled Persons or Persons with Reduced Mobility. Passengers must check with the Company at the time of booking to enable the Company to assess your needs with the performing carrier. 10.7 Those passengers confined to wheelchairs must furnish their own standard size wheelchairs and must be accompanied by a travelling companion fit and able to assist them. The ship's wheelchairs are available for emergency use only. Passengers must not use mobility scooters on board. They must be gel or dry cell battery only with a width of no more than 78cm to enable access to the cabin. Each part should weigh no more than 23kg Any passenger taking a mobility scooter aboard the Vessel must reside in a disabled cabin.

10.8 Not all ports of call will be accessible by wheelchair and some may be by tender. The decision will be made by the Master of the vessel; it will be based on safety and will be binding. Passengers must check at the time of booking in order to avoid

Unsupportunities.

10.9 If there are any particular conditions, which require personal care or supervision then such personal care or supervision must be organised by the Passenger and at the passenger's expense. The vessel is unable to provide respite services, one to one personal care or supervision or any other form of carer for placing to application and provided the provided provided to the provided p physical, psychiatric or other conditions

pnysical, psychiatric or other conditions.

10.10 In accordance with EU 1177/2010 where it is strictly necessary for the safety of the Passenger, the Company and or the carrier can require a Disabled passenger or Person with Reduced Mobility before it accepts the booking that a Passenger is assisted by an accompanying person who is fit and able to provide the

assistance required

10.11 Assistance dogs are subject to national and EU Regulations regarding travel. It is the passenger's responsibility to check the position prior to the cruise and to be satisfied that the assistance dog can be carried to the ports of embarkation and disembarkation and that the dog is not prohibited from going ashore at the various ports of call. Assistance dogs must have all necessary papers and comply with national Regulations regarding

10.12 Where any mobility or other equipment is lost or damaged by the fault or neglect of the Company then it is the Company or carriers absolute decision as to whether to repair or replace such equipment. Unless the Company and or the Carrier agree otherwise and in writing Passengers are limited to bringing 2 items of such mobility or medical equipment on board per cabin with a total value not exceeding £2200. All equipment must be capable of being carried safety and must be declared before the cruise. The Carrier may decline to carry such equipment where it is not safe to do so or where it has not been notified in time to enable a risk assessment to be carried out.

10.13 Where a Passenger is refused embarkation as a result of safety and/or fitness to travel and or failure to give notice under EU 1177/2010 or otherwise, neither the Company nor the carrier shall be liable for any loss or expense occasioned to the passenger thereby, nor shall the passenger be entitled to any compensation from the carrier.

10.14 Any Passenger who embarks, or allows any other Passenger for whom he or she is responsible to embark, when he or she or such other Passenger is suffering from any sickness, disease, injury or infirmity bodily or mental or to his/her knowledge has been exposed to any infection or contagious disease, or for any other reason is likely to impair the safety or reasonable comfort of other persons on board or for any reason is refused permission to land at his/her or her port of destination shall be responsible for any loss or expense incurred by the Company, carrier or the Master directly or indirectly in consequence of such sickness, disease, injury, infirmity, exposure or refusal or permission to land unless in the case of sickness, disease, injury, infirmity or exposure the same has been declared in writing to the Carrier or the Master before embarkation and consent in writing of the Carrier or the Master to such embarkation has been obtained.

10.15 Pregnant women are highly recommended to seek medical advice prior to travel at any stage of their pregnancy. Women who are up to 23 weeks pregnant at the end of the cruise are required to produce a medical certificate of fitness to travel. Ships cannot, for safety reasons, carry pregnant Passengers of 23 weeks or more by the end of the cruise. The Company and the Carrier reserve the right to request a medical certificate at any stage of pregnancy and to refuse passage if the Company and/or the Master are not satisfied that the Passenger will be safe during the

10.16 The ship's doctor is not qualified to deliver babies on board or to offer pre or post natal treatment and no responsibility is accepted by the Company in respect of the ability to provide such services or equipment. The cruise ship's doctor is not a specialist and the ship's medical centre is not required to be and is not equipped to the same standards as a land-based hospital. The Vessel carries medical supplies and equipment as required by its flag state. Neither the Company nor the doctor shall be liable to the Passenger as a result of any inability to treat any medical condition as a result.

10.17 The Company and the carrier are entitled to administer a health questionnaire prior to boarding. All Passengers must follow the vessels instructions and procedures relating to all matters including health, safety, hygiene and security. Any Passenger boarding a ship at initial embarkation who has not filled in the required pre-boarding health declaration must inform the Company of any sickness and/or diarrhoea experienced less than 72 hours prior to embarkation. In the interest of Passenger's safety the Company reserves the right at its discretion, to refuse boarding. In such circumstances the Company shall not be liable to pay any compensation, nor shall Passengers have any further claim against the Company. The Company and the carrier are entitled to request Passengers to remain in their cabins in the event of illness which is or may be infectious.

10.18 In the event of illness or accident, Passengers may have

to be landed ashore by the Company and/or Master for medical treatment. The Company makes no representations regarding the quality of medical treatment at any port of call or at the place at which the Passenger is landed. Medical facilities and standards vary from port to port and the Company makes no representations or warranties in relation to such standards.

or warranties in relation to such standards.

10.19 The Company does not accept any responsibility for Passengers unable to travel, or who incur any other loss because they fail to comply with any health formalities. The Company takes no responsibility for Passengers denied embarkation and/ or disembarkation on medical grounds. Cancellation of any part of the holiday that arises due to health requirements will be subject to cancellation charges as set out in Section 8.

10.20 Any cost or expense reasonably incurred by the Company To 20 Ally 60st or expense reason range incurred by the company for or on behalf of the Passenger in respect of any form of medical, dental or similar treatment, hotel, transportation, repatriation, damages to fixtures and fittings (including the soiling of soft furnishings i.e. mattresses) or any other expense shall be repayable by the Passenger to the Company irrespective of whether the sum is covered by the Passenger's travel insurance arrangements.

To 10.21 if a Passenger is refused entry to board an aircraft because, in the opinion of the Captain or airline staff, the Passenger is unfit to travel or represents a threat to the safety of the aircraft or its Passengers or crew or is abusive or disruptive, the Company will not be liable to complete the Passengers holiday arrangements and will not be liable to pay any refund or compensation.

10.22 Unless approved by the Company in writing prior to departure, Passengers may not bring on board any controlled substances

10.23 Passengers may not bring on board any prohibited substances, any animals or any goods of a flammable or dangerous nature. Doing so will render the Passenger strictly liable to the Company for any injury, loss, damage or expense suffered by the Company as a result. The Passenger will also be personally liable for any statutory penalties

10.24 Passengers are required at all times to follow the instructions of employees and crew regarding the use of ship's equipment (including hand santitizers) and general behaviour whilst on board. The Company will not be responsible for any consequential injury, illness, financial or other loss incurred by Passengers if they fail to comply with the instructions they are given.

10.25 The Captain (or any employee or member of the crew authorised by the Master) will be entitled to search the cabin and/or personal luggage of any Passenger suspected of being in breach of these clauses. In addition, any employee or crew member will be entitled to enter a Passenger's cabin in order to carry out an inspection, or to undertake cleaning, maintenance or repair work.

10.26 The Company expects all Passengers to have consideration for other Passengers when travelling on our cruises and to treat all staff and fellow Passengers with respect. If in the Company's opinion, or the reasonable opinion of someone either in authority or from one of our suppliers (such as an airline), any Passenger acts in such a way as to cause or be likely to cause danger, breach of safety and or upset or distress to any of our staff, fellow Passengers or a third party or your behaviour impacts the smooth and or safe running of the cruise we are entitled to disembark the Passenger and terminate the cruise holiday. In such circumstances neither the Company or the relevant carrier will have any further liability and the Passenger will not be entitled to any refund for any part of the cost of their unused cruise package including any return travel arrangements, transfers or alternative accommodation etc.

10.27 Should any Passenger have the misfortune to suffer illness, injury or death during the period of the cruise arising out of an activity that does not form part of the arrangement made by the Company, the Company will, where appropriate, provide any assistance it can to the affected Passenger, such assistance being limited to a maximum cost incurred by the Company of £5,000 per booking.

10.28 The Company may invite various affinity groups of people with shared interests who choose to travel together onto a cruise. The Company does not envisage that this will materially affect the normal day to day operation of the ship but Passengers must accept that there may be occasions when certain facilities are unavailable whilst these groups are on board.

11 COMPLAINTS

11.1 Any Passenger who encounters a problem during a cruise must immediately report it to the reception desk on the ship and ensure that the issue is recorded in the ship's log together with nay action taken to resolve it. If the matter cannot be resolved during the cruise, and the Passenger wishes to pursue a complaint, the Passenger must write to the Company within 28 days of final disembarkation to allow the complaint to be investigated properly. If the Passenger does not give the Company the opportunity to resolve the issue locally during the cruise by reporting it to a member of the ship's crew at the reception desk and having the issue recorded in the ship's log, then the Company may not be able to deal positively with any complaint on your return.

11.2 The Company is a Member of ABTA, membership number W0302.

Hospital The Company will provide a final response to the Company will be no Sasenger on later than 2 months for the Company within 2 months from the date of the circumstances giving rise to the complaint. Within 1 month of receipt of the complaint the Company will respond informing the Passenger whether the complaint as been substantiated, rejected or is still being considered. The Company will provide a final response to the Passenger no later than 2 months after receipt of the complaint.

12 CARRIAGE BY SEA OR INLAND WATERWAYS AND LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

12.1 Carriage by sea is subject to the Carriers' Conditions of Carriage which are contractually incorporated into the contract with the Company. Copies of the conditions of carriage will be sent to Passengers with their travel documentation but they can be provided in advance upon request. They are also available on board the ship and on the Company's website. It is important that you read these documents as they set out your rights and obligations. They also contain limitations of liability.

12.2 The liability of the Company and the carrier to Passengers for carriage by sea in respect of death, personal injury and or loss of or damage to luggage is governed since 1 January 2013 to International Carriage by EU Regulation 392/2009 relating to the Liability of carriers of passengers by sea in the event of accidents

by the provisions of the Convention Relating to the Carriage of Passengers and their Luggage by Sea 1974 as amended in 1976 ("The Athens Convention) for Domestic Carriage For the purposes of EU 392/2009, the Athens 1974 and 2002 The Company is a contracting carrier. EU Regulation 392/2009 may be viewed at: http://eurlex.europa.eu/LexUriServ/LexUriServ.do?/uri=O.it.:20 09:131:0024:0046:EN:PDF The Athens Convention 1974 may be viewed at: http://www.dor/urier.dor/u

ship on which the cruise is performed.

12.3 EU Regulation 392/2009 and where applicable The Athens Convention 1974 (from April 23 2014 the Athens Convention 2002) limit The Company's and the Carriers' liability for loss or damage to luggage and make special provision for valuables. It is presumed that luggage has been delivered undamaged unless written notice is given to the Company and/or the performing Carrier. a) in the case of apparent damage, before or at the time of disembarkation or redelivery; or b) in the case of damage which is not apparent or of loss, within 15 days from the date of disembarkation or redelivery or from the time when such redelivers should have taken place. Damages for cabin luggage payable by the Carrier are limited up to 2250 SDRs approx. £2,111.41 if EU Regulation 392/2009 and or Athens Convention 2002 applies or where applicable the Athens Convention 1974 limit of 833 SDRs approx. £781.80.

12.4 Limits shall be reduced in proportion to any contributory negligence by the Passenger and by the maximum deductible specified in Article 8 by the passenger in accordance with Article 8 (4) of the Athens Conventions or EU Regulation 392/2009. All Claims must be brought in accordance with EU Regulation 392/2009 or where applicable the Athens Convention 1974 or 2002 within 2 years of the date of disembarkation from the ship. 12.5 In respect of domestic carriage in the UK, The Athens Convention will apply and the limits for death/personal injury are 46.666 Special Drawing Rights (SDR) approx. £43,794.67 these limits may also apply to domestic cruises in the EU. Where the carrier has a principal place of business in the UK the limits of liability per passenger may be 300,000 SDR approx. £281,541.21 per carriage.

12.6 In respect of international carriage EU Regulation 392/2009 applies the limits for death/personal injury caused by a shipping incident, with the exception of circumstances beyond the Carrier's control (ie act of war, natural disaster, act of a third party) to no more than 250 000 SDRs approx. £234,587.82 per passenger per carriage. Except for cases involving war and terrorism damages up to a further 150 000 SDRs approx. £140,752.69 may be payable in respect of a shipping incident til nufless the Company or the carrier proves that the death or personal injury occurred without the carrier's fault or neglect. Where death/personal injury is caused by a non-shipping incident it is for the passenger to prove that the death or personal injury was caused by the fault or neglect of the carrier. The maximum sum payable to any passenger under EU Regulation 392/2009 is limited to 400 000 per passenger per carriage which is approx. £375,340.52. The maximum sum payable in cases involving war and terrorism where the carrier is liable is 250 000 SDRs per passenger per carriage or 340 000 000 SDRs per ship, per carriage.

12.7 The Company and the carrier are not liable for valuables, monies or other securities including jewellery and watches. If they have been deposited with the reception desk on the ship for safe keeping and a receipt issued then in those limited circumstances the Company's and the carriers liability will be as set out in EU Regulation 392/2009 or where applicable the Athens Convention1974 or 2002. The use of safes on board a Vessel is not a deposit with the ship or with the Company under the EU Regulation 392/2009 or where applicable the Athens Convention 1974 or 2002 or otherwise. The limits are 3,375 SDRs approx. £3,166.45 pursuant to EU Regulation 392/2009 and the Athens Convention 2002 or 1200 SDRs approx. £1,125.81 pursuant to the Athens Convention 1974.

12.8 An SDR is an international monetary unit, The exact value of an SDR fluctuates with the daily exchange rate, The daily exchange rate can be viewed at the international monetary Fund website http://www.imf.org/external/np/fin/data/rms_sdv.aspx.and an SDR converter is available at http://coinmill.com/GBP_SDR.

The Company's liability will not at any time exceed that of the carrier under its Conditions of Carriage and/or applicable or incorporated conventions or other legislation.

12.10 Where carriage is performed on Inland waterways and the vessel does not go to sea the liability provisions relating to sea going vessels do not apply to the cruise. 
